MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY.

I have the honour to submit the Annual Report on the con-

dition and progress of the University.

The total number of persons who presented themselves at the various Academical Examinations of the University during the year 1889, was 2,970. Care has been taken by the Senate to maintain the high efficiency of the Examinations, and with a view to this they have found it essential to increase the number of Examiners.

Former Reports have referred specially to the distinctions which the women Students of the University have achieved for themselves, and I am glad to be able again to speak on this subject with undiminished satisfaction. The Appendix to this Report contains Tables giving all important details connected with the Examinations held in 1889, for both male and female candidates. A Table has also been added showing the Academic progress, in the various Faculties, made by Students matriculated in 1881 to 1888 inclusive.

At the time of forwarding my last Report a vacancy existed on the Senate owing to the resignation of Dr. Whitla; this vacancy was filled up by the election by Convocation of Thomas Sinclair, M.D. I regret to have to inform you that since the date of my last Report six vacancies have occurred on the Senate, caused by the deaths of the Rev. J. L. Porter, D.D.; the Earl of Granard, K.P.; the Right Rev. Monsignor Neville, D.D.; the Right Hon. Arthur M.M. Kavanagh; Rev. Thomas Witherow, D.D.; and Sir Robert Kane, F.R.S. Three of these vacancies have been filled up by the appointment of the Right Hon. Christopher Palles, LL.D., Chief Baron of the Exchequer; Rev. Gerald Molloy, D.D.; and Rev. Thomas Hamilton, D.D.; and another has been filled up by election by Convocation of Edward Cuming, M.A. Two vacancies still exist.

Commencement has been made in the formation of a Library, and considerable progress has been made in the equipment of the Museums and Laboratories; and with a view of affording adequate accommodation for the valuable collections acquired, it has been found necessary to apply to Her Majesty's Government for the provision of suitable rooms for their preservation.

There were two public meetings of the University in 1888. The first was of a purely formal character, and was held on the 29th day of May, for the purpose of admitting to their degrees the candidates who had passed at the Medical Examinations held

a short time previously.

The usual annual meeting of the University to confer degrees in the several faculties, and to declare the distinctions obtained by candidates at the Honour Examinations, was held on 28th

October.

In conformity with the provisions of the Act of Parliament, 44 and 45 Vic., chap. 52, the accounts of the receipts and expenditure of the University, with the corresponding vouchers and other documents, are rendered quarterly to the Controller and Auditor-General, who submits an annual report and abstract to Parliament.

APPENDIX II.

EIGHTH ANNUAL MEETING OF THE ROYAL UNIVERSITY OF IRELAND.

OCTOBER 28TH, 1889.

The Eighth Annual Meeting of the University was held on October 28th, 1889.

The Chancellor of the University opened the proceedings with the following address:—

My Lords, Ladies, and Gentlemen,—It has been the custom at this University on such occasions as the present that a few words should be said by the Chancellor before we enter upon the other duties of the day, and I cannot help desiring to seize so favourable an opportunity of expressing my deep sense of the honour which has been conferred upon me by my nomination to the headship of this great National Institution. I consider it one of the highest distinctions to which any Irishman can attain, since the University itself—commanding as it does the confidence, and uniting the suffrages of all classes and denominations of our fellow-countrymen—is destined, I trust, to prove one of our noblest, most beneficent, and most enduring foundations. Already its roots have struck deep and firmly into our social existence, and each succeeding year its branches are sprouting with ever-increasing vigour.

In order to show that our anticipations of its future destinies are not too sanguine, I cannot do better than recapitulate some of the indications of the progress we have already made. It is now just ten years since the Act of Parliament to which we owe our existence was passed. In his opening address at the first public conferring of Degrees in November, 1832, the Duke of Abercorn, the first Chancellor of the University, and one of the ablest and most patriotic noblemen that was ever concerned with the Administration of Irish Affairs, described, in perspicuous and eloquent terms, the principles, objects, and intentions which the Legislature had in view in calling us into existence; and it is needless for me to say that both the late Chancellor, as well as the Senate and all the Officers connected with the University, have faithfully and honestly endeavoured to carry those objects and intentions into effect.

I do not intend to trouble you with any very voluminous statistics, though it must be remembered that figures are the only instrumentality through which our corporeal proportions can be portrayed. The following facts, however, will suffice for my present purpose, and will tell their own tale. In 1882 the entire number of Candidates who entered for the Examinations of the University was 1,898, while in 1888 they were no less than 3,130, showing in the short space of six years an increase of 1,232, or very nearly 64 per cent.; and I am informed that in these additional numbers all creeds, classes, and denominations of the people of Ireland are fully and proportionately represented.

Well, certainly, it is a very gratifying circumstance that, in the midst of all the turmoil, bitter animosities, and exasperating political controversies, which for some time past have been raging in Ireland, there should be one field of beneficent and patriotic exertion which has remained unvexed by the storms of party warfare and of social or religious disputations, and which is not only already bearing such rich and glorious fruit, but which contains within its bosom the germs of

untold benefits to future generations.

