MAY IT PLEASE YOUR GRACE,

We, the Board of Superintendence of Dublin Hospitals, have the honour to submit to your Grace this our Sixteenth Annual Report.

During the financial year which ended 31st March, 1874, we inspected the following Institutions which receive grants from

Parliament, viz:—

1. Westmorland Lock Hospital.

- 2. The House of Industry Hospitals, viz.:
 - a. Hardwicke Fever Hospital.
 - b. Whitworth Medical Hospital.
 - c. Richmond Surgical Hospital.

3. Steevens's Hospital.

4. Meath Hospital and County Dublin Infirmary.

5. Cork-street Fever Hospital

6. Rotunda Lying-in Hospital.7. Coombe Lying-in Hospital.

8. St. Mark's Ophthalmic Hospital; and

9. Hospital for Incurables.*

When engaged in these inspections we made careful inquiry in each institution, to ascertain whether the care and comforts of the patients were duly attended to, the buildings kept in good repair, and the general management satisfactory.

We have since issued the Circular (No. 1, Appendix) requesting the Governors of each hospital to furnish the Board with information or suggestions on any matters concerning the management of their respective institutions, as well as the funds under their control. Their replies are annexed in Appendix No. 2.

The metropolitan hospitals under our superintendence afford accommodation for 1,306 patients; but the want of available funds obliged the authorities in several of these institutions to considerably restrict the admissions; hence, the average daily number of beds occupied was only 682 24 during the year.

On the 1st of April there were 705 patients under treatment: 9,682 were admitted during the year; 9,183 discharged; 458 died, and 750 remained in hospital on the 31st March, 1874.

Several of the hospitals having, during previous years, exceeded their incomes, the Governors have been compelled to retrench their expenditure, which accounts for the difference of income and expenditure during 1873-4.

WESTMORLAND LOCK HOSPITAL.

On inspection we found the wards clean and well ventilated, and observed that the classification of patients referred to in our previous report was strictly attended to.

A special ward had also been set apart for patients dangerously ill and dying, as it was considered that such patients should not be

retained amongst the ordinary inmates.

With the object of freeing the institution from debt the Governors have been obliged to limit for a time the number of

occupied beds to 60.

The Commissioners appointed to inquire into the Dublin Hospitals in 1855 were of opinion that £2,600 would suffice for the maintenance of about 150 beds; but considering the increased cost of fuel, wages, and provisions, this sum is considered to be now quite inadequate to meet the requirements for so large a number of beds.

We were informed that the convalescent patients assist in cleaning the wards, scrubbing floors, halls, passages, and performing other menial offices. 797 patients were treated in the hospital during the year; the highest number, 65, was in March; the lowest, 47, in April. Nine patients died during the year, giving a mortality of 1.22 per cent. on the total number, 735, treated to a termination.

The time spent in hospital by each patient averaged 26 days.

STEEVENS'S HOSPITAL.

This Institution appeared to be conducted satisfactorily, and with much care and consideration for the sick. The wards and corridors were clean, and the beds appeared sufficiently apart; the ventilation was generally good, with the exception of the attic wards of the north wing, which is assigned to the Constabulary patients. The height of these wards is little more than 7½ feet, and the roof is sloping; it is to be regretted that this portion of the hospital has not been remodelled as in the south wing. The want of available funds prevents the Governors from at present carrying out so desirable an improvement.

2,239 patients were treated in this hospital during the year, the daily average number being 125.81. The highest number, 145,

was in March, the lowest, 115, in September.

The mortality on the total number treated to a termination was 2:38 per cent., and the time spent in hospital by each patient averaged 20:50 days.

MEATH HOSPITAL.

This Institution continues in a satisfactory state, and since the detached fever wards were built increased accommodation is

afforded in the general hospital.

On the day of inspection 37 patients were in the medical, and 50 in the surgical wards; 1,299 cases were treated during the year, the average number of beds occupied was 90, and the time spent by each patient in hospital averaged 25:31 days. The mortality was 6:71 per cent. on the total number treated to a termination.

The introduction of hot and cold water, which is laid on through

the house is an improvement, and saves labour.

We are of opinion that porcelain enamelled baths, although somewhat more expensive, are more desirable for hospital use than those recently put up in this institution; the arrangement for airing sheets and towels, however, is efficient, and the cooking apparatus economizes fuel.

On examining the expenditure we found that the average cost per bed both for maintenance and establishment was £37 17s. 2¼d., which contrasts favourably with institutions similar to it in

respect to dietary, officers, and servants.

Strict care with reference to the funds of the hospital has been exercised in every department, without impairing the efficiency or usefulness of the Institution.

The grounds surrounding the hospital which are set apart for the recreation and invigorating of the convalescent patients, have been improved and tastefully laid out.

CORK-STREET FEVER HOSPITAL.

