FUNDS AND REVENUES OF SCHOOLS
IN IRELAND.

TO WILLIAM GREGORY, ESQ.

Board of Education, March 29th, 1821.

SIR,

I HAVE the honour of acknowledging, by order of the Commissioners of Education, your letter of the 12th March instant, communicating to them "by command of His Excellency the Lord Lieutenant, a copy of two addresses of the House of Commons, dated the 1st instant, and requesting that they should send to you, forthwith, the Returns therein desired, in duplicate, in order that the same should be transmitted, to be laid before the House accordingly;"—and in reply, They have directed me to state to you, for the information of His Excellency,

THAT the Board of Education has not jurisdiction to regulate "all endowed schools of public and private foundation in Ireland," there being a provision contained in the 2d section of the Act of the 53d Geo. 3, c. 107, "that the powers of their Board shall not extend to the schools on the foundation of the late Erasmus Smith, esq. nor the protestant charter schools, nor any parochial school established under the 28th King Henry 8, nor any establishment for the purposes of education, under the control of visitors appointed by Act of Parliament or Charter;" and in the 15th section of the same Act, are excepted from their jurisdiction, "such private schools as are supported by the voluntary occasional contributions of private individuals, and which have no settled or permanent funds or endowments;" and except also, "all schools of private foundation, for the education of persons professing any religion or religious persuasion, other than that of the united church of England and Ireland."

That they subjoin Returns of the names of such Schools as are subject to the regulation of their Board; with the annual revenues of each, and how derived; some of which revenues, however, are at present not actually received.

That there is also subjoined a Return of the numbers of the Scholars in each of the said Schools, on the 5th day of March instant, as returned to their Board by the respective Masters thereof.

That they are unable to answer what measures have been taken to carry into effect any of the improvements recommended by "the Commissioners for inquiring into the state of all Schools on public or charitable Foundations in Ireland;" save, that their Board has been established in pursuance of such recommendation, and has acted in execution of its commission, as appears in their annual Reports to His Excellency, to which they humbly refer.

CLASSICAL SCHOOLS OF ROYAL FOUNDATION.

ARMAGH:

£.700. p. ann. - - - - - Arising from lands granted by King Charles the 1st, for the master of a free-school. The master receives of that income £.500 p. ann. and £.100 for ushers. £.100 p. ann. are allowed for repairs of the school-house.—There are now eighty-two scholars; of whom many are boarders.

BANAGHER:

£.251. 11. 6. p. ann. - - - Arising from lands granted by King Charles the 1st, for a school-master at Banagher.—There are thirty-seven scholars, chiefly boarders. The master, appointed by his Grace the Duke of Bedford, Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, receives the whole income.

CAVAN:

£.641. 13. 5. p. ann. - - - From lands granted by King Charles the 1st, for the master of a free-school. The present master was appointed by Earl Hardwicke, Lord Lieutenant, with a salary of £.400 p. ann. (before the Act of 53d Geo. 3d, for the formation of the Board "for the regulation and management of all endowed Schools," &c.); and the remainder of the income is appropriated to the re-payment of a loan from Government, granted for building a large school-house, which has been very recently finished, and is capable of containing a considerable number of scholars.—There are but twenty-two at present, (some of them boarders;) but the school is expected to increase.

DUNGANNON:

£.999. 16. 8. p. ann. - - - From lands granted by King Charles the 1st, for the master of a free-school. The present master, (who was appointed prior to the 53d year of Geo. 3d,) has a salary of £.500, and £.100 are appropriated to an usher. The residue of the income is reserved for repairs, or exhibitions.—There are thirty-two scholars, several of them boarders, and the school is increasing.

ENNISKILLEN:

£.1,461: - - - - - Arising from lands (granted by King Charles the 1st, for the master of a free-school,) under leases, which have lately expired. £.500 p. ann. are allowed to the master, and £.500 p. ann. for assistants; and the control of the funds devolving to the Commissioners of Education, for the first time, by the resignation of the late master, it is in contemplation to add an English master, when they shall afford the means. A portion of the income is devoted to repairs, or for exhibitions, pursuant to the 53d Geo. 3d, c. 107.—There are seventy scholars, chiefly boarders.