But whilst speaking of the progress which has been made in our University I must not confine myself to mere numbers. Numbers are, of course, of importance, but much more is required, and we can, I think, point with satisfaction to the advances which have been made in other elements of improvement. Scientific knowledge is, day by day, advancing in the world around us, and it has been our constant aim that our Examinations should be so arranged as to give full scope and encouragement to scientific research. We do not desire that our Examinations should serve as a test of successful cramming, but rather as a means of enabling diligent and earnest Students to show the results of their steady mental training. The Examinations, therefore, are, whenever the nature of the subject will allow of it, largely composed of practical work, and the standard of answering required is being steadily Already many of those who have passed through our courses and have obtained their Degrees, are filling promising positions in public life, with profit to themselves, and credit to the University. Medical Degree holds a specially high place. The Examination is admittedly a severe one, and we feel confident that each person to whom our Degree is granted may be safely entrusted with the important duties and responsibilities inherent in the Profession to which he has been admitted.

Nor in this connection must I neglect to call your attention to the considerable impetus which the foundation of this University has given to female education. Our Charter provides that our Degrees are to be open to women, and at the very start it was decided that the Examinations should be made identical for Candidates of either sex. It is needless to say that they have been conducted with the strictest impartiality, with the result that on several occasions some of our most valuable prizes have been carried off by ladies.

The number of Female Students too is rapidly increasing—last year 114 entered for Matriculation, while this year the number was even larger. In 1884, which was the first year in which girls were qualified to present themselves for the Degree Examination, there were 9 Candidates for the B.A. Degree; while on this occasion there are nearly three times as many, and Honours have been gained by 9, a sacred and

propitious number.

Nor, I am happy to say, has the devotion of these young persons to the severe pursuits of learning, proved incompatible with softer and more humane pre-occupations, for one of the ladies upon whom I am to-day to confer the Degree of Bachelor has been persuaded to change her name since her examination in August last. Nor, indeed, is she the only instance in which our "sweet girl Graduates" have proved the truth of the axiom laid down in the Latin grammar that polite literature is a potent instrument in conjuring the natural ferocity of virgins.

But it is not in Arts only that ladies are presenting themselves for our Degrees. We have found them competing successfully also in Law and Music, and in what, perhaps may eventually prove the line in which they are destined to make the greatest progress and to enter upon the career most suited to their powers and to their tastes—viz., that of Medicine. I am happy to think that from very early days I have been in favour of the practice of Medicine being opened to

women; and my Indian experiences have greatly deepened the strength of my convictions on the point. When we remember that in our Eastern Empire there are millions of women, from the Princesses and delicate and high-born ladies in the Zenana to the wives even of the humbler classes, who would sooner die in the midst of their agony rather than allow a man to see their face, or in any way to treat them, and that for centuries they have been the victims of the most indescribable ignorance and abominable practices, we can understand what a scope, both for professional success and for benevolent exertion, is open to women in that part of the world. Indeed, already several very eminent female practitioners are established in the principal Indian cities, and have been everywhere welcomed with acclamation, as well as other more substantial and appropriate rewards, by a numerous and grateful clientels.

The Vice-Chancellor stated last year what had been done in the way of providing a suitable collection of pathological specimens, casts, and drawings, and in the year which has since elapsed a good deal has been accomplished towards the formation of our Library and the furnishing

of the Zoological and Geological sections of our Museum.

And now, I regret to say I have to touch upon a sadder topic than those to which I have hitherto had occasion to refer. In the year which is closing, we have lost two very distinguished members of our Senate, namely, the Earl of Granard and the Rev. Dr. Porter, the President of the Queen's College, Belfast. Both had, from the foundation of the University, taken a deep interest in its progress; and to the latter especially we all feel a deep debt of gratitude for the zeal and temperate wisdom he brought to bear in dealing with the various questions which from time to time have occupied the attention of the Senate. both were my personal friends, my acquaintance with Dr. Porter dates from a very critical period. It was during the course of my mission to Syria in connection with the troubles in the Lebanon that I first had an opportunity of appreciating his extraordinary energy, great personal courage, and the large and generous qualities of his vigorous mind. His connection with the great College in the neighbourhood of my own residence still firmer ripened our intimacy; and I question whether the loss of anyone in recent days has been more widely deplored in the north of Ireland than the death of Dr. Porter, and I am sure that he is equally regretted, not only by the Senate of this University, but by all those whom I am now addressing.

But it is not merely our Senate which has, during the year, lost members by death—some of our most distinguished Examiners have also been removed from our midst. We have to deplore the deaths, during a comparatively short period, of no less than four—Mr. Robert Ornsby and the Rev. Gerard Hopkins, both distinguished Graduates of Oxford; the Rev. J. O'Carroll and the Rev. George Polin, each a

Linguist of very high attainments.