This Institution consists of three buildings, viz.—1. The new house; 2. The old house, and 3. The residence of the officers and convalescents. The new building so called, is set apart for the accommodation of acute zymotic diseases; the wards are well ventilated and have sufficient cubic space for each patient. On the day of inspection 53 patients were in this portion of the Institution; the beds, ceilings, and walls were scrupulously clean; 874 patients were treated during the year; the average number was 41.75; the highest, 61.39, was in February; the lowest, 31.58, in May.

The mortality was 7.98 per cent. on the number treated to a

termination.

The time spent in hospital by each patient averaged 17:43 days.

The comforts of the sick were well attended to.

In referring to the classified list of diseases it appears that many cases were admitted which, properly speaking, were not of an

acute zymotic nature.

The old building assigned to small-pox patients during the last epidemic has remained idle since that period. Should an epidemic, of any zymotic disease call for special accommodation, this portion of the Institution (the old house) should not be used on account of its imperfect construction which prevents free ventilation and due supervision and attendance on the sick.

We should hope that suitable provision will be made to meet such an unhappy contingency, without having recourse to this badly-constructed portion of an otherwise excellent Institution.

HOUSE OF INDUSTRY HOSPITALS.

When inspected, these hospitals were in a very satisfactory

condition in respect to order, cleanliness, and ventilation.

On the 1st of April, 1873, 37 patients were in the Hardwicke Fever Hospital; 682 had been admitted during the year, 584 discharged, 92 died, and 46 then remained.

There were 37 patients in the Whitworth Hospital when the year commenced; 674 were admitted, 583 were discharged, 66

died, and 62 remained at the end of the year.

66 patients were in the Richmond Hospital at the beginning of the year; 956 were admitted, 933 discharged, 17 died, and 72 then remained.

The average daily number of beds occupied throughout the year was 36.19 in the Hardwicke; 43.46 in the Whitworth, and 59 in the Richmond.

The mortality in numbers treated to a termination was 13.61 per cent. in the Hardwicke; 10.17 per cent. in the Whitworth, and 21 per cent. in the Richmond.

In visiting the wards of this Institution we observed that the walls were coloured with a pearl-blue tint, which is more agreeable

to the sick than the glare of whitewash.

These hospitals will soon be supplied with pure water, and the necessary works are now in progress to obtain this desirable object.

ROTUNDA LYING-IN HOSPITAL.

On the 1st April, 1873, 23 patients were in the labour wards; 1,320 were admitted during the year; 1,292 discharged (including 137 not in labour); 18 died; and 33 then remained.

13 patients affected with chronic diseases were in the Institution at the commencement of the year; 273 were admitted; 266 dis-

charged, and 6 died.

The mortality of the labour cases was 1:53 per cent.

The average daily number of beds occupied during the year by labour patients was 30.47; by chronic cases 12.73.

Labour cases averaged 9.22 days in hospital; chronic 16.25

days.

On inspection this Institution was clean and well ventilated. The labour wards continue to be occupied in rotation, an arrangement which can hardly fail to prove advantageous to the health of the patients. Extensive repairs have recently been made, and the flooring of several wards renewed. A new stock of blankets, sheeting, and quilts, have been purchased, and wire-woven mattresses substituted for the use of straw beds, at an estimated saving of £30 per annum.

We cannot speak too highly of the care and attention bestowed

on the patients.

The large garden in the rear gives the hospital the advantage of a free access of air.

COOMBE LYING-IN HOSPITAL.

7 labour cases remained in this hospital on the 1st April, 1873; 400 were admitted; 398 discharged (including 41 not in labour), and 5 died in the year ended 31st March, 1874.

Of the chronic class 4 remained at the beginning of the year;

47 were admitted; 39 discharged, and 3 died.

The average daily number of labour cases throughout the year was 10.05, of chronic patients 7.51.

The labour cases averaged 9.01 days in hospital, the chronic 53.75 days.

The mortality of the labour class was 1.38 per cent.; that of

the chronic 7:14 per cent.

The patients in this Institution were most carefully attended

and their comforts well looked after.

On the day of inspection we observed that the progress of the works for the erection of the new portion of this institution, intended exclusively for obstetric cases, had not much advanced; it was stated that this delay was occasioned by the death of the contractor; in the meantime the Guinness dispensary has been used for an hospital, and 12 beds are fitted up for labour cases, and 8 for diseases peculiar to women.

The space in these wards appears rather deficient for the number of beds; but as the new hospital will soon be rebuilt it is hoped

that the sanitary condition will continue satisfactory.

The Guardians and Directors have dispensed with the use of straw for beds, and substituted woven-wire mattresses instead.

In addition to the general daily dispensary under the charge of a physician, there is another dispensary, at a different hour, for diseases peculiar to women, presided over on alternate days by two of the obstetric physicians.

HOSPITAL FOR INCURABLES.

This institution appeared to be in a satisfactory condition when inspected, and considerable improvements have been made in it during the year. The comforts of the inmates were well attended to.

