TO HIS EXCELLENCY JOHN POYNTZ, EARL SPENCER, K.G.  
LORD LIEUTENANT-GENERAL AND GENERAL GOVERNOR OF IRELAND.

Queen's University, Dublin Castle,  
*April 1, 1869.*

*May it please your Excellency,*

In the absence of the Earl of Clarendon, Chancellor of the Queen's University in Ireland, it becomes my duty as Vice-Chancellor, in compliance with the provisions of Her Majesty's Charter, to furnish to your Excellency the Report of the Condition and Progress of the University since the 1st April, 1868.

The General University Examinations during the period of this Report commenced on the 29th of September, and terminated on the 26th of October, 1868. Examinations for Degrees in the Faculty of Medicine were also held in June, and First University Examinations in Arts and Engineering were also held in April. At these various Examinations 440\* Candidates presented themselves. Lists of those who were successful are annexed, and a App. II. List of the Students Matriculated in the University since the first of October last.

In addition to these Examinations for Members of the University, Examinations of Candidates who are not Members were held in the month of June. Lists of those who were successful are App. II. annexed.

The principal public meeting of the University, to confer degrees and diplomas, and distribute prizes, and which your Excellency's

## APPENDIX I.

PUBLIC MEETING of the QUEEN'S UNIVERSITY in IRELAND, held in *Appendix.*  
St. Patrick's Hall, Dublin Castle, on the 14th October, 1868.

AFTER the close of the examinations of the year 1868, a public meeting *I.*  
of the Queen's University was held in Dublin Castle on the 14th October, *Public*  
1868, for conferring degrees, diplomas, and prizes. *Meeting.*

A large number of distinguished persons having taken their places in the Examination Hall, the Vice-Chancellor and Senate of the University, the Professors and Examiners and the Candidates, entered it in procession.

The VICE-CHANCELLOR opened the meeting with the following address:—

At this our annual meeting to confer the degrees and honours of the Queen's University, I have the satisfaction of announcing that the number of candidates for the examination of the past collegiate year exceeds that of its immediate predecessor. The total number of individual students who attended the examinations in the year now concluded has been 316. The corresponding number in 1867 was 305. Of these candidates 52 out of 72, who were examined for the degree of Doctor of Medicine, have been successful, 32 of whom were admitted to their degrees in the month of June last, and the remaining 20 are to be admitted to-day. Twenty-two of the number have also attained to the degree of Master in Surgery. Seventy-four medical students, out of a total number of 119 candidates, have passed the first examination in that faculty, and will, I hope, become successful candidates for their degree in a future year. Nineteen Bachelors of Art out of 20 examined have been declared entitled to the degree of Master, and 46 students out of 50 candidates for the degree of Bachelor of Arts, have successfully passed the examination; and at the first examination in Arts 50 students were successful out of 88 who presented themselves to the examiners.

The Senate of the University, for the greater encouragement of the study of engineering, and to give to the successful students in that most valuable branch of collegiate pursuits a more strictly academic designation, have substituted degrees for the diploma we have heretofore conferred. The degree of Bachelor in Engineering will, therefore, be given to-day to those whose answering at the recent examination would have entitled them to the University diploma; they are eight in number, out of ten candidates. The first examination in Engineering some time ago instituted by the Senate has been successfully passed by ten out of seventeen students. *Ad eundem* Degrees of LL.D. have been granted to Sir Robert Kane, F.R.S., and to the Rev. Christopher M'Cready, M.A., F.R.S. The prizes founded by means of the contributions of Sir Robert Peel, and of those who responded to his appeal, have been successfully competed for, while the medals and prizes proposed to be given by the Senate in the various classes into which our University examinations are divided have been awarded by the examiners to a very large number of those now before us, thus testifying, and, I have no doubt, most deservedly, to the diligence and ability of the successful competitors. The continuous progress of our institution is not merely exhibited in the internal successes of the collegiate students; as in former academic years, so in the course of that we have just terminated, many students and graduates of

the University have eminently distinguished themselves in the ranks of competition for employment in various departments of the public service. I have on former occasions alluded particularly to individuals so distinguished, and on this I am, happily, enabled to lay before the present assembly a very ample list of students from the Queen's Colleges who have so profited by the education there given to them most usefully to themselves, and, I may add, most beneficially to the public services, to which they have devoted themselves:—

