May it please your Grace,

I.—1. We, the Commissioners of National Education in Ireland, submit to your Grace this our Forty-fourth Report. In this Report all statements connected with the expenditure of the public grants and with the results of the Inspectors' examinations refer to the year ended 31st March, 1878; but the statistics connected with the number of schools, number of pupils on the rolls, and the average daily attendance, refer to the year ended 31st December, 1877.

SCHOOLS AND ATTENDANCE.

- 2. On the 31st of December, 1877, we had 7,370 schools on the Increase of Operation List. During the year 128 schools, most of which Schools. had been inoperative for a considerable time, were struck off the Roll or suspended, or became amalgamated with other National schools; 164 schools were brought into operation—viz., 123 nonvested, 38 vested, and 3 suspended schools, giving a net increase of 36 schools as compared with 1876.
- 3. The total number of pupils on rolls on last day of month, preceding the Results Examinations in schools in 1877, was 752,639.*
- 4. The number of pupils on the rolls on the last day of the Attendance month immediately preceding the annual examinations by the on last 14 days of Inspectors, and who actually attended school on any of the four-month preceding exateen days immediately before that date, was 595,655.†

^{*} The number of individual pupils on rolls who made any attendance a tour schools between 1st of January and 31st of December, 1877, was 1,028,617.

Increase in The average daily attendance of pupils for the year 1877 was average attendance, 418,063, which, compared with 1876, shows an increase of 1,477.

> 6. The per-centage of average attendance of pupils throughout the year to the number on the rolls who attended on any of the last fourteen days of the months preceding the annual examinations is 70.1. These per-centages in 1876 were—in England and Wales, 67.4; Scotland, 75.8; Ireland, 69.8.

8. The number of applications for grants to new schools dealt with in the year 1877 was 216. In 157 cases we gave the required assistance, either as grants for building, or grants of requisites and The remaining 59 applications were rejected. in aid of salaries.

19. The foregoing Returns in reference to the religious denominations of the pupils, include all the pupils who made any attendance at our schools on any day between the 1st of January and the 31st of December, 1877. It will be seen that during the year a mixed attendance of Roman Catholic and Protestant pupils was to be found in 4,146 schools, whilst in 3,142 schools the attendance was unmixed.

WORKHOUSE SCHOOLS.

Werkhouse Schools. 28. The number of Workhouse Schools in connexion with us on the 31st December, 1877, was 157. Of these schools 40 are in Ulster, 49 in Munster, 39 in Leinster, and 29 in Connaught.

These schools were examined on the same system as the Ordinary Schools, and extracts from the reports of our Inspectors were communicated to the Local Government Board, for the information of the different Boards of Guardians. The salaries of the Teachers are determined by the Poor Law authorities, and paid from the Consolidated Fund; but the Poor Law Guardians have power, under the Teachers Act, to award from the rates the amount of results fees payable on the Inspectors' reports.

The total number of pupils appearing on the rolls of these Workhouse Schools during the year ending 31st December, 1877, was 13,076, and the average daily attendance was 6,787.

TEACHERS IN TRAINING.

29. The establishments in which the Teachers attending at Trainingdeour Training Institution are boarded and lodged continue to be partments. efficiently conducted. The inmates have been distinguished, as heretofore, for the general correctness of their conduct, for order and discipline, for the exercise of kindly feeling towards each other, and for the careful observance of their religious duties.

The total number of Teachers trained in 1877 was 197, viz.: Number 95 males and 102 females. Of these, 70 were Roman Catholics, trained. 58 late Established Church, 62 Presbyterians, and 7 were of other persuasions. One hundred and forty-six of those trained were Principal or Assistant Teachers, and 51 were chiefly ex-pupil-teachers, ex-monitors, or distinguished pupils of National Schools. The total number trained from the commencement of our proceedings up to 31st December, 1877, was 10,065.

Number of Teachers.

30. We had in our service on the 31st December, 1877, 7,092 Number of Principal Teachers and 3,397 Assistants, making, in the whole, 10,489 of whom 3,566 were trained in our Normal Establishment. We also had in our service, at the same date, 292 Workmistresses and 110 Junior Literary Assistants.

The Conductors of Convent Schools paid by capitation are not

included in this return.

This return shows an increase upon the previous year of £5,807 5s. 4d. in the school fees of the pupils, and of £5,884 8s. 6d. in the local subscriptions, &c.; total £11,691 13s. 10d.

