MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY,

I have the honour to lay before your Excellency the Annual Report on the condition and progress of the University.

The total number of persons who presented themselves at the various Academical Examinations of the University during the year 1888, was 3,130, being an increase of 24 on the year 1887.

Former Reports have referred specially to the distinctions which the women Students of the University have achieved for themselves, and I am glad to be able again to speak on this subject with undiminished satisfaction. The Appendix to this Report contains Tables giving all important details connected with the Examinations held in 1888, for both male and female candidates. I have also added a Table showing the Academic progress, in the various Faculties, made by Students matriculated in 1881 to 1887 inclusive.

Since my last Report two vacancies have occurred on the Senate, one by the expiration of the term for which Dr. Maguire was elected, and the other by the resignation of Dr. Whitla. The former vacancy was filled up by the election by Convocation of Rev. Matthew Leitch, M.A., and on the 9th April Convocation will proceed to elect a person to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Dr. Whitla.

I am glad to say that our Laboratories are nearly completed, and that the formation of our Library is proceeding satisfactorily.

4 Seventh Report of the Royal University of Ireland.

There were two public meetings of the University in 1888. The first was of a purely formal character, and was held on the 18th day of May, for the purpose of admitting to their degrees the candidates who had passed at the Medical Examinations held a short time previously.

The usual annual meeting of the University to confer degrees in the several faculties, and to declare the distinctions obtained by candidates at the Honour Examinations, was held on 31st October.

In conformity with the provisions of the Act of Parliament, 44 and 45 Vic., chap. 52, the accounts of the receipts and expenditure of the University, with the corresponding vouchers and other documents, are rendered quarterly to the Controller and Auditor-General, who submits an annual report and abstract to Parliament.

APPENDIX II.

SEVENTH ANNUAL MEETING OF THE ROYAL UNIVERSITY OF IRELAND.

OCTOBER 31st, 1888.

The Seventh Annual Meeting of the Royal University of Ireland was held on October 31st, 1888.

Lord Emly, Vice-Chancellor of the University, opened the proceedings with the following address ;---

Ladies and Gentlemen-I am happy to see by this crowded room the deep interest that is taken in the Royal University, and I am happy to be able to inform you that its progress during the last year has been most satisfactory. For the first time the number of candidates who passed the Degree Examination has enabled us, having regard to the provisions in our statutes, to award the full number of Exhibitions assigned to the Bachelor of Arts Examination. While the number of those who successfully passed the Matriculation Examination last year was only 580, this year 603 have passed. I am sorry to say that in that examination the number of candidates who presented themselves and were not successful in both years was very great. I hope I am not infringing on the prerogatives of the masters of the preparatory schools when I venture to ask them to be a little more careful than they have been as yet as to the qualifications of the candidates they send up for that examination. It has been reported to me by one of the examiners that in English grammar and geography a large proportion obtained less than 100 out of a maximum of 600 marks. One man who was asked some question about the anomalous verbs, answered-" If you will explain to me the meaning of the word 'anomalous' I will answer your question." Another placed St. Petersburg in the same longitude with Amsterdam; and a third-I suppose he must have been a man who regarded the fitness of things rather than fact-informed his examiner that the Orange River was in the North of Ireland. Next year five studentships of the value of £300 each will be offered for competition. The Senate are of opinion that the present system of Fellowships is not satisfactory, and taking into account the hopes that have been raised among the students by the idea that they might obtain these Fellowships by competition, the Standing Committee are at present considering a scheme for the purpose of giving, either by newly-constituted Fellowships or otherwise, substantial prizes to the most distinguished students of this University, subject of course to due provision being made that the income of the teaching colleges is not in any way interfered with. In the course of a very few months we shall be provided with the nucleus of a good library. We have purchased for the medical department a valuable collection, which consists of the following-I. Drawings and Paintings .- One thousand illustrations of disease taken from living patients or from post-mortem preparations. These

are executed by Messrs. Connolly, Kirwan, Mackey, and Burnside. II. Casts .- Five hundred casts of common and rare accidents, tumours, and other diseased conditions. Many of these are the personal work of Robert Smith. III. Specimens in Glass Jars .- More than five hundred specimens illustrating the various forms of medical and surgical Most of these constitute the materials upon which the disease. original works and observations of Corrigan, Cheyne, Robert Smith, Carmichael, Adams, and M'Dowel were founded. I have mentioned the question of Fellowships. They were established for the purpose of indirectly aiding unendowed education. Experience has shown that the results obtained have not been satisfactory. But even were it otherwise, the sum for bringing unendowed colleges to a level with endowed colleges was miserably inadequate, and the result of this inequality is constantly For instance, at our last B.A. examination out of 57 showing itself. candidates from endowed colleges, 10 got first-class honours; whereas out of 136 candidates from unendowed colleges and private tuition only 3 got first-class honours. The Senate, under these circumstances. have expressed their opinion that serious injury will result from further delay in making such further permanent provision for teaching colleges in connection with the University as will lead to the advancement of higher education in Ireland, and have appointed a deputation, consisting of the Right Hon. Dr. Ball, the Right Rev. Monsignor Neville, the Rev. Dr. Porter, and myself, to urge this matter upon Her Majesty's Government at such time as may be deemed expedient. In mentioning, as I ventured to do, the shortcomings of this University, it would be grievously unjust to its founders if I did not recognize also the enormous advantages it has conferred on the country. I recollect that when I was in the House of Commons, Sir Lyon Playfair, and many other distinguished men, in declaiming on the subject night after night, used to assert that those who were excluded by their conscientious convictions from availing themselves of the means of obtaining degrees in universities which existed before this University was founded, did not wish for university education, or, even if they did, were not fit for it. Now, let me test that prophecy by our experience. Young as this University is, it has this year had 3,130 candidates for its examinations, and of these, in Arts alone, 173 came from the endowed colleges and 542 from unendowed colleges or private study. Thus, 542 students are receiving higher education who would have been deprived of it if this University did not exist. As you well know, in every one of the colleges preparing for this University an enormous change has taken There has been more energy-there have place since its institution. been a greater number of subjects taught-there has been more scholarship; and as an instance of that I may mention that it appears in the report of the examiners that the late examinations show a great improvement in Greek composition. A new college that I happen to take a particular interest in has been founded at Mungret, in the South of Ireland, and is, I believe, the only Catholic college, outside Dublin, which confines itself altogether to university education. It has magnificent buildings, ample lecture halls, and one of the most beautiful chapels I think in Ireland. At our last examinations the success of its students was remarkable. We owe, therefore, a deep debt of gratitude to the founders of this University. We owe a special debt to The O'Conor Don, who first forced the question of higher education on the attention of the Government of the day, to the late Lord Cairns, and to the other distinguished men who brought in the Bill and framed the Act on which this University was founded.

Dr. J. Creed Meredith, one of the secretaries of the University, then read the list of successful candidates for degrees, &c. As the names of the candidates were called, they were presented by Dr. Dunne, the other secretary, to the Vice-Chancellor, and were admitted by him to their respective degrees.