RAPHOE:

The nominal rental is £.800 p. ann. of which £.350 are the salary of the first, and £.150 that of the second master; but, owing to the lawless and unmanageable conduct of the tenantry of the estate, and the depreciation of agricultural property, (which general conduct has occasioned the especial notice and observations of the magistrates assembled at sessions in Donegal, early in the last year,) the Agents to the Board of Education have been unable to collect the rents, and consequently the salaries are considerably in arrear.—The number of scholars at present is twenty-two, some of them boarders. The surplus revenue of the school estate had been laid by for repairs, but it has been found necessary to apply it to the liquidation of so much of the arrear of the masters salaries as it could discharge, leaving still unsatisfied a very large balance.

Established under 12th Elizabeth, c. 1.

ARDAGH:

The Funds are, - - - £.21 p. ann.; in fees paid by the Bishop and Clergy of the Diocese.—There are five scholars.

CLOGHER:

£. 30 p. ann. - - - - Similarly paid.—There are twenty-seven scholars.

CLOYNE:

£. 30 p. ann. - - - - D° - —Twenty-one scholars.

CORK:

£. 30 p. ann. - - - - D° - —Twenty-nine scholars.

DERRY:

£. 40. p. ann. - - - - D° - and assisted by voluntary grants from the London companies.—Eighty-one scholars.

DOWN:

£. 30 p. ann. - - - - D° - —Twenty-eight scholars.

ELPHIN:

£. 30 p. ann. - - - - D° - and £.10 p. ann. a legacy.—Thirteen scholars.

FERN:

£. 30 p. ann. - - - - D° - —Eighty-eight scholars.

KILDARE:

£. 25 p. ann. - - - - D° - —Eighteen scholars.

KILLALOE:

£. 26 p. ann. - - - - D° - —One scholar.

LIMERICK:

£. 30, by the clergy - - A sum has been lately granted by the grand juries for building a school-house, but not yet issued.—There are twenty scholars at present.

LEIGHLIN:

£. 25, by the clergy of the diocese.—Thirty-one scholars.

MEATH:

£. 40 - - - - D° - —Thirteen scholars.

OSSORY:

£. 30 - - - - D° - —Fifteen scholars.

ROSS:

£. 30 - - - - D° - —Twenty-six scholars.

CLASSICAL SCHOOLS OF PRIVATE FOUNDATION.

BANDON :

The Fund is £. 20 p. ann. - Rent-charge on the estate of the founder, Earl of Cork and Burlington ; a voluntary addition is made by the Duke of Devonshire, who also built a house for the master.—There are twenty boys.

CHARLEVILLE :

£. 40 p. ann. - - - - - Paid by the Earl of Cork ; the endowment is not accurately known, the deeds having been burned several years ago in a former school-house.—Twenty boys.

CLONMELL :

£. 400 - - - - - Proceeding from the school lands granted by Richard and Stephen Moore in 1685, for the education of protestant children, gratis.—There are at present eighteen boys. The whole income is received by the present master, preceded the establishment of the Commissioners of Education, under the 53d Geo. 3d.

DUNDALK :

£. 50 - - - - - Rent-charge on the estate of the Earl of Roden ; the income, with the exception of a part devoted to the repayment of a loan from Government for repairs to the school-house, is received by the master.—There are forty-nine boys.

EYRECOURT :

£. 31. 3 s. 2 d. p. ann. - - Interest of £. 700 in Three-and-a-half per Cents. devised by the Rev. Richard Banks, for a protestant schoolmaster at Eyrecourt. The present master enjoys the income, having been appointed prior to the enactment of the 53d Geo. 3d.—The school-house has been found incapable of bearing repairs, it is so extremely decayed ; and the master, (declaring himself unable to afford £. 10 per cent. from his income, to repay any loan which might be desired from Government, pursuant to the act before-mentioned,) has not a house suited for the reception of scholars.—See Third Report of the Commissioners.

KILKENNY :

£. 140. p. ann. - - - - - Rent-charge on the estate of the Earl of Ormond and Ossory ; the income is received by the master, who is appointed by the provost and fellows of Trinity College.—There are thirty-seven boys.

LISMORE :

£. 30 p. ann. - - - - - Rent-charge on the estate of the Duke of Devonshire ; together with a house and garden for the master.—Forty boys.

MIDDLETON :

£. 200 - - - - - Arising from lands in the county of Cork, devised in trust by the will of Elizabeth Countess of Orkney, in 1696.—Some doubts having existed with the Commissioners of Education a few years ago, whether a lease made by the trustees ought not to be impeached, the master, whose school was at a very low ebb, was directed not to receive any rent from the persons deriving under such lease. The house is very old, and in need of repair for the reception of pupils, who have been discontinued in consequence, as represented by the master.

