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TO THE QUEEN'S MOST EXCELLENT MAJESTY.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR MAJESTY,

Agreeably to the provisions of the Act of 8th and 9th Victoria, chapter 66, section 20, I have the honour of submitting to your Majesty my Report of the proceedings of Queen's College, Belfast, during the Session 1884-85.

NUMBER OF STUDENTS.

The number of Students who entered the College during the Session was 139; of whom 78 Matriculated in the Royal University in 1884, and 34 previous to that year; 3 Matriculated in the University of Dublin; 3 in this College; and 21 were enrolled as non-Matriculated.

The number of Students enrolled during the Session in each department and grade was as follows:—Arts, first year 95, second year 47, third year 46, fourth year 17; Engineering, first year 3, second year 2, third year 3; Law, first year 9, second year 4, third year 1, fourth year 1; Medicine, 245. Deducting those attending in more than one Faculty, the aggregate number of Students enrolled was 449.

Non-Matriculated Students enter for the purpose of attending such departments or classes as may serve to prepare them for those pursuits to which they intend to devote themselves in the business of life. They are not, as a rule, candidates for University Degrees, and they are not eligible for the ordinary College Scholarships or Prizes. I encourage their attendance, and would be glad to see a much larger number of them in the classes. The training given by the Professors of Chemistry, Natural Philosophy, and Engineering, is well adapted to furnish young men with such scientific and practical knowledge as will enable them to engage with much greater prospects of success in several of those staple manufactures, and industrial enterprises, which constitute the chief sources of the prosperity and wealth of Belfast and Ulster. The want of sound and thorough scientific education has been severely felt hitherto by our enterprising merchants. The linen manufacturers, bleachers, and dyers of Belfast, have

not in all cases been able to compete on equal terms with the advanced chemical acquirements, and technical skill of their rivals in Germany, Belgium, and France. The town, and the country at large, have thereby suffered in the loss of trade, and the lowering of local prestige. The only remedy is the more complete and general training of our young business men in applied science. They must be educated up to, and if possible in advance of, the standard of other countries. It ought to be, and it henceforth will be, one main object of this College to supply that education. There is much to encourage us in the history of other institutions. It is well known that the remarkable development of practical Chemistry which took place in the University of Glasgow, in the early part of the present century, under the distinguished professoriate of Dr. Thomson, effected marvellous results in the south of Scotland and north of England, whereby the productive power, and wealth of the country were materially increased. We want a like stimulus in the north of Ireland. The natural resources of Ulster are great; the people are thrifty, intelligent, and enterprising; peace and order prevail; and thus a wide and inviting field is open for men of scientific attainment, and practical energy. The inventive genius and mechanical skill of one man, Sir E. J. Harland, has, within the last few years, created a new industry of gigantic proportions—iron shipbuilding. The chemical knowledge of another, Dr. Ritchie, a former student of this College, has built up a large and prosperous local trade in a fresh department. On every side there are encouraging openings, which await and invite the bold and properly trained capitalist. It is our duty as educators to prepare for the patriotic work to which we are thus called. Of late the urgent demands for systematic instruction in the various branches of applied science, have led to the establishment of Colleges in most of the great centres of population in England and Scotland. Those Colleges are benefiting the people, and are largely contributing to the extension, and to the improvement both in design and execution, of British manufactures. In Belfast we have a prosperous College, but it can only be regarded as the nucleus of such a fully equipped institution as the people of Ulster wish for and deserve. Native energy and liberality are great. Belfast merchants have contributed nobly to the improvement of their harbour, the construction of docks, and other enterprises of a purely local kind. They have not received, as the authorities of some other towns have, Government grants and subsidies. They have not asked for them. But Queen's College is not a merely local institution; its students come from all parts of Ulster, and indeed of Ireland. It gives them an education which has fitted thousands for filling useful, and in many instances, distinguished positions in the learned professions, and in the ordinary business of life. It is the only State-endowed College in the north of Ireland. And at present it is crippled by its very prosperity. The number of its students has far outgrown the capacity of its buildings; while its laboratories and appliances are utterly insufficient for that sound

and thorough scientific and practical education which the present age demands.

The classes of Modern Languages, English History, Political Economy, and Jurisprudence, are also specially adapted to the wants not merely of professional students, but also of those intended for business. The intimate mercantile and manufacturing relations of Ulster with the Continent of Europe, make familiarity with German and French essential to success. Many foreigners are now employed as interpreters and correspondents. Why should this be so? Why not make use of the unequalled facilities here offered for educating young men of our own? Then, again, a knowledge of the leading principles of Political Economy and International Law cannot be dispensed with in commercial and social life. This knowledge is supplied in the College by able and earnest professors.

ENLARGED BUILDINGS AND LABORATORIES REQUIRED.

I felt it to be my duty in previous Reports to direct attention to the insufficiency of our buildings and laboratories. When the College was founded, thirty-six years ago, the requirements of practical training in science were not fully understood, and probably it was not anticipated that the number of students should so largely increase in a comparatively short period. The average number during the first decade was 189, during the second 368, during the third 400; during the past session 449 were on the books. Provision was, however, made in the Act of Parliament which authorized the founding of the College, for all requisite enlargement. The words are very explicit, and the professors believe they are entitled to expect that the engagement of the Legislature, under which they were invited and encouraged to accept office, shall be faithfully carried into effect. The words are these:—

“And be it enacted, that the Commissioners of Public Works in Ireland for the time being shall be trustees for the purpose of purchasing, or providing, any buildings that may be necessary for the said College . . . and for repairing, enlarging, and improving the same from time to time for the use of the said College.”

I now venture to express the earnest hope that, as the College has so signally prospered, as the number of students has far outgrown the capacity of the buildings, and as the professors have laboured, and continue to labour, with untiring faithfulness, immediate steps will be taken to provide such accommodation as the Act of Parliament contemplated and guaranteed. It seems to me to be a positive injustice to professors and students to hamper their efforts, and retard their studies, by a refusal to provide those buildings and appliances without which satisfactory training is impossible.