*Indian Civil Service.*—Three candidates have been successful, one from each college. Mr. Thomas Horan, only a second year's student in Cork, obtained the highest number of marks in mathematics this year—indeed I believe the highest ever obtained. He will be examined next week for his first university examination in arts, and I hope will be able to take his degree next year before he goes to India. The second is Mr. James Monteath, of Queen's College, Belfast, who takes to-day his degree of M.A., with honours; and the third is Mr. Colman Macaulay, of Queen's College, Galway, who takes also, with honours, the same degree to-day. Mr. W. McLaren Smith, M.A., of Queen's College, Belfast, who obtained the highest number in mathematics in the competition of 1863, has been appointed Professor of Mathematics in the College of Berhampore.

*Consular Service in the East.*—James Newsome, M.A., Belfast, took 1st place at the competition; John O'Driscoll, Cork, 3rd place at the competition; John C. Hall, B.A., Belfast, was also successful. Mr. John M'L. Browne, a Queen's College student, who entered this service in 1861, is now First Secretary to the "Chinese Embassy to the Treaty Powers." He has taken advantage of his visit to Europe to take his degree of B.A., which he does to-day. Robert Jamieson, M.A., of Queen's College, Cork, who won an interpretership a few years ago, has been appointed First Professor of Mathematics in the Imperial College, Peking. Michael O'Brien, B.A., of Queen's College, Cork, another "Interpreter," has been appointed First Professor of English Literature in the same college.

*Public Works Department of India.*—In this year's competition there were 65 candidates and 22 appointments. Of these Irish students obtained seven—three from Cork, three from Galway, and one from Trinity College, Dublin. Mr. Unkles, of Cork, 5th place; Mr. Lynam, of Galway, 6th place; Mr. Nightingale, of Galway (who is now taking his degree of Bachelor in Engineering), 7th place; Mr. Bayly, of T.C.D., 9th place; Mr. Richard, of Cork, 13th place; Mr. Burke, of Cork, 16th place; Mr. Hughes, of Galway, 21st place.

Mr. J. T. Bottomley, a highly distinguished graduate of Queen's College, Belfast (M.A.) has had the high honour to be selected for the post of Demonstrator of Chemistry in King's College, London, a post which can only be held by a man of considerable scientific ability and acquirements.

Mr. Alexander Hamilton, B.A., Belfast, and Mr. John M'Callum, B.A., Belfast, have obtained, on competitive examinations, the appointments of Inspectors of National Schools in Ireland.

Mr. Chambers, M.A., Belfast, has been appointed Head Classical Master of the Royal Academical Institution of Derry; Mr. W. H. Dodd, M.A., Belfast, Head Master of the Endowed School of Bangor; and Mr. T. G. Houston, Belfast, Head Master of Cookstown Academy. Mr. John Park, M.A., Belfast, has been appointed by his Grace the Lord Lieutenant Professor of Logic and Metaphysics in the Queen's College, Belfast, on the resignation of the very eminent and distinguished Professor M'Cosh. R. S. Stevelly, B.A., Belfast, has been appointed Mathematical Master, Aldenham School, Watford.

A great number of our medical graduates (I believe upwards of 20),

from all the colleges, have obtained appointments, by competition, in the army and navy medical services. Among them, Dr. Chatterton, of Queen's College, Cork (who took his degree of M.D. last June), has taken first place at this year's competition. Dr. Corbett, another Cork graduate, who took his degree of M.D. last year, took this year the first place at the further examination in this service, after having studied at Netley.

