RETURN of the SUMS contributed and expended for the Establishment and Maintenance of DIOCESAN SCHOOLS in *Ireland*, in each of the Years from 1836 to 1845 inclusive, distinguishing the Sums contributed by the Clergy of the Established Church, by the Grand Juries, and by the Pupils frequenting the Schools respectively.

In the year 1838, a sum of 1,292 *l.* 6 *s.* 2 *d.* was expended by the grand jury of the county of Limerick, in the erection of a school-house for the district of Limerick, Killaloe, and Kilfenora, in addition to a sum of 400 *l.*, produced by the sale of old school premises.

In the case of Meath and Ardagh District Diocesan School, the annual dividends on a sum of 415 *l.* 15 *s.* 11 *d.*, Government 3 $\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. stock; and in the case of Tuam Diocesan School, the annual dividends on a sum of 588 *l.* 18 *s.* 8 *d.*, Government 3 $\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. stock, are paid to the masters of these schools respectively by the Commissioners.

The salaries of the diocesan schoolmasters (which are paid exclusively by the bishops and clergy of the Established Church), and the sums contributed by the pupils frequenting the schools, are paid directly to the respective masters, without the intervention of the Commissioners, who therefore have no means of stating the amounts contributed.