The collegiate education required at the present time in this country is not merely training in literature and abstract science. This, it is true, must ever constitute the basis of real education. Such training expands the mind, quickens the intellect, regulates the logical faculty, refines the taste, generates thought, and thereby prepares the youth for entering successfully upon pro-

fessional or technical studies. But it only prepares him. However profound his classical or scientific attainments may be, they are of themselves insufficient to make a lawyer or a physician, an engineer or a divine. They may make an accomplished tutor, or departmental professor, but not a professional or business man. It would be a calamity for the country were Ancient Classics, or pure Mathematics, or History and Philosophy put in the background; yet, on the other hand, there are branches of practical knowledge no less necessary, indeed even more necessary, especially in a manufacturing community. We have around us, for example, in Belfast large and rapidly increasing industries—ship-building, iron-founding, chemical works, linen factories, which constitute the main sources of wealth and social prosperity. For taking part in these our young men must be prepared by systematic training in applied science. I fear that the whole system of higher education in Ireland has of late been turning, to a considerable extent, in a wrong direction. Competitive examinations are the order of the day. A boy is supposed to be educated in proportion to the position which he attains in those examinations, and the number of marks he can score, while his so-called success may be largely the result of mere cram. It cannot fail to strike one on looking over the examination papers how few of the questions have any direct bearing on the ordinary business of life, and how little can be done by mere paper questions towards testing practical, and therefore useful knowledge. The questions set sometimes bring up to my mind the sarcastic criticism of John Locke—"Would not a Chinese, who took notice of our way of educating, imagine that all our young gentlemen were designed to be teachers and professors of the dead languages in foreign countries, and not to be men of business in their own?" It is our aim in this College, while labouring to maintain a high standard in Classics and Mathematics, to unite with them broad and thoroughly practical training in the various departments of applied science. It is surely not too much to ask our patriotic statesmen to furnish us with the means, as provided for in the Act of Parliament, of carrying on successfully this noble and beneficent work. It is not merely local in its bearing and influence, it is of national importance.

THE IMMEDIATE WANTS OF THE COLLEGE.

I. *Chemistry*.—I have just received an urgent letter from Dr. Letts, Professor of Chemistry, from which I take the following extract:—

"The want of accommodation in my department has become more trying this year, because of the large number of laboratory pupils. In previous years I have only had about ten, this year there are 26. As regards the practical class there is room in the laboratory for some 16, while I have usually had over 70. To meet the difficulty, I have often made two students work on one bench, and have held the class either twice or thrice daily, whereby I have had twice or three times the work I ought to have had if my department were provided with proper

accommodation. The students also have been put to the greatest inconvenience, and their opportunities for information reduced to a minimum.

"This year my difficulties are far more grave. I have not known what to do with the laboratory pupils, who are entitled to work through the whole day. I have crammed them into the upstairs room which serves as my own laboratory and lecture-preparation room. They have overflowed into the lecture room itself, and into my retiring room, and then, as a last resource, I have allowed them to work in the laboratory of the practical class, with the proviso that they must turn out when that class meets. This they have to do, and it completely ruins their work, and their chances of passing their examinations creditably."

At the commencement of the summer session, on the 1st of May, 51 students entered for practical chemistry, 26 of whom were enrolled as laboratory pupils. I felt that unless some temporary provision were made for their accommodation our most promising school of practical chemistry would be ruined. I naturally applied to the Board of Public Works, and when my application failed, I succeeded in getting possession of a detached room, hitherto occupied by carpenters; and I have had it fitted up as a temporary laboratory. It only accommodates 24 students, however, so that even with it no less than 11 members of the summer class were still unprovided with proper space and appliances for practical study.

I trust the simple record of these facts will be sufficient to induce the House of Commons to vote the necessary funds for erecting chemical buildings in some degree worthy of the college, and of the vast practical importance of this department. Mr. Owen, the able Architect of the Board of Works, is fully aware of our wants. A few years ago he prepared plans for new buildings which were approved by His Excellency the Lord Lieutenant. But nothing has been done. Were those plans carried out I venture to affirm that this college would ere long become one of the most successful and useful chemical schools in the country.

Another point I feel bound to notice. The position of the chemical laboratory is most dangerous to the college. It is in the main building; and being overcrowded with students, containing necessarily large quantities of inflammable and explosive materials, and having its little furnaces and gas-jets almost continuously lighted, any accidental fire or slight explosion, against which it is extremely difficult to guard, might set fire to the whole college. I have repeatedly urged the propriety of removing the entire chemical department to a detached building; and Mr. Owen, agreeing with me, provided for this in the plans to which I have referred above. The recent calamitous fire which resulted in the destruction of University College, Aberystwith, has impressed me more deeply with a sense of the danger to which we are here exposed.

II. *Physics and Engineering.*—In order to give that efficient practical training required in the present day in the departments of natural philosophy and engineering, a fully furnished physical laboratory is absolutely necessary. There is none in the college,

and the professors are consequently crippled in their efforts to train their pupils. The number of purely engineering students is small, but would doubtless be increased could we present the important inducement of practical training in a laboratory; and besides, there were during the past session 112 students engaged in the study of the several branches of natural philosophy, including the principles of mechanics, hydrostatics, pneumatics, optics, statics, dynamics, electricity, and magnetism, including also the application of those principles to the various operations, a knowledge of which qualifies young men for entering successfully upon the work of life in a manufacturing community.

At the request of the professors of natural philosophy, engineering, and chemistry, I obtained the permission of His Excellency Earl Spencer, to apply a portion of the small balance lying to the credit of the college, in the purchase of a gas engine and dynamo. By their aid experiments will now be more easily made on brakes and arrangements for the transmission of power; and also in spectroscopic analysis, magnetism, and electricity,—all of which are necessary to complete courses of instruction in applied science. But here again the insufficiency of our buildings was felt. There being no physical laboratory, I was obliged to place the engine and dynamo in a small shed, and then to connect the dynamo, by a complicated system of long wires, with classrooms widely separated, and unsuitable for practical work.