NEW ROSS :

£. 7. 10. - - - - - By rent of a house and gardens in New Ross, adjoining to the school, but at present unlet ; and the sum of £. 20 had been allowed by the corporation of Ross, which is not now paid. There are twenty-six boys.

PRESTON'S SCHOOLS of NAVAN and BALLYROAN :

The management of the funds of the Preston School estate, as well as other conduct and acts of the trustees, have been before the Court of Chancery during some years past. A sum of £. 2,027. 14. 9. in $3\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. stock, has been lately, by order of the Lord Chancellor, transferred from the Accountant General to the Commissioners of Education ; but the causes are not at an end, therefore the fund cannot be fully ascertained.—There are at Navan school two boys ; at Ballyroan, twenty-three : at the termination of the suits the numbers of course will be increased.

WICKLOW :

About £. 20 p. ann. - - - From twelve acres of land, or upward, granted by Philip Earl of Chesterfield, in the year 1746, (when Lord Lieutenant of Ireland,) for a Latin Master in the town of Wicklow, and lately restored, (on the application of this Board,) after some period of alienation.—There are six scholars in the school at present, and additional scholars are expected.

YOUGHALL :

£. 30 p. ann. - - - - - Rent-charge on the estate of the Earl of Cork, who endowed it in 1810, and also gave a school-house.—There are thirty boys.

CROWE'S, Cloyne.	£.165. p. ann. - - - From lands within the burghery of Cloyne, devised by bishop Crowe in 1719, to trustees for clothing, educating and apprenticing poor boys of the diocese of Cloyne.	26 boys & 40 girls. Eight of the boys are on the establishment, and the remaining 18, and 40 girls, are day-scholars, paying weekly a small sum to the master and mistress.
CRAVEN'S, or Limerick Blue-School.	£. 30. p. ann. - - - From houses in Limerick, devised by Mrs. Alice Craven; £.12. p. ann. interest of £. 200. due by the Dean and Chapter; £.6. p. ann. from the sum of £. 100. due by representatives of Averill Hill, and £. 33. p. ann. interest of £. 550. due by Henry D'Esterre, esq.—The Board of Charitable Donations has proceeded to call in said sums, the other objects of the devise rendering it their province to do so.—Total £.81. p. ann.	12 boys educated and clothed, and get breakfast daily.
DR. HALL'S, Limerick.	A large school-house and tenements in Limerick, for the purpose of paying a master and mistress to instruct 20 poor boys and 20 girls in reading and writing. The fund enables the master to receive £. 34. 2 s. 6 d. and the mistress £. 22. 15 s. and £. 10. for books, pens and paper, &c.	20 boys and 20 girls.
DR. HEWETSON'S, Betaghstown.	The fund of Hewetson's school is before the Court of Chancery, in the cause between the Board of Education and the Trustees.	No scholars since the suit commenced.
BALLINTEMPLE, Co. Tipperary.	The interest of £. 100. bequeathed by the Rev. Mr. Hickey, and now in the 5 per cents.	120 children in summer, 60 in the winter season.
FRANKFORT School.	The interest of £. 300. in the 5 per cents. - - D° - - 1,350. in the 3½ d°. - - D° - - 100. in the 3½ d°. Interest of - - £. 1,750. - - Annual revenue. The original sum bequeathed by Dr. Valentine was £. 400. The Bishop of Killala gives £. 12. p. ann. and 2½ acres of land. JAMESTOWN, Co. Leitrim.	The annual sum of £. 34. said to have been granted by an Earl of Mountrath, by the devise of lands let for such rent, and until lately paid by Sir Charles Coote, his representative, but the deed of endowment is not forthcoming.	121 children.
TULLAVIN, Co. Cavan.	£. 4,000. - - - Devised by William Moore, of Tullavin, in 1803, to certain trustees, for a protestant school at Tullavin, £. 2,843. 11s. 1d. part of this fund, for which the Board of Charitable Donations had proceeded, has already been transferred to the Commissioners of Education, and is vested in the 3 $\frac{1}{2}$ per cents.	There are 63 children at present. A school-house is about to be erected, which had been delayed from the difficulty of procuring a proper site, free of encumbrance.

THERE are other Schools in Ireland, which having been endowed, but the endowments not clearly ascertained, (whether fixed or merely discretionary) the Commissioners of Charitable Donations have been referred to, to proceed towards the investigation and recovery of their Funds, so as to place them within the reach and management of the Commissioners of Education.