James H. Martin, an engineering student, of Belfast, has been appointed Engineering Superintendent on a sugar plantation in Demerara. These sugar plantations, I am informed, are under the level of the sea, and require large hydraulic works, in addition to those appropriate to the sugar manufacture. The last engineer who went from the Queen's College to Demerara has just got promotion in the service, sooner than is usual.

There are also to be recorded various other minor competitive successes.

These numerical and general statements constitute in themselves all that is necessary, I should say, in the way of comment on, or eulogy of the instruction given in the Queen's Colleges, by their eminent professors, and the diligence and ability of the students who have been prepared therein for the several university and public distinctions to which they have attained. I have but to add that, in the three colleges, the total number of students attending their several classes in the past collegiate year has been 762; a number not equal to those of a few former years, yet exceeding that of the year 1866. Of this number 210 are members of the Established Church, 181 are Roman Catholics, 274 are Presbyterians, and 97 belong to other religious denominations. The various questions regarding public and university education, to which I alluded when we last met in this hall, have since undergone varied discussion, but much remains undecided, and propositions regarding compulsory and middle-class instruction, the expansion of the systems and practice of other universities, and the regulation of intermediate scholastic institutions will, no doubt, engage legislative attention in the coming session of Parliament, and must be affected more or less beneficially by the recent extensive changes in the constitution of the constituency of the empire; with these discussions as regards the English institutions we have not much practical concern, but it is to be hoped that by some well-digested plan provision may be made for the organization of an improved system of intermediate education in Ireland, the want of which, in order to the better training and early preparation of students for our colleges, has long been felt and complained of.

At our annual meeting in the year 1858 I referred to the report of the Commission of Inquiry into the state of the endowed schools in Ireland, then recently presented to Parliament, their numbers, the funds destined to their support, and the nature and extent of the instruction given in them. A similar commission, which was issued in the year 1864 for a like inquiry into the endowed schools in England, has lately presented a most voluminous report, pointing out the modes in which, in the opinion of the Commissioners, those institutions (which are very numerous) may be made available to the diffusion of sound and safe education among the middle classes. The subject, therefore, has been thoroughly examined into and considered in all its branches, and it deserves the attention of every statesman. Let us hope that from these inquiries good results may be attained for the furtherance and improvement of the education of many classes who are now destitute of adequate means and suitable opportunities for the pursuit of studies appropriate to their condition and objects in life, and introductory to their progress in academic, collegiate, or generally useful learning.

I have now but to discharge, in the absence of our Chancellor, the Earl of Clarendon, my function of admitting the candidates to their respective degrees. His Grace the Lord Lieutenant has, as on a former occasion, most kindly assented to our request that he would personally distribute our medals and prizes to those who have successfully competed for those honours.

The degrees, honours, and certificates were then distributed to the successful candidates.

After the degrees and prizes had been conferred, the VICE-CHANCELLOR again rose and said—

The Senate of the University, the Presidents, Vice-Presidents, Professors, the Students of the Queen's Colleges, desire through me to tender to your Grace their grateful acknowledgments of the honour you have conferred upon them by your Grace's attendance at this meeting, and the part you have taken in their proceedings, and their deep sense of your kindness in again permitting this magnificent hall to be thus occupied. It is to me a high gratification to be enabled to discharge this pleasing duty. In their names and my own, therefore, I take leave to present to your Grace our warmest thanks. The course of the University and of the colleges has not been distinguished in the past year by any important event. They have but pursued, to the best of their ability, the even tenor of their way; and the year's examinations have presented what they trust your Grace will consider an important and encouraging result—gratifying, we would hope, alike in his public capacity to the representative of our gracious Sovereign in the administration of the affairs of Ireland, as personally to a nobleman anxious for the progress of education, and solicitous for the advancement and prosperity of the country with which he is so closely and influentially connected; and we regard the honour you have now for the third time so kindly conferred upon our meeting as a sure evidence of your Grace's continuing interest in the fortunes and progress of the Queen's University and its associated colleges.