III. *Natural History and Geology.*—I have to express my regret that, notwithstanding repeated applications to the Board of Works, the museum of natural history and geology remains in an unsatisfactory state. By the praiseworthy exertions of the curator, Professor Cunningham, it is well supplied with specimens of animals, plants, fossils, and minerals; but through want of space they are so closely packed in cases and drawers that it is all but impossible to make them available for teaching purposes. Dr. Cunningham complains of this serious hindrance, and his students also complain that they cannot reap full advantage from his prelections and practical demonstrations in biology, geology, and palæontology. Mr. Owen has recommended the construction of a metal gallery round the interior of the museum. It could be erected at the cost of a few hundred pounds, and would give space sufficient for the extra cases required.

IV. *The Medical School.*—In former reports I pointed out the urgent need for large additions in this department, and especially for anatomy and physiology. The class of practical anatomy, which during the past two years has averaged more than 200 students, met day after day in a room measuring only 75 feet by 25. Dr. Redfern stated to the Royal Commissioners:—

“I have not sufficient means of teaching those students what is absolutely required by the College of Surgeons, London, in physiology and histology. I teach a certain number, but my means are limited. Under the Act of Parliament, the college has an absolute claim on the Board of Works to furnish buildings; but the money has not been forthcoming, and we have not been able to get rooms. We had hoped that when the Government saw we had students, the least they could

do would be to put a roof over them. The teaching of histology and physiology is totally different now from what it formerly was, and the requirements of the student are very numerous in comparison with what they were."

This lack of space not only hinders thorough work in one of the most vitally important branches of medical study, but it is at present positively dangerous to the health of the students. By incessant watchfulness and care Professor Redfern has succeeded hitherto in preserving the health of his students, but it seems to me to be unfair to subject him and his large classes, year after year, to the risk of illness arising from a confined and tainted atmosphere. Students must pass a large portion of their time daily in the dissecting room, which ought, therefore, to be spacious and thoroughly ventilated.

We require a new room specially lighted and furnished for histological researches, for the examination of microscopic preparations, for demonstrations in morbid and comparative anatomy, and for descriptions of physiological and histological apparatus and methods. We require, in fact, a fully equipped physiological and histological laboratory. At present the professors are obliged to labour in small rooms and attics, inconveniently situated and imperfectly lighted. The plans prepared by Mr. Owen provide for the above wants; and I now again venture, very respectfully and very earnestly, to press for the immediate erection of the buildings we so much need. The estimated cost of the entire additions I have referred to above is small when compared with the sums recently voted for the enlargement of the Universities of Edinburgh and Glasgow, and for the laboratories of the Royal University of Ireland, which has no teaching functions. The whole estimate is only about £8,000.

THE CHAIR OF ENGINEERING.

At the commencement of the session the Chair of Engineering became vacant by the resignation of Professor Fuller, who had held office since 1873. His resignation was a source of deep regret to the students and to his brother professors, by whom his zealous labours, high culture, and genial disposition, were much appreciated. His place was filled by the appointment of Maurice Frederick Fitzgerald, Esq., a distinguished scholar and Graduate of Trinity College, Dublin, who has had large experience in practical engineering in England and Russia, as well as in Ireland. The appointment has been a most fortunate one for the College. Professor Fitzgerald has already proved himself to be a successful teacher, and he evidently possesses the rare faculty of inspiring his pupils with some of his own ardour and enthusiasm in his important profession.

UNIVERSITY HONOURS GAINED BY OUR STUDENTS.

I feel much pleasure in reporting that, notwithstanding the difficulties we have had to encounter, and the inadequacy of our teaching appliances, the progress of the College has been highly

satisfactory during the year. The students have taken distinguished places at the university examinations, as is shown by the following summary compiled from official returns.

The total number of students who passed the several examinations of the Royal University, omitting matriculation, for which pupils are prepared at school, not in this College, was 1,021; of whom 361, being 35·3 per cent., were from Belfast. The total number of Studentships, Exhibitions, and Medals awarded at those examinations was 89, of which Belfast gained 34, being 38·2 per cent. Among the honours gained by our students were many of the highest the University conferred; including one Studentship; one first class Exhibition with LL.B.; one (the only) Gold Medal with M.A.; four first and five second class Exhibitions with B.A.; three first and nine second class Exhibitions at the Undergraduate Examinations in Arts; two second class Exhibitions with M.B.; two first and two second class Exhibitions at the Undergraduate Medical Examinations; and two first and two second class Exhibitions at the Engineering Examinations. I insert a complete list of passes and honours in the Appendix, Table VII. B.

In addition to the above, our students gained the following high distinctions in the University of Cambridge:—

Alexander Larmor, Clare College, first class in the final part of the mathematical tripos; David A. Stewart, Caius College, sixth wrangler; H. D. Darbishire, St. John's College, sizarship, first place, exhibition and prize in classics; W. M.F. Orr, St. John's College, foundation scholarship.

In the Appendix, Table IX. I give a list of students of this College who have, since the foundation of the Royal University in 1881, obtained scholarships and other honours in the Universities of Oxford, Cambridge, London, and Dublin. These are convincing evidences of the continued efficiency of our professorial staff, and of the superior advantages of our systematic method of instruction. They show that the College is maintaining its high place as a seat of learning.

SCHOLARSHIP COMPETITION AND LADY STUDENTS.

The competition for College Scholarships, as well those endowed by public funds as those founded by private benefaction, was unusually keen during the past session. Upwards of one hundred candidates entered, and the answering was of a high order. Among the successful candidates were two young ladies, one of whom, Miss Alice Everett, took first place in the science division of the first year, and the other, Miss Florence A. Hamilton, took fourth place in the science division of the second year. This being the first occasion on which ladies competed for scholarships, and their eligibility being doubtful, the Council deemed it necessary to consult the law officers of the Crown. A case was

prepared, and submitted to the Attorney-General for Ireland, who advised that, according to the Statutes, women are ineligible to hold scholarships, or to claim any of the other rights of students. This decision I greatly regretted, as I was anxious in all possible ways to promote the higher education of women. I venture to express the hope that on application being made, Your Majesty may be graciously pleased to sanction the insertion of a new clause in the College Statutes authorizing the admission of women to the rights and privileges of students, as in the Royal University of Ireland, and the University of London.

