TO THE QUEEN'S MOST EXCELLENT MAJESTY.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR MAJESTY.

In accordance with the provisions of the Act of Parliament founding the Queen's Colleges, I have the honour of submitting to Your Majesty the following Report of the proceedings and condition of the Queen's College, Galway, for the Session 1893-94.

In the returns, which are furnished every year in the Appendix to the Report, detailed information will be found of the condition and working of the College in each year since it was opened for the reception of Students in 1849.

During the present Session one hundred and twenty Students have been attending lectures, distributed as follows :—

In the Faculty of Arts the Students numbered	59 ;
In the Faculty of Medicine	46 ;
In the Faculty of Law	8 ;
In the Department of Engineering	22.

At the Examinations of the Royal University during the past year, some of the highest distinctions in the Faculties of Arts, Medicine, and Engineering were obtained by Students of this College; including a Special Prize of £60 for distinguished answering in the department of Mathematical and Experimental Physics at the M.A. Examination. I may further mention that, since the date of my last Report, several men who had proceeded from this College have attained important positions in other Universities and in different branches of the Public Service. I only notice those who, having received their entire undergraduate education here, are in the fullest sense Galway men:—

Sir Antony P. Macdonnell, K.C.S.I. was nominated a member of the Council of the Viceroy of India; Mr. Thomas Emerson, B.A., obtained a place in the Civil Service of India; Dr. W. H. Thompson was appointed Professor of Physiology in Queen's College, Belfast; Mr. W. Kennedy was awarded two Gold Medals in Classics and in Logic and Ethics, respectively, at the Degree Examination, also the Berkeley Medal for Greek, in the Dublin University; Mr. W. Cannon, M.A. having held for two years a Scholarship for Research under Her Majesty's Commissioners for the Exhibition of 1851, has been appointed Lecturer and Demonstrator in Physics at the Owens College, Manchester; The Commissioners have just nominated Mr. McClelland to a similar Scholarship for 1894-95; Mr. O'Hara and Mr. Barniville obtained by competition the rank of District Inspector of Constabulary.

With regard to the Medical School I have to report that the Professors have been engaged for some years in the arduous task of counteracting the check which their School, in common with the other Medical Schools of the Queen's University, experienced in the dissolution of that University in 1882. They hope by unremitting attention to the efficient working of every department,—especially to that practical and laboratory work which is becoming so important a feature of the modern Medical curriculum,—to maintain in the open competitive system of the Royal University the good repute which their School enjoyed when it was a constituent part of the Queen's University, and favoured by its residential conditions. They are encouraged by the fact that the highest distinction in Medicine open in the Royal University—the “Travelling Scholarship”—was twice awarded to Students of this College, as well as by a record of successes in fair proportion

to relative numbers at examinations for Commissions in the Army, Navy, and Indian services. The progress of the Medical School has been materially aided by the facilities now afforded by the new Galway Hospital, founded by Act of Parliament in 1892. Arrangements have been made by the Medical Professors for the instruction of Students at the Union and Fever Hospitals, and at the Galway Dispensary. The opportunities thereby afforded have placed the Clinical teaching on a satisfactory basis, and have received the recognition of the Licensing Bodies in Medicine.

The Department of Engineering, to which I referred with satisfaction in my last Report, has maintained its progress during the present session—the Students numbering twenty-two. The extension of Railways and other works of public utility now proceeding in the West of Ireland afford large facilities for that practical training which must always form a most important part of the education of an Engineering Student, and which can best qualify him to grapple successfully with those difficult problems that will frequently arise in the future practice of his profession. I fully appreciate the importance of the works to which I have adverted, for the promotion of Collegiate interests; but I would fain regard them also in a larger and more generous light, as calculated to advance that material and industrial development which is universally recognised as the primary and pressing need of this province.

Before the commencement of the Session, Dr. Allman, F.R.S., resigned the Professorship of Mathematics after a tenure of nearly forty years; vacating at the same time the office of Bursar and his seat on the College Council, which he had occupied for thirty years. The Council and the Corporate Body placed on record their deep sense of the services which in these various capacities he had rendered to the College. Mr. Alfred C. Dixon, Senior Wrangler, Fellow of Trinity College, Cambridge, succeeded Dr. Allman in the Chair of Mathematics.
