TO THE QUEEN'S MOST EXCELLENT MAJESTY.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR MAJESTY.

In accordance with the provisions of the Act of Parliament founding the Queen's Colleges, I have the honour of submitting to Your Majesty the following Report of the proceedings and condition of the Queen's College, Galway, for the Session 1894-95.

In the returns, which are furnished every year in the Appendix to the Report, detailed information will be found of the condition and working of the College in each year since it was opened for the reception of Students in 1849.

During the present Session one hundred and fourteen Students have been attending lectures, distributed as follows:—

In the Faculty of Arts the Students numbered	. . .	48;
In the Faculty of Medicine	54;
In the Faculty of Law	4;
In the Department of Engineering	25.

At the Examinations of the Royal University during the past year, some of the highest distinctions in the Faculties of Arts, Medicine, and Engineering, were obtained by Students of this College.

The condition of the Medical School, to which I called attention in my last report, continues to be satisfactory. A larger number of Students attended in the past Session than in that of 1893-94; and, although the increase was not a large one, it is worth mentioning in view of the fact that the new Medical Curriculum,—increased from four to five years, by order of the Medical Council,—is now in operation. The returns from many other Schools show a falling off, apparently from this cause.

The Professors of the Faculty of Medicine continue to act as Physicians and Surgeons of the Galway Hospital. Their services are rendered freely; and it is not too much to say that their action confers an obligation not only on the College but on the community at large. The Travelling Scholarship in Medicine of the Royal University, value £100, has been awarded to Mr. Robert Allen, M.B., who is also a Scholar of the College. This high distinction has been conferred on four occasions since the foundation of the University; and on three of these the successful candidate was a Student of this College. As the competition is open to all Medical Graduates of the University, the record is creditable to the teaching of the Medical Professors here, as well as to their efforts to stimulate students to devote themselves to the highest branches of Medical study.

Lectures on Practical Pharmacy were delivered for the first time this Session, temporary arrangements having been made to provide Laboratory accommodation for the Students in that Class. Some alterations in the class-room, approved by the Council, have been considered necessary in order that Students should have the full advantage of practical instruction in Pharmacy, as well as convenient access to the Materia Medica Museum.

The introduction of Electric Power into the Physical Laboratories, and the extension of these Laboratories by the Board of Works, are important additions to the efficiency of a growing department.

The increase in the number of Students attending the Classes

in Practical Chemistry,—which is double of the number in attendance two years ago,—has made the extension of the Chemical Laboratory a matter of urgent necessity. There is also pressing need of a larger Biological Laboratory in the department of Natural History. I have submitted requisitions to the Board of Public Works, who, I trust, will give them immediate attention.

The Department of Engineering, to which I referred with satisfaction in former Reports, has maintained its progress during the present Session; the Students numbering twenty-four. This progress, it may be hoped, will keep pace with the material and industrial development of the province.

The extension of knowledge by the pursuit of original research has not been neglected. The following Papers have been communicated to Scientific Societies:—To the Physical Society, by Professor Anderson, M.A., and J. A. M'Clelland, M.A., "On the Temperature of Maximum Density of Water, and its Coefficient of Expansion in the neighbourhood of this Temperature"; to the Royal Society, by Professor Dixon, M.A., "On the Singular Solutions of Simultaneous Ordinary Differential Equations and the Theory of Congruencies." This Paper is about to appear in the *Philosophical Transactions*. Also, from Owens College, Manchester, by William Gannon, M.A., late Exhibition Scholar of this College, "On Copper Electrolysis *in Vacuo*," and, in conjunction with Professor Schuster, "On a Determination of the Specific Heat of Water in terms of the International Electric Units." Professor Dixon has also contributed to Mathematical Science by a book on Elliptic Functions.

The Council and Corporate Body of the College have approved of the admission of Women to all College privileges.

In former Reports I made reference to several members of the Public Service who had proceeded from the class-rooms of this College to enter on those careers in which they have shown eminent capacity as administrators and in the higher walks of statesmanship. On the present occasion I may be permitted to

add to the list two cases of recent date:—Sir Anthony P. Macdonnell, D.Litt., K.C.S.I., has been placed on the Council of the Viceroy of India, and Mr. W. Llewellyn Lewis, M.A., has been raised to the Judicial Bench in Trinidad.