It is now three years since, by a resolution of Council, women were permitted to enter the Arts classes. They have been earnest and enthusiastic students, and have fairly kept pace with the others. Miss Everett, who was successful at our Scholarship examinations, had previously gained a first-class exhibition at matriculation in the Royal University; and two months later she carried off one of the only two Mathematical Scholarships in the gift of that University. Two others of our lady students, Miss Alice M. Anderson and Miss Annie W. Haslett, took University Exhibitions of the second year; and Miss Hamilton took honours in mathematics at the First University Examination. In the College, at the closing examinations of the session, the lady students passed with distinction; and the Council regretted that they were by Statute prohibited from giving them the rewards to which their answering entitled them.

DISCIPLINE AND CONDUCT OF STUDENTS.

It is with sincere pleasure I am able to report, as I had the honour of reporting last year, that the discipline of the College during the session has been highly satisfactory. The conduct of the great body of the students has been exemplary, and their attention to collegiate work has, on the whole, been close and careful.

The Reports which the Deans have furnished to me are most favourable. The Rev. Dr. Busby, of the Church of Ireland, reports:—

“The students under my care have, during the session, conducted themselves with propriety and attention. At the beginning of the year I invited each student by letter, and by public notice in the Hall, to attend my lectures on religious subjects in the Natural History class room, on Thursdays, from one to two o'clock. I delivered a course of lectures on Christian Evidences, and held an examination at the close of the session. Seven competed—three of whom gained the high standard of 78 per cent. Wm. Ewart, Esq., M.P., kindly promised to award prizes.”

The Rev. Thomas Hamilton, M.A., of the Presbyterian Church of Ireland, reports:—

“During the session I endeavoured to discharge my duty to the students of my Church, to the best of my ability. In addition to private intercourse with them, I delivered a series of lectures in the class-room assigned to me in the College, on the book of the Acts. At the close I held an examination, and was able, through the kindness of

friends, to offer three prizes. The successful competitors gained respectively 90, 83, and 80 per cent. of marks. I had also a series of Sunday evening lectures in my Church, specially intended for the students under my charge. They were largely attended. As regards the conduct of the students, so far as it came under my observation, it was all that could be desired."

The Rev. Alexander Gordon, M.A., of the Non-Subscribing Presbyterian Church, reports:—

"Respecting the students of my denomination, I have only to observe that their conduct has been good, and their attendance upon their religious duties satisfactory."

The Rev. Oliver M'Cutcheon, of the Wesleyan Methodist Church, reports:—

"Immediately after the opening of the session, I received from the Registrar a list of the students of my denomination. I sought frequent opportunities of personal intercourse with them. So far as either my knowledge or information goes, I am happy to be able to bear unqualified testimony to their exemplary conduct."

The above extracts show that the important provisions of the College Charter with respect to the moral discipline and religious instruction of the students, have been faithfully carried out during the session. It must be a source of much satisfaction to parents that their sons, on entering this College, are commended by an express provision of the Charter, to "the moral care and spiritual charge" of clergymen who, while directly commissioned by the Crown, have received their nomination from, and enjoy the full confidence of, the heads of their respective Churches. I can bear personal testimony to the zeal with which the Deans discharge their responsible duties, and to the interest they take in the religious and moral welfare of the students.

THE QUEEN'S COLLEGES COMMISSION.

The Commissioners appointed by His Excellency the Lord Lieutenant visited the College on the 3rd, 4th, and 5th days of June, 1884. Their warrant directed them to inquire into, and report upon, the following points:—

- "1. What is the standard of education maintained in the College?"
- "2. In what mode honours and rewards are distributed among students, having regard to their numbers and the various branches of learning taught."
- "3. To what extent, and with what results, the students avail themselves of the advantages offered by the Royal University of Ireland."
- "4. As to the fees charged to the students."

The Commissioners were R. P. Carton, Esq., Q.C.; the Rev. Gerald Molloy, D.D., Rector of the Catholic University; George Johnstone Stoney, Esq., M.A., D.Sc., F.R.S.; Wm. Jack, Esq., M.A., LL.D., Professor of Mathematics in the University of Glasgow; and Deputy Surgeon-General J. A. Marston, M.D.

Their reports were presented to the Lord Lieutenant on the 23rd of February, 1885, and on the same day they appear to have

been handed to the *Freeman's Journal*, in which they were printed on the succeeding morning. They were not published, however, by order of Parliament, nor were they accessible to the public, until about six weeks afterwards. It was impossible therefore to tell whether the reports, as printed in the *Freeman*, were complete or authentic; and as the evidence on which they professed to be based was wholly suppressed by that journal, their fairness and accuracy could not be at once tested. I cannot refrain from expressing the opinion that this act of Dr. Molloy, who, upon a question being asked in the House of Commons, was obliged to acknowledge that he had furnished the reports to the *Freeman*, was a gross breach of official duty, and a grievous injustice to the Queen's Colleges.

There were two reports presented. I have learned their history from an authentic source, and it is a remarkable one. One report was drawn up by Doctors Stoney, Jack, and Marston; it was carefully considered and discussed in every stage by all the Commissioners, and it was signed by the three I have named. The other report was prepared in private by Mr. Carton and Dr. Molloy, or by one of them, but it was not submitted to, nor was it seen by, any of the other Commissioners until the Commission was dissolved, and until both reports were placed in the hands of the Lord Lieutenant. This extraordinary proceeding, as a matter of course, deprives the minority report of all official authority, and of any value which might otherwise have been attached to it.

The report of the majority is therefore the report of the Commission. It is a very carefully prepared document. The evidence tendered to the Commission is thoroughly sifted and tested by men of sound judgment, University training, and large experience in all departments of University work. The conclusions arrived at, and the recommendations given, deserve thoughtful and respectful consideration. Their important bearing upon the position and prospects of this College, and perhaps also upon the future of University Education in Ireland, warrants me, I think, in submitting a brief review.

With regard to the standard of education maintained in this College the Commissioners report most favourably. They state that the education given is in plan, scope, and cost adapted to the wants of the entire community. This is proved by the fact that in Belfast more than 4,000 students have been educated in thirty-three years, while "since the institution of the Queen's Colleges, the number of students receiving University education in Ireland appears to have been more than doubled."