We view with much satisfaction this steady improvement in Local aid towards the augmentation of the salaries of the Teachers.

37. As the local contributions in aid of Teachers' Salaries here-Other tofore accounted for each year did not include the total amount Local Contributions, of funds annually subscribed in aid of National Education by local parties, we this year caused a Return to be prepared showing the total additional sums locally provided in aid of National education in the year 1877. The amount thus subscribed (over and above the sums paid to teachers) was applied to the erection of new buildings, additions to schools, repairs, improvements of house and furniture, school prizes for encouragement of pupils' attendance, &c., &c., and reached the sum of £43,519 17s. 9d.

RESULTS FEES.

- 38. Results fees under the ordinary regulations were payable Results only to the teachers—
 - (a) Of schools in contributory Unions (under the Act 38 and 39 Vict., cap. 96), in the proportion of two-thirds from the Imperial grant to one-third contributed from the rates;
 - (b) Of schools in non-contributory Unions of one-third only.

The number of Poor Law Unions contributing under the Act 38 & 39 Vict., cap. 96, during the year was 39, and the amount raised from the rates in aid of the incomes of the teachers in these Unions was £21,687 18s. 10d. The Unions non-contributory numbered 124.

The contribution from the Unions involved a payment of double that sum from the Parliamentary Grant, or a total of £65,063 16s. 6d. in results to the teachers of the contributory Unions.

With a view of relieving the condition of the teachers of schools in non-contributory Unions, by enabling them to participate in the contingent results fees—so far as it might be possible to do so without departing from the principle of requiring local contributions as the condition on which the second moiety of the results fees from the Imperial grant could be paid—the Government authorized the Board to pay the second moiety to the teachers, in all cases where the local contributions amounted to a sum equalling:—

- (a) At least 3s. 4d. per child, per annum, of the average attendance of the school, and also equalling
- (b) At least half the amount of the results fees which might have been granted under the Act to the teachers of the same school had it been situated within a contributory Union.

The result of this arrangement is-

- (1.) That in 4,508 of the 4,750 schools in non-contributory Unions the conditions entitling the teachers to contingent results fees were fulfilled, leaving only 242 schools which failed to raise the local contributions necessary to secure payment of contingent fees to their teachers.
- (2.) That the amount of contingent results fees paid to the teachers, was £36,300 10s. 2d.
- 39. The advantage gained by the teachers is not to be estimated only by the amount directly obtained from the Imperial Exchequer. By stimulating local effort in support of the schools the local aid increased considerably in non-contributory Unions, as may be judged from a comparison of the total school fees and subscriptions raised in this and previous years; e.g., £84,860 raised in 1875; £107,685 in 1876; £119,377 in 1877.

40. Of the unconditional results' fees, £58,924 17s. 9d. was paid within the financial year, and of the contingent results' fees £57,989 9s. 0d., making the total results paid from the Imperial Exchequer £116,914 6s. 9d., to which, as results' payments from the rates of contributory Unions, must be added £21,687 18s. 10d., or a total of £138,602 5s. 7d. of results' fees paid to the Teachers.

Total amount of salaries, gratuities, &c., paid in 1876.

41. The total amount of salaries, premiums, gratuities, and results' fees paid by us, including the amount from rates, in the twelve months ended the 31st March, 1878, to the Principal Teachers, Assistants, Monitors, and Workmistresses in National Schools—including the Central and other Model Schools, and the payments to Organizing Teachers—was £548,858 9s. 7d. This sum includes the £4,993 11s. 3d. school fees, apportioned to Teachers in Model Schools.

Total Income, 42. The total income of the teaching staff, from all sources, for the year ended 31st March, 1878, amounted to £663,242 4s. 7d.; viz., £522,176 19s. 6d. from Board; £21,687 18s. 10d. from rates; and £119,377 6s. 3d. from payments by pupils (including portion of Model School fees), subscriptions, and the estimated value of Free Residences, &c.; of the total sum 21·3 per cent. was locally provided, and 78·7 per cent. was derived from the funds placed at our disposal by the State.

Teachers' Incomes (Principals). 43. We give here tables showing the various sources of income of Teachers of National Schools (excluding Teachers of Model Schools and Convent Schools) and the average income received by them according to classes during the year 1877.

Besides the above there were 109 male and 119 female teachers who, in consequence of the average daily attendance at their schools falling below 30, were paid at Capitation Rates, their total incomes averaging £41 14s. 5d. for males, and £35 2s. $3\frac{1}{2}d$. for females.