I now turn to the Examinations for the year 1889. Our numbers show a slight decrease as compared with those of last year. 'The entire number of Candidates who entered for any Examination was 2,970, as against 3,130 in 1888. The Candidates for Matriculation were 1,025, as compared with 1,050 last year. In the Faculty of Arts, as well as in the Faculty of Engineering, the number of Candidates was practically the same in each year. In Law there was a very substantial increase, from 24 to 41; but in the Faculty of Medicine there was a considerable decrease, viz., from 816 to 655. No sinister significance, however, need be attributed to these results. There are

two causes which, I am informed, would account for the reduction. The first of these is that, in order to conform to changes recently made by Parliament with regard to medical qualifications, each Candidate must now pass a complete examination in the three branches of Medicine, Surgery, and Obstetrics. The examinations in these several branches are now regarded and counted by us as constituting a single examination, and form in the aggregate a complete qualification in the three branches. But in former years each Candidate generally entered for two or perhaps three of these branches, involving entirely separate examinations. The other cause to which may be attributed some portion of the reduction I have noted is this:—It was formerly the rule that those Candidates who presented themselves for examination, and who, for any reason, did not pass thereat, might again enter for the same Examination on two subsequent occasions without the payment of a This year, however, a new regulation has come into force by which any one fee is available only for the single examination for which it has been actually paid. The Fees charged for Examinations (seldom more than £1) are so very low, that this regulation cannot be regarded as any substantial hardship upon the Candidates. It was well known that under the old conditions Candidates were in the habit of presenting themselves solely for the purpose of seeing what the Examination was like, without having the smallest expectation of passing; and, inasmuch as in the Faculty of Arts, the number of our Candidates has not fallen off (1,199 as against 1,197 last year)—we may fairly infer that our numbers in this department also are likely in the near future still further to increase.

For the first time since the University was founded, we are to-day in the position of awarding no less than Four Studentships of the value of £300 each. As regards most of these Studentships, they have been gained after very keen competition, and in every case the successful Candidate has shown that a long and difficult course has been thoroughly mastered.

Where all have done so well it is perhaps invidious to give special prominence to the name of one, but I cannot refrain from mentioning Mr. George Woodburn, of Queen's College, Belfast, to whom the Studentship in Mental and Moral Science has been awarded, as the result of an examination which the Examiners have reported as exceptionally brilliant. As a consequence, it will be to-day my privilege to hand to that young gentleman the Gold Medal of the University, a distinction very seldom awarded.

Having mentioned Mr. Woodburn, I cannot refrain from saying a word as to his competitor, Mr. William Magennis, of University College, St. Stephen's-green, whose answering was also so good as to win from the Examiners a special report to the Senate; and I am confident I am expressing the unanimous feeling of my colleagues of that Body when I say that it is with very deep regret that we find ourselves unable, having regard to the Statutes of the University, to award him a Studentship also. However, I am informed that he will be eligible to present himself for the Studentship next year, and we all most heartily wish him success on that occasion.

Amongst the Degrees to be conferred to-day is that of Doctor of Music. It is the first time in our history that that Degree has been awarded upon the result of an Examination, and we heartily congratulate Miss Annie Patterson, who is alrea by not merely a Bachelor of Music, but also a Bachelor of Arts, upon the success which she has gained.

And now, my Lords, Ladies, and Gentlemen, having presented you with a simple and practical view of the work we have accomplished, and of the general progress the University is making, I feel that I have no right to trespass further upon your attention. It might, perhaps, be expected that I should say something on the general question of education; but I am conscious that I am not myself sufficiently well educated to be able to say anything on that well-worn theme which could possibly be of any benefit to my hearers. therefore, simply content myself with assuring the younger portion of my audience—those who are standing on the threshold of life, conscious of their own powers, full of hope and expectation as to what the future may bring-that never at any period of their existence will they meet with more genuine sympathy or with more friendly auspications for their success and happiness than those which now attend them. University is the powerful instrument which is destined in future to focus the intellectual talents and the literary genius of our country. is the gateway which leads to honour and to fame, and to those who enter through it is entrusted not only the shaping of their own destinies, but the moral and material advancement of their native country, and, what ought even to be dearer to them than these, its reputation and good name amongst the nations of the world.

In conclusion, I desire to state that, in grateful recognition of my connection with the Royal University of Ireland, I propose to place at the disposal of the Senate an annual prize in the shape of a Gold Medal, to be competed for under such conditions as the Authorities of the

University in their wisdom shall determine.

Dr. J. Creed Meredith, one of the Secretaries of the University, then read the list of successful Candidates for Degrees, &c. As the names of the Candidates were called they were presented by Dr. Dunne, the other Secretary, to the Chancellor, and were admitted by him to their respective degrees.