They report that the Scholarships, though small in value and limited in number as compared with those of the teaching universities of England, Scotland, and Dublin, have given a decided impetus to higher education in the North of Ireland, and have contributed very materially to the training of large numbers of young men who have since attained to distinguished positions in Great Britain and her colonies and dependencies, and also in other countries. I handed in a list of our graduates to the Commission, containing, in as far as I was able to obtain the

necessary information, a record of the offices now held by those who have been specially successful, most of whom, it will be observed, were scholars of the College. It is right to note that I have only included those who graduated in the Queen's and Royal Universities. Many others of our students, as the Report of the Commission indicates, took Medical diplomas in the Licensing Bodies of the United Kingdom, and are now in practice as physicians or surgeons; others again entered upon business in various parts of the world, and have attained to posts of honour and usefulness; but of these no regular record has been kept. Referring to the list of graduates the Commissioners say:—

“We regard the list of distinctions presented by Belfast as records to which any College would be entitled to point with legitimate gratification.”

But the most striking testimony to our high standard of education presented to the Commission was that given in the evidence of Professors Larmor and Dougan. Professor Larmor was a student of this College from 1871 to 1876. In the latter year he entered Cambridge, taking a Scholarship; and in 1879 he became Senior Wrangler. In 1877 he entered the University of London, where he gained the Arnott Exhibition in the same year, and the University Scholarship in mathematics with his combined B.A. and B.Sc. in 1878. He is now Fellow of St. John's, Cambridge, and Professor of Natural Philosophy in Queen's College, Galway.

In reply to a question of the Commission, he said:—

“When I was an undergraduate myself I was not always first on the scientific side in the Queen's Colleges.” “You were first in every examination in Cambridge?—I was, in every examination in which I competed. I only state that to show it is not the case that there may have been one or two or three exceptionally good men (in Queen's). It is my decided impression that in my subsequent experience in England and elsewhere, I have not met with a more distinguished body of university students, for their numbers, than the students of the Queen's Colleges of the times of which I speak. I have always held that.”

“Dr. Stoney.—I particularly wish to ask Professor Larmor, as he passed such a brilliant career in Cambridge, whether he thinks it would be correct to treat his successes in that University as but slenderly due to the training he received in Queen's College, because there was an interval of three years between his passing out of the Queen's University and becoming Senior Wrangler in Cambridge?—In the first place, but for the Queen's College, Belfast, I should never have adopted the scholastic career at all. In the second place, when I left Belfast to go to Cambridge, I do not like to say exactly, but I consider that my scientific capacities were developed quite in the same kind of way as they were finally. It was mainly a matter of polishing up. I consider I had been taught in Belfast to such an extent that the rest of the work was rather a filling up of *lacunae* than adding to general principles. In fact I could not over-estimate the character of the mathematical and physical instruction in Belfast at the time I was there. I have always entertained the opinion very strongly, and that opinion is corroborated

by others." "There were at that time the same professors in those subjects in Belfast as now?—There were."

So much for the standard of mathematical and physical scholarship maintained in this College by Professors Purser and Everett, as testified to by their old pupil, a Senior Wrangler of Cambridge, and University Scholar of London.

I shall now give a few extracts from the evidence of Professor Dougan as to the standard of our classical scholarship. Professor Dougan was educated in Owens College, where he gained the first Fellowship; then in Cambridge where he graduated first class in the classical tripos; then in London where he took B.A. with first honours. He is now Fellow of St. John's, Cambridge, and professor of Latin in this College.

He was asked:—

"Would you be inclined to say that a student knows more or less when he comes out of Cambridge, or when he comes out of Queen's College?—When he is a B.A. our students know, and all along must know, a good deal more than an average passman in Cambridge." "You mentioned that you passed most of the examinations in the University of London. Would you be able to compare an average passman (of London) with an average passman B.A. of the Royal University, or with a man when he obtains a Queen's Sessional Certificate?—I think that an average passman in London is better than an average passman here." "Would you be able to compare a man who obtains honours in the London University with a man who obtains honours here?—I think that many of our honour students here are quite equal to the London honour students, and I am not sure that we have not rather more of them." "In proportion to the whole number of students?—Yes."

The Commissioners report that the training in the *Medical School* is in all respects admirable, but that the facilities for clinical instruction in the hospitals of Belfast are not quite satisfactory. This defect may be easily remedied. Judicious combination and united systematic training of students on the part of the medical staffs of the several hospitals, would make Belfast one of the most complete centres of clinical teaching in the country. We have ample materials; we have the highest professional talent in every department of medical and surgical investigation and practical operation; and we have hospitals for the special diseases of women and children, of the eye and ear, and for consumption and chronic ailments. All that we require is a little more system and organization among the medical men, and a closer connexion between them and the college professors. This would make our school wellnigh perfect.

The Commissioners visited the Class Rooms, Examination Hall, Library, Museums, Laboratories, and Botanic Garden. They were thus able to form a clear and correct judgment upon our teaching appliances; and they have given some good practical recommendations.

They strongly recommend "the erection of a suitable laboratory for practical chemistry, and the general improvement of the chemical buildings."

They recommend the enlargement of the natural history Museum, and of the Botanic Garden.

They recommend "that funds be provided for the payment of a limited number of assistants to professors who require them for the more efficient teaching of their classes." This would apply to the classes of Latin, Greek, Mathematics, Natural Philosophy, and Chemistry, each of which usually contains from 80 to 150 students. It would apply even more forcibly to the class of Practical Anatomy, which during past years has numbered from 200 to 300. It is evident that an assistant is needed for each of the above classes; while for anatomy there ought to be at least two assistants.

In the Queen's Colleges professors who do not devote their whole time to their professorial work are not entitled to pensions, however long they may have held office, and however efficient and distinguished may have been their services. With reference to this regulation the Commissioners say:—

"We think it is clear that the effect of the Treasury rule regarding retiring allowances to professors who are engaged in private practice, a rule which applies only or mainly to the Faculty of Medicine, and which cannot effect any considerable saving of public money, presses severely on all the Colleges. There are several professors in that Faculty whose cases would have to be dealt with under that rule, and the retirement of some of these gentlemen would be advantageous to the Colleges as places of medical education."

