MAY IT PLEASE YOUR GRACE,

We, the Board of Superintendence of the Dublin Hospitals, in conformity with the provisions of the Act 19th and 20th Vict., cap. 110, have the honour to submit to your Grace this our Eighteenth Annual Report, for the year ended 31st March, 1876.

During the above period we have inspected the several hospitals in this city which receive Parliamentary grants. These are:—

1. Westmorland Lock Hospital.

- 2. The House of Industry Hospitals, viz.:
 - a. Hardwicke Fever Hospital.
 - b. Whitworth Medical Hospital.c. Richmond Surgical Hospital.

3. Steevens's Hospital.

- 4. Meath Hospital and County Dublin Infirmary.
- 5. Cork-street Fever Hospital.6. Rotunda Lying-in Hospital.

7. Coombe Lying-in Hospital.

8. St. Mark's Ophthalmic Hospital; and

9. Hospital for Incurables, which receives a portion of the Concordatum Fund.

On making these inspections, and on other occasions, we have conferred with the governing authorities and medical officers respecting the general administration of each institution. The several departments were carefully examined, to ascertain if they were in good order, and if necessary attention was given to the patients, and due provision made for their comforts. If also the food was of good quality, well cooked, and served while hot without delay or exposure.

In the buildings assigned to epidemic diseases, such as small-pox, fever, scarlatina, &c., the available space, ventilation, water

supply, and sewerage, engaged our particular attention.

With the view of preventing the spread of these diseases, we have impressed on the authorities the necessity of separating the

sick from those who are convalescent, and of adopting precautions respecting disinfection and interment, and more especially the importance of securing as far as possible the timely removal to hospital of infected patients from the midst of their friends.

We have every reason to hope that these suggestions will be acted upon by the hospital officials with the zeal which their importance merits; but to render their endeavours efficacious, co-

operation must be obtained from other sources.

WESTMORLAND LOCK HOSPITAL.

On the day of inspection we found this hospital in a creditable condition of order and cleanliness, but observed that some of the patients' blankets were old and threadbare, and the bed-ticking required to be renewed. We are also of opinion that more suitable arrangements for the ablutions of patients are needed in this institution.

We are satisfied that the patients are kindly treated, and

proper discipline is maintained.

To aid the efforts at moral improvement, the classification of patients, as recommended by the Hospital Commissioners of 1855, is in force, and the more effectually to carry out this, the wards are kept constantly locked; but every necessary precaution is adopted in the event of fire breaking out, or of sudden sickness attacking a patient.

Careful management, strict supervision, and well-regulated economy have been attended to, and we are happy to report that the debt incurred some years previously is now nearly liquidated.

During the past year 863 patients were treated in this Institution; 807 were admitted, 11 died, and 67 remained on the 31st March, 1876. The average number of beds occupied daily was 57.07, and the time spent in hospital by each patient averaged 24.20 days.

During the year seven children were born in the hospital,

STEEVENS'S HOSPITAL.

Many improvements have recently been effected in this institution, the patients are well attended to, and the order and regularity which prevailed throughout deserve high commendation.

We were pleased to be informed that provision was made for isolating noisy delirious patients, and those affected with offensive medical or surgical conditions, a matter of great importance to

the welfare of other patients.

We regret having to observe, that in one of the wards we perceived an unpleasant smell, which, on investigation, was found to arise from a close-stool, the wood-work of which, though perfectly clean, as far as washing and scrubbing could make it, emitted an offensive odour. To provide against this impurity, we recommend that such utensils should be furnished with earthenware lids, and the wood-work painted and varnished.

In the culinary department the samples of diet inspected appeared of excellent quality; we found, however, the cooking apparatus old and defective, there being no broiling or toasting range suitable for so large an hospital. More efficient provision is also necessary for the distribution of cooked food, and we have recommended the use of tin cases, provided with hot water compartments, or boxes incased in felt, for conveying the food hot to the wards.

One hundred and fifty-seven patients remained in hospital on the 1st April, 1875; 2,083 were admitted, 2,024 discharged, and 55 died during the year ended 31st March, 1876, giving a mortality of 2.65 per cent. on 2,079 cases treated to a termination.

MEATH HOSPITAL AND COUNTY DUBLIN INFIRMARY.