154 patients remained in the Institution on the 1st April, 1873, and 52 were admitted during the year; 11 cases left the hospital, and 44 died, leaving 151 under treatment on the 31st March, 1874.

The average daily number of beds occupied was 152.08, and the time spent in hospital by each patient averaged 269.46 days.

ST. MARK'S.

On the 1st April, 1873, 21 patients were in the hospital; 412 were admitted; 414 discharged, and 1 died during the year.

The average daily number of beds occupied was 1643, and the time spent in hospital by each patient averaged 1385 days. At the dispensary 1,873 cases were treated during the year.

It is to be regretted that the want of funds, and of more extended accommodation limits the sphere of usefulness of this excellent Institution.

SIR,—I received in due course, and laid before the Board of Governors of the Westmorland Lock Hospital your circular of 9th June, and in reply am directed to acquaint you, for the information of the Board of Superintendence of Dublin Hospitals, that the Governors have not on the present occasion any suggestions to offer regarding this institution, nor, beyond the information afforded by the returns for 1873-4, with which you have been already supplied, are there any matters calling for special remark, except to mention that during the last year the laundry staff has been increased by the appointment of a fifth laundry-maid; that the cook has been superannuated under the 9th section of the Dublin Hospitals Regulation Act, 19 & 20 Vic., cap. 110, and that by the exercise of strict economy the debt on the institution has been further considerably reduced.

I am to add in conclusion that His Grace the Lord Lieutenant has appointed Edward Hudson Kinahan, esq., J.P. to be a member of the Board of Governors of this hospital, in the room of Sir Charles Compton W. Domville, Bart., resigned.

Sir,—I am directed by the Board of Governors of the House of Industry Hospitals to observe with reference to your circular of 9th June, which was laid before them in due course, that inasmuch as all the returns relating to these hospitals for the year 1873-4 applied for by you, have been already transmitted to the Board of Superintendence of Dublin Hospitals, it only remains to be stated that during the period in question the large number of 27,506 extern patients was prescribed for, viz.:—12,413 cases at the surgical hospital, 469 at the medical hospitals, and 14,281 at the dispensary, the latter patients having been supplied, free of charge, with medicines, &c.; 343 trusses were also distributed gratuitously to the ruptured poor.

Regarding the correspondence with the Corporation of Dublin for a grant of Vartry water to these hospitals, the Board of Governors have the satisfaction of stating that their efforts in this direction, which were commenced in the year 1869, have been at length successful, inasmuch as the Water Works Committee now write to say (under date 13th July, 1874), that "the supply of water sought for will be at once given, subject to whatever arrangement may be hereafter made as to similar institutions."

The Board of Governors will immediately avail themselves of this offer, and the necessary works are now in active progress with a view to the introduction of the new supply at the earliest possible moment.

The Board have no suggestions to offer.

SIR,—Your letter of June 9th was submitted to the Guardians and Directors of this hospital at their monthly meeting on the 8th instant.

I have been directed, in reply, to inform you, that there is only one point to which they think it necessary to direct the attention of the Board of Superintendence. In their last communication they informed the Board of Superintendence of the death, in November last, of Mr. Henry Quinn, the contractor, who had undertaken the re-erection of the hospital, and the consequent stoppage of the works. His widow, who was unable to proceed with the works, did not take out administration until a few weeks ago. The Guardians and Directors were consequently unable until very recently to take any action in the matter. However, so soon as all parties were in a legal position to do so, a submission of all questions contingent on the contract to the arbitration of Messrs. M'Curdy and Carson, architects, was adopted, and their decision was finally adopted by Mrs. Quinn and the Guardians and

Directors, on Saturday, the 8th inst., and possession of the premises given to the Guardians and Directors on that day, who hope within a few days to be in a position to resume the works.

St. Mark's Ophthalmic Hospital, Dublin, 19th June, 1874.

Sir,—In answer to your communication of the 9th instant, I am directed to inform your Board that the "state and condition" of this hospital is far from being satisfactory in consequence of the want of funds. There are various repairs urgently needed, especially to the bedding, which, owing to this want of funds, cannot be carried out.

The number of applicants for relief at this institution is largely increasing, while the income remains stationary and quite inadequate. During the past year 433 persons were treated in the wards of the hospital, and 1,873 persons at the dispensary, at an expense of £695 10s. 3d. only, of

which sum, however, a considerable amount remains still due.

I am directed to point out to your Board that the majority of the recipients of this charity come from the country districts of Ireland, from which few, if any, subscriptions are received. The Governors of this institution consider this national character of the hospital an additional reason for your Board recommending it for an additional Parliamentary grant.

The dispensary which forms so important a department in our ophthalmic institution, is ill-adapted to the large number of patients

attending, and requires enlargement and re-arrangement.

As however, the financial year, which commenced on 1st April, 1874, opened with a debt of about £120, the Governors are precluded from undertaking any improvements, and were prevented carrying out necessary repairs.

Under the circumstances I am directed to again request your Board will recommend this hospital to Parliament for an increased grant.