I have no hesitation in saying that if this recommendation for retiring pensions were carried into effect, and if the rules were adopted here which are in operation in the Scotch Universities, the cause of Medical Education would be advanced, and the prosperity of this College materially promoted.

REPORT OF MR. CARTON AND DR. MOLLOY.

The Report of Mr. Carton and Dr. Molloy differs widely in many respects from that of the Commission. In its main features it is a repetition of letters and reports published by Dr. Molloy in the *Freeman's Journal* before the Commission was appointed. The strange history of this report, to which I have already adverted, the manner in which its authors examined some of the witnesses while they refused to hear others, the nature of the evidence on which they chiefly rely, and of that which they controvert or practically set aside, leave on my mind the painful impression that they must have been influenced by strong prejudice against the Colleges, and that they did not exercise that strict impartiality which ought to characterize Royal Commissioners, and which alone would inspire confidence in their conclusions. Had they submitted their report to the other Commissioners, or consulted them in reference to it, which it seems to me they ought to have done as a matter of official etiquette, then, I venture to think, erroneous statements would have been corrected, and some singular and crude conclusions would have been avoided. There appears to be throughout the document a sustained effort to minimize the work done in the Colleges, and the

successes of the students. This was to be expected from Dr. Molloy's known opinions, and previous attacks upon the Colleges. The sudden and unauthorized publication of his report also showed, only too clearly, the spirit in which it was framed, and the object he had in view.

While I feel bound in justice to make these criticisms, I must at the same time admit that the report is less unfair to Belfast than to the other Colleges. It grants, but with ill-concealed reluctance, that the standard of education here is "fairly good;" that, from the large number who compete for our Scholarships, "men could be selected fairly entitled to this distinction;" and that, on the whole, the College meets the wants and enjoys the sympathy of the Presbyterian community. With regard to the distinguished position taken by our Students in the great universities, the report has this sneering comment:—

"Some of the best students, after taking their B.A. or M.A. went up to Oxford, Cambridge, or Dublin, and, entering there as Freshmen, gained various distinctions during *their subsequent University career* . . . this does not prove that the standard of education maintained is higher than the standard of a good school."

The report carefully suppresses the fact that every one who enters those universities, whatever may have been his previous attainments, however distinguished he may have been in any other university, must enter as a Freshman. Dr. Tait, for instance, the Snell Exhibitioner from Glasgow University, and one of the most accomplished classical scholars of his time, entered Oxford as a Freshman. The report also states, with apparent deliberation, that our students, "entering as Freshmen, gain distinctions during *their subsequent University career*." Is this the whole truth? Is it a fair statement? Was not the fact before them that Mr. Allen, Mr. Larmor, Mr. Stewart, and numerous others of our students, gained the distinctions, not only in their *subsequent University career*, but on entrance, immediately after leaving this College? Such statements are, in my opinion, unworthy of men of education, much more of men holding the high judicial office of Royal Commissioners.

With regard to the carefully framed allegation that this College is Presbyterian, the Royal Charter which was in the hands of the Commissioners, the detailed statistics which I laid before them in my Annual Report, and the concurrent testimony of the witnesses examined, were directly opposed to such a view. The allegation would almost seem to have been worded on purpose to mislead the public mind. The College is in no sense Presbyterian. It is open, as the two Commissioners knew full well, on perfectly equal terms to all sects. The various denominations of Protestants enter it in large numbers because it is in their midst, and gives a sound University education. Some Roman Catholics also enter it, and among them I can point to several of our most distinguished students, and to one of our most eminent professors. The Catholic laity are not opposed to the College; but the Hierarchy have, unfortunately for them-

selves, and for the best interests of their people, put a ban upon it. The ban, however, has not been altogether effective, as the following statistics, which I placed in the hands of the Commissioners, satisfactorily show:—Total students enrolled from the foundation of the College to 1883, 4,074; Presbyterians, 2,498; Church of Ireland, 830; Roman Catholics, 234; Methodists, 192; Others, 320. I give the detailed statistics, arranged for each year, in the Appendix, Table II.

It is with no little regret I have felt myself compelled to criticise the Report of two Royal Commissioners, appointed specially to inquire into the state of the College. My only object is to defend the College against damaging statements and insinuations, which I believe to be alike unfounded and unfair. The College was established and endowed "for the better advancement of learning among all classes of Her Majesty's subjects in Ireland." It is the right and the duty of the Government and of Parliament to inquire into its condition, and to ascertain whether it has succeeded or failed in the object for which it was established. But the inquiry ought to be fair and impartial. I believe I have shown that from the first the College has been successful. It has prospered in spite of the bitter opposition of certain parties, and in the face of many difficulties. Its lists of four thousand students, and fourteen hundred graduates, are palpable evidences that it has done a great educational work in Ireland, and that it is deserving of the approval and the continued support of the nation.

VISIT OF THEIR ROYAL HIGHNESSES THE PRINCE AND PRINCESS OF WALES, AND PRINCE ALBERT VICTOR.

Their Royal Highnesses the Prince and Princess of Wales, and Prince Albert Victor, honoured the College with a visit during the session. They were received and welcomed with that enthusiastic loyalty which has ever distinguished our professors and students. On the evening of their arrival the students hired a steamer, had it brilliantly illuminated, and proceeded down the loch to the Yacht *Osborne*, to tender their first greetings to the Royal Visitors. They also erected a triumphal arch within the College grounds, as a token of homage and devotion to their beloved Queen, and to the Heir to the Throne.

The visit took place on Friday, the 24th of April. Their Royal Highnesses were received in the great Hall by the President and Professors, the Visitors of the college, the Deans, the Mayor of Belfast, and about seven hundred students and graduates, together with a distinguished company of strangers. The following address was read by the President:—

TO THEIR ROYAL HIGHNESSES THE PRINCE AND PRINCESS OF WALES.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR ROYAL HIGHNESSES,

We, the President and Professors of Queen's College, Belfast, beg to tender to your Royal Highnesses a loyal and heartfelt welcome on this your first visit to our College.