The calling of a Teacher is one in which family co-operation, in the teaching and earnings of a school, is anything but uncommon. Husband and wife or child; mother and child; brother and sister, living under one roof in family life, are frequently associated together in the working of schools, especially of schools having separate departments for boys and girls. The income of the principal members of the family is, under such circumstances, materially supplemented. Our Inspectors made returns to us of 1,208 Principal Teachers, whose personal incomes, as given in the preceding Table, were, in the year 1877, supplemented in this manner.

The average amount of this supplemental income, was for 1,157 males, £35 4s. $11\frac{3}{4}d$. from the Parliamentary funds, and £5 15s. 9d. from local sources—total £41 0s. $8\frac{3}{4}d$.; and for 51 females £29 16s. $7\frac{1}{2}d$. from Parliamentary funds, and £2 11s. $9\frac{1}{2}d$. from local sources—total £32 8s. 5d.

We regard, with much satisfaction, this class of family co-operation; and encourage it in every suitable instance in which it is recommended to us.

In these returns we do not include any extra incomes that the

Teachers may derive from private tuitions or from the tuition of classes under the Department of Science and Art; as such extra incomes, although indirectly arising from their position as National Teachers, are not derivable from the discharge of duties under our own direction or control.

RESULTS EXAMINATIONS.

Results Examinations.

- 44. From the 1st March, 1877, each pupil, in order to qualify for presentation at the results examinations, was required in day schools to make 100 attendances of at least four hours a day, instead of 90 attendances as heretofore, and in evening schools 50 instead of 45 attendances.
- 45. The following results have been ascertained through individual examination of the pupils of National Schools by the Inspectors at their annual inspection within the year:—

Of the total number of infants (73,381) who had attended the required number of days within the year and were examined by the Inspectors, passes were assigned to 65,534, or 89.3 per cent.

EXTRA SUBJECTS.

Extra Subjects.

48. From the year 1855 we encouraged instruction in singing, drawing, and the mathematical and physical sciences, as extra branches, by a system of gratuities for satisfactory answering in these subjects. The gratuities, however, have been partially superseded by results payments since the introduction of the Results scheme in 1872. Since 1874 classics and French, and, for girls, the use of the sewing machine and the higher branches of needlework have been paid for by results fees.

BOOKS AND REQUISITES.

49. The amount received for books, school requisites, and ap-Books and paratus, sold to National Schools in 1877-8, was £29,134 14s. 5d. Requisites. The number of orders was 18,719, and the average amount of each order £1 11s. 1d.

50. The value of requisites and apparatus granted as Free Stock to National Schools in 1878 was £1,663 5s. 6d. The number of

Grants was 446.

SCHOOL FARMS AND GARDENS.

51. The total number of School Farms in connexion with the school Board on the 31st December, 1877, was 120, of which 7 were Farms. School Farms of the First Class, under our exclusive management. All the School Farms were examined during the past year. The ordinary Agricultural Schools under local management were also examined by Inspectors of Agriculture, and special results fees for agriculture were granted upon the reports of these officers. The total number of pupils examined in agriculture in this class of schools was 1552, of whom 1270 passed in the agricultural programme.

We had also 24 schools having School Gardens attached, for the management of which, and for the agricultural knowledge displayed by the pupils, we granted special agricultural fees, upon the reports of the District Inspectors. The number of pupils examined in the

School Gardens last year was 310, of whom 174 passed.

As set forth in table at page 24, 26,920 pupils were examined in agriculture by District Inspectors in the Ordinary National Schools at the Results' examinations, of whom 12,410 passed.

The total number of pupils examined in agriculture during the year 1877 (including the pupils of Ordinary Agricultural Schools and School Gardens, referred to above), was 28,782, of whom 13,854 gained passes for their proficiency in that branch.

TEACHERS' RESIDENCES.

Residences for Teachers. 52. The Act for providing residences for the teachers of non-vested National Schools, passed by the Legislature in August, 1875, has not up to the present been so generally availed of as might be expected. The number of applications formally made for loans in 1877 was 34, and the number approved, 30; and grants under the Minute of the Lords of Her Majesty's Treasury to build residences in connexion with vested Schools were made in 7 cases only.

The total number of applications since 1875 was—for loans, 86, and for grants, 36; total, 122. Of these, 64 applications for loans

were favourably dealt with, and 27 grants were made.

The number of free residences, throughout Ireland, provided without aid from the State, was 1,208.