His Grace the DUKE of ABERCORN then rose and said—

Mr. Vice-Chancellor and gentlemen, I return you my thanks with pleasure and gratitude for the compliment which, on behalf of the Senate, you have so obligingly conferred on me. It is a source to me of additional gratification to have the privilege, as has been remarked by the Vice-Chancellor, of now for the third time assisting on these interesting occasions, and of meeting again the learned and distinguished body which annually presides in these halls over those important functions which exercise so great an influence for good over the rising talent and the intellectual energy of the youth of this island. I have said so large an influence for good over the youth of this island, for, assembled as we are in these stately halls—surrounded, as we are rather, at the present moment, by the emblems of luxury, by the impersonations of refinement, and the graces of female society—surrounded, I say, as we are by these, rather than by the sterner emblems of learning, we can hardly realize the unwearied industry, the midnight toil, the days of labour, and the nights of thought which are required for the culmination of such results as those which examinations of this nature bring forth.

The prizes and distinctions, for the conferring of which on those who gained them one short half hour sufficed, bear a much wider and more extended significance than the mere ceremony of conferring them would indicate. They bear the significance and impress of energy, and perseverance, and genius, which in after days may be found competent to do good



service to the State, to increase its intellectual renown or add to its national advantage. Appendix.

Those elements which go towards forming that combination of energy, of perseverance, and of talent—a combination necessary for the successful result of a hard-fought academical career—are precisely the qualities from which, in afterlife, may arise the distinguished statesman, the profound lawyer, the deep read theologian—even, I may say, the glorious and successful soldier. And therefore it is that we and the public (as these brilliant assemblies annually testify) take a wider and more extended interest in these examinations than even the individual merits or successes of candidates, however talented, could arouse; an interest, I may say, akin to that with which in bygone days of ancient Greece the whole population looked down with eagerness upon the arena in which the youth of their State—their hope of strength in war, and of wisdom in the Senate—exhibited their qualities of endurance, of valour, or of skill, in their hard-fought Olympian games. In like manner I say we, in these more peaceful, but perhaps not less difficult contests, which are decided in these halls, recognise and appreciate those qualities which (where the youth is father to the man) may yet be found eminent in their country's service, may wield the thunders of the State, or direct its legal or theological destinies.

But whilst distinctions such as those to which I have alluded may in the course of events be in store for some of those whom I see around me, I will now refer briefly to the actual successes which have attended the alumni of this institution.

I have gone through the lists of the graduates and undergraduates of the Queen's University with some care, and I am both pleased and surprised to find the number of triumphs it has won in every department. Since its incorporation in 1850, twenty-four of its students have fought their way to the civil service of India and Ceylon; fourteen have by competition entered the Royal Engineers, and other engineering departments of the public service; sixty-four have received appointments in the army and navy medical service, by competition; and, since the establishment of the law scholarships in the English Inns of Court, the Queen's University of Ireland has three times carried them away. In addition to those which have been partly enumerated by the Vice-Chancellor, I understand that in the present year there were thirty or forty appointments gained in the same way which are not in the printed calendar of 1868.

These are successes of which you may indeed be proud, and which should stimulate the young men around me to still further exertions. They speak eloquently of the excellence of your system, and of the ability of your professors, who have so well carried it out. But, gentlemen, while such are the internal success and vigour of your institution, I regret that that which would externally give it additional lustre and distinction—I mean a habitation suited to its dignified requirements—is still wanting. I acknowledge that I myself feel some shame that I, like my predecessors in this place, held out hopes that as yet we have not been able to realize; but I may say that, though the subject has been unavoidably delayed, it has by no means been forgotten or set aside, and that it is by no means impossible that the delay may be more than compensated for by the fitness and completeness of the ultimate fulfilment of the object in view.