The College was incorporated by Royal Charter in the year 1846. It was opened in 1849; and in that year Her Majesty the Queen honoured it with a visit, accompanied by His Royal Highness the Prince Consort, whose great interest in the advancement of education was universally known and appreciated.

It is with feelings of most profound satisfaction we now receive your Royal Highness, the Son of our Queen and Heir to the Throne. We have observed with pride and thankfulness that, like your Illustrious Father, your Royal Highness is ever forward to encourage the study of Science, Literature, and Art, and to promote the practical education of the people; and we trust that your visit to Belfast, and to our College, will tend to advance the more thorough scientific and technical training of the inhabitants of this great centre of industry.

We very specially welcome your Royal Highness, our honoured Princess, to our country and our College. The fame of your noble and generous acts has long since filled the land. Your untiring efforts to further all that is good, and pure, and elevating—your true womanly sympathy, like that of our beloved Queen, with suffering and bereavement, have touched and won the hearts of the whole nation.

Her Majesty the Queen was pleased, on the occasion of Her visit, to express the hope that this College might fulfil the purpose for which it was founded;—"The better advancement of learning among all classes in Ireland." The wish so graciously expressed has been realized. More than four thousand students of all classes have already been trained here. Nearly fifteen hundred have graduated, very many of whom now fill positions of high trust and distinction in this and other lands.

It has been our constant aim to give our students a sound training in the several departments of knowledge, so as to fit them for the duties of life. We have also endeavoured, and we believe with unflinching success, to instil into their minds those feelings of devotion to the person of our Queen, of loyalty to the Throne and Constitution, and of respect for law and order, without which the nation cannot prosper, and the people cannot enjoy peace and happiness.

We feel pleasure in informing your Royal Highnesses that this was the first University College in Ireland to admit women to its classes.

We hail the presence of your Royal Highnesses in our College as a cherished token of the continued approval and favour of our Queen and of Her Royal House. We have prospered hitherto; and we venture to hope that this visit will mark the commencement of a yet more prosperous era in our history. It will stimulate us to increased exertion; it will fill us all, professors and students alike, with greater zeal in the service of our God, our Queen, and our country.

His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales replied :—

"Mr. President and Professors of Queen's College, Belfast,—I thank you very cordially for your address and for the greeting which you have given the Princess of Wales and myself here to-day. You rightly estimate the great interest which I take in the practical education of the people, the promotion of which I learned from my lamented father to keep ever prominently before me.

"I rejoice to hear from you of the success which has attended your labours, and the career in all parts of the world of those whom your training has done so much to fit for the struggles and difficulties of life. And it gratifies me to observe the progress of an Institution to which all classes have free access, and in which upon all equally earnest and painstaking attention is bestowed.

"The Princess of Wales desires that I will thank you for the especially kind allusions which you have made to her. You have not exaggerated the anxiety which she feels to promote in every way open to her the happiness and alleviate the sufferings of the people of this realm.

"Before concluding I wish to return our hearty and sincere thanks to our young friends, whom I see before me, for the kind feeling that prompted them to come out on the waters of the Loch last night and give us so warm a welcome."

By the gracious permission of Her Royal Highness, Miss Everett presented a bouquet to the Princess of Wales, on behalf of her fellow lady Students, "in grateful recognition of the interest Her Royal Highness has shown in the education of women."

Their Royal Highnesses thereafter inscribed their names in the College Album.

The cheering words addressed by the Prince of Wales to the assembled professors and students will be long remembered and gratefully cherished. They are calculated to encourage us all in the right discharge of our important duties, and to inspire us besides with still additional confidence in the efficient maintenance of the College.

In the Appendix I have inserted Tables showing the number of students enrolled during the session, the number of lectures delivered by each professor, the degrees and honours gained by our students in the Royal and other Universities, lists of the Professors and Officers with their emoluments, an abstract of the Bursar's Accounts, and a full list of our Students who graduated in the Queen's and Royal Universities, with the honours and distinctions subsequently gained by them.

1847. Presented by Charles Davis, Esq., a large oil painting of the Assassination of Peter Martyr, by Atkins, being a copy of the original painting by Titian.

— Presented by Professor Craik, a portrait of Confucius.

1851. The Governors of the Armagh Observatory, with the sanction of Her Majesty, transferred to the Queen's College, the Transit Instrument and Astronomical Clock, which were formerly in the Observatory at Kew.

The Lords of the Admiralty, on the recommendation of the Astronomer Royal of England, acceded to an application from Professor Wilson for transferring to the College a Mural Circle by Jones, which had been in use at the Cape of Good Hope.

For the reception of these instruments an Observatory was erected on the College grounds, the expense having been defrayed by subscription.

1854. Presented by W. P. Wilson, Esq., M.A., former Professor of Mathematics in the College, a Bust of Sir Isaac Newton.

1855. Presented by Robert H. Lynn, Esq., London, an oil portrait of James the First of England, when a child, an oil portrait of George Buchanan, and an oil portrait of John Milton.

1860. An oil portrait of Hugh Carlisle, M.D., former Professor of Anatomy and Physiology in the College; presented by the subscribers.

1864. Given by R. M. Wilson, Esq., an Exhibition of Twenty Pounds to be conferred annually upon one or more of the most deserving unsuccessful candidates for a Scholarship of the First Year.

This Exhibition was awarded for eleven years.

1864. Given by the Royal Academical Institution, Belfast, two Exhibitions of Five Pounds each, to be conferred annually upon students from that Institution who have taken the highest places in the Literary and Science Divisions, at the Examination for Scholarships of the First Year.

1866. Given by John Charters, Esq., an Exhibition, value Fifteen Pounds, and two Exhibitions, value Ten Pounds each, in the Literary Division of the Faculty of Arts; also one Exhibition, value Fifteen Pounds, and two, value Ten Pounds each, in the Science Division of the Faculty of Arts, to be called the "Charters' Exhibitions," and to be annually awarded during ten years, at the Examinations for the Literary and Scientific Scholarships of the first year, to students who, during at least one year previous to their entrance into college, have been in continuous attendance at the Royal Academical Institution, and who have attained the standard of excellence required at the Junior Scholarship Examinations. Also, an Exhibition, value Fifty Pounds, tenable for one year, to be called the "Charters' Medical Exhibition," to be annually awarded during ten years, in connexion with the Belfast School of Medicine, by the Trustees of the "Charters' Educational Fund."

This Exhibition to be conferred by a Special Examination in Medicine and Surgery, chiefly of a practical character, and to be open to any Medical Student to compete, provided he does not possess either a Medical or Surgical qualification.

— An oil portrait of William Burden, M.D., former Professor of Midwifery in the College; presented by the subscribers.

1868. Bequeathed by Robert Sullivan, Esq., LL.D., Barrister-at-Law, the sum of Four Thousand Pounds for the endowment of Three Scholarships in the Queen's College, Belfast, to be called the Sullivan Scholarships, two of them to be restricted to candidates who shall have acted as Teachers or Assistant Teachers in Irish National Schools for at least two years, and one of them to candidates who shall have been educated in the Royal Academical Institution, Belfast, for at least three years.

These Scholarships are tenable for three years.

1869. Given by William Coates, Esq., a prize, value Thirty Pounds, to be called "The Coates Prize," and to be awarded in the Department of Engineering to the best candidate in a set of Examinations, to be held in the Third term of each Session, and to comprise:—

1. Civil and Mechanical Engineering.
2. Office and Field Work, including Geometrical Drawing and Surveying, Levelling and Measuring, together with any two of the following subjects:—
3. Natural Philosophy applied.
4. Analytical Chemistry.
5. Geology.
6. Mathematics, including specially the elementary principles of the Differential Calculus.

Competition for this Prize in each Session to be open to all persons who are at the time, or were in the preceding year, Students of Engineering in Queen's College, Belfast, going through the Third Session of their Engineering Course, in regular order, or going through the Session which, under the sanction of the Council, in special cases shall stand instead of a Third Session of the Queen's College Engineering Course.

This prize was awarded for four years.

1869. A Bust of the Rev. P. Shulldham Henry, D.D., late President of the College, presented by the Professors and other subscribers.
1871. An oil portrait of George L. Craik, LL.D., former Professor of History and English Literature in the College, and also a photograph group of some of the Professors; presented by Messrs. Marcus Ward & Co.
1871. Bequeathed by John Porter, Esq., the sum of Three Thousand One Hundred and Ten Pounds Eight Shillings and Four Pence for the endowment of Two Scholarships in Queen's College, Belfast, to be called "The Porter Scholarships." These scholarships are each of the annual value of Fifty Pounds, and are tenable for two years. They are open to undergraduates of not less than two years standing.
1873. A deed was executed by William Dunville, Esq., establishing the "Sorella Trust."

This deed, which also provides funds for other educational purposes not connected with the College, endows two Studentships in Queen's College, Belfast, to be called "The Dunville Studentships." These studentships are open to any person who is recognised by the Council or other Governing body of Queen's College, Belfast, as a student of three or more years standing in any Faculty, provided that the last of the three or more years which give such standing, has been spent in Queen's College, Belfast, and has been the year preceding, or the year but one preceding the examination.

They are given, one, for the encouragement of the study of Mathematical and Physical Science, the other, for the encouragement of the study of Natural Science, in alternate years. Each person obtaining a Studentship receives £45 for the first year, and £100 for the second year.

1873. Given by the Widow and Children of the late John Robinson Mc'Clean, Esq., Civil Engineer, London, through the hands of the Rev. P. S. Henry, D.D., the late President, the sum of Five Hundred Pounds, to be expended in the purchase of Scientific works for the Library of Queen's College, Belfast.
1874. Given by the Methodist College, Belfast, one Exhibition, value Ten Pounds, to be awarded annually to the highest answerer among students from the Methodist College who have obtained Literary Scholarships of the first year in Queen's College, Belfast; and another Exhibition, also value Ten Pounds, to the highest answerer among students from the Methodist College, who have obtained Science Scholarships of the First Year in the same College.

Anno.

No Student can obtain either of these Exhibitions, who has not been at least one year in attendance at the Methodist College previously to his Matriculating in Queen's College, Belfast.

These Exhibitions were awarded for eight years.

1876. Given by the Reverend Arthur Hercules Pakenham, for the endowment of two Scholarships in Queen's College, Belfast, one to be called the "Sir Hercules Pakenham Scholarship," and the other the "Emily Lady Pakenham Scholarship," the sum of One Thousand Pounds, invested in five bonds of £100 each of the Moscow Jaroslaw Railway Company, and five bonds of £100 each of the Charkoff Azov Railway Company.

These Scholarships are given in alternate years, are each tenable for two years, and are open to all students under 20 years of age, matriculated or non-matriculated, on their first entrance into the College.

1877. Given by an anonymous donor, Ten Pounds, to provide for an Entrance Prize of Five Pounds, to be awarded for proficiency in French.

This prize was awarded for two years.

1878. An oil portrait of Alexander Gordon, M.D., Professor of Surgery in the College; presented by the subscribers.

1880. The subscribers to a testimonial given to Dr. MacDouall on his retirement from the Professorship of Greek, presented to the College, in addition to a portrait of Dr. MacDouall to be placed in the Examination Hall, a collection of Classical and Oriental Works of the value of £275, selected from the library of Dr. MacDouall, to form the nucleus of a department of the Library to be called "The MacDouall Library."

1881. The sum of One Thousand Seven Hundred and Ninety-two Pounds Seven Shillings was raised by public subscription, for the establishment of a Scholarship to commemorate the distinguished services, rendered to this College and to Chemical Science, by Dr. Thomas Andrews, F.R.S., the late Vice-President.

At the same time a full-length Oil Portrait of Dr. Andrews was placed in the Examination Hall of the College.

1882. The sum of Eight Hundred and Seventy-five Pounds Six Shillings, in New Three per Cent. Government Stock, being a portion of the bequest of the late Lord Blayney, was transferred to this College by the Queen's University.

1882. A Medal, to be awarded annually, was founded with a portion of the residue of the Peel Fund of the late Queen's University.

1882. An Oil Portrait of William Nesbitt, M.A., former Professor of Latin in the College; presented by the Subscribers.