And now, to turn to the general educational principles of your institution, I must congratulate you upon being members of the University of which it may truly be said, in the language of the author of "The History and Philosophy of the Inductive Sciences," "it is one of the golden links which connect the permanent with the progressive."

The principal educational feature in your system seems to be this: two

years are devoted to classics and mathematics, up to that mysterious and, in some of the Universities, occasionally untoward process called the "Little go." After that the student, if he be not an honorman, is somewhat restricted in his choice of subjects for examination. But if he be an honorman he is free to devote himself to such subjects as he is best determined towards by the bent of his own genius, or by his choice of a profession in life. I confess this system seems to me both wise and sound. I know there are many eminent authorities who would be against me; but I am old-fashioned enough to think that classics and mathematics, wisely taught, form the best basis for the higher education of the young. I think that, looking to the narrowing influence which a special professional education has upon afterlife, a young man is best educated, up to a certain point in his career, not as a lawyer or an engineer, not as an architect or a physician, but solely and simply as a man; and that he should bring to his after career in life faculties broadened and strengthened by that general discipline in life which experience has proved to be most efficacious. But after this point I would plead for ample freedom for individual taste. There could not be an intellectual tyranny more senseless than one which would condemn an Owen or a Murchison to four years of Greek iambics, or a Moore or a Tennyson to four years of mathematics. I believe these studies, carried to excess, are apt even to be pernicious, and to debilitate the mind by forcing it to produce a single fruitage. It has been well said of exclusive mathematical training that it acts as a spring tending in one uniform direction.

But, gentlemen, as the eye rolls over the wide field covered by your examination papers, one sees how wise and how judicious is the arrangement there displayed. Classics and mathematics indeed are there, as well as the natural and experimental sciences; but side by side are logic and metaphysics; and I am also glad to see that foreign languages hold their proper place—those languages of which Arnold said that ignorance of them and of their literature was only less disgraceful than ignorance of our own. Dante, Goethe, and Victor Hugo stand in your examination books side by side with Virgil and Sophocles; and I also rejoice to see that English literature and English classical works hold their fitting place, and that Milton and Shakespeare are honoured as they deserve. It has been said of some of your own national poetry and prose, that the poetry of your own Anacreon, Moore, as to whom it might be written, as it was of his brother bard of old—

*"Nec si quid olim lusit Anacreon  
Delevit ætas; spirat adhuc amor;"*

and even the prose of Burke show some national defects. If such be the case, the study of some of the best models will act as a corrective, and tend to form among us a style neither hard nor meagre—neither feeble nor florid.

But I must turn from these subjects to that which more especially interests us on the present occasion—I mean the academic victories that have been gained during the examinations which we have just reviewed. Those who have gained prizes and distinctions, while I congratulate them most heartily on their successes, I would entreat to press forward, and not rest upon their academic laurels. I would urge upon all of you to use well these, the golden hours of your life. You cannot all of you make your intellect to your will, nor regulate all the chances that may hereafter be given you of developing its powers in the most favourable direction; but you can all, by honest industry, take it from these halls fitted for those purposes for which it is claimed by your parents, your country, and your God. We must all rejoice to see the ample proofs that

are around us that the stream of liberal education is advancing. The day was when it needed a careful and fostering hand to encourage its course, but it now realizes that beautiful image in which Homer, in all his marvellous music and wealth of colouring, describes the stream which, conducted by the gardener a while, at last, by its ample flow, glides past and beyond him—

Το δὲ τ' ὥκα κατειβομένον κελαιζε.  
Χώρω ἐνὶ προάλει φθάνει δὲ τε κίῳ τον ἀγοντα.

With every hope and wish that this stream may bear you on in the course of virtue, of happiness, and of success, I bid you farewell.

The proceedings having terminated, the Lord Lieutenant and the Vice-regal party withdrew.