Every attention is given to the patients, and the internal arrangements of the Institution appear to be carried out with great order and regard to economy. Eighty-five patients remained in hospital on the 1st April, 1875; 1,218 were admitted, 1,133 discharged, and 76 died during the year ended 31st March, 1876. The average number of beds occupied daily was 83.52.

The time spent in hospital by each patient averaged 23:46 days. The mortality per cent. on the total number of cases treated to

a termination was 6.29.

CORK-STREET FEVER HOSPITAL.

Many useful improvements and alterations have lately been made in the arrangements of this hospital, and throughout the entire institution cleanliness and thorough ventilation are strictly enforced.

The parallel buildings on each side of the central block have

been painted, cleaned and renovated.

The western block, comprising four well-ventilated wards formerly designed for convalescents, is now allotted to epidemic cases. Its corresponding wing on the eastern side, in which small-pox and scarlatina patients were recently treated, is, as far as circumstances will permit, rendered available for convalescents. These two buildings are constructed at a distance of 116 feet from each other, and connected only by a covered colonnade open to the south, which affords a promenade for convalescent patients.

The pavilion, or new building, being detached, and in rere of the east wing, with its long axis nearly north and south, insures equable exposure to light, and more perfect ventilation on account of the prevailing winds. This part of the institution is admirably adapted for the reception of acute fever cases, and we have been informed that in future it is to be wholly appropriated to that purpose, and with its six spacious wards can accommodate sixty

such patients.

A charge of negligence was lately preferred against the working department of this hospital for not having detained a patient who was admitted to the reception-room, supposed to be labouring under fever and pneumonia.

We have investigated this case, and from the reports laid before us are of opinion that no blame is to be attached to the officials.

The reports of the hospital are drawn up with great care, and

contain valuable information.

During the past year 653 patients were admitted, 586 were discharged, 56 died, and 52 remained on the 31st March, 1876; 3975 beds on an average were constantly occupied, the largest number, 50, was in December, the lowest, 35, in July and August; the time spent in hospital by each patient averaged 2069 days.

HOUSE OF INDUSTRY HOSPITALS.

We found that absolute cleanliness and thorough order prevailed throughout this institution; the buildings were said to be in good repair, and the ventilation was excellent. The patients were well attended to, and the preparation and the distribution of the

food to the wards were highly commendable.

In the Hardwicke Hospital we observed that the water used for drinking and ablutionary purposes was allowed to remain in uncovered vessels in the wards. For obvious reasons more suitable arrangements should be adopted. We are of opinion that a proper slop-sink, lined with porcelain, is also required for emptying spit-cups and ward utensils, provided with an ample supply of water for cleansing and flushing this receptacle.

Up to the present the W.-C.s have served for this purpose.

Five hundred and sixty-two patients were admitted into the Hardwicke Fever Hospital during the year, 503 discharged, and 65 died, being a mortality of 11 44 per cent.; the highest numbers were in October and November; 723 patients were admitted into the Whitworth Hospital, 678 discharged, and 52 died, being a mortality of 7·12 per cent.; 874 patients were admitted into the Richmond Hospital, 847 were discharged, 30 died, being a mortality of 3·42 per cent. The total admissions into the three hospitals amounted to 2,159, and the total number of cases treated to a termination 2,175; 151 patients remained in hospital on the 1st April, 1875; 2,159 were admitted during the year, 2,028 were discharged, 147 died, and 135 remained on the 31st March, 1876.

The average daily number of patients in the Hardwicke during the year was 31.90, in the Whitworth 42.50, and in the Richmond

72.56.

ROTUNDA LYING-IN HOSPITAL.

On the occasion of our visit the general aspect of the institution was little altered since the previous inspection. The same care with regard to the condition of the wards and treatment of the patients was manifested, as stated in our previous report.

Portions of the west wing required repairs, which no doubt

have since been attended to.

On referring to the statistics of this institution, we regret to observe that during the past year, from causes which we are unable to explain, an increased mortality is shown.

We suggest, for the consideration of the Governors, the expediency of constructing, in a suitable position, a disinfecting chamber

for purifying, when deemed necessary, the clothes and bedding of

patients.

Thirty-one labour cases remained in this hospital on the 1st April, 1875; 1,360 were admitted, 1,323 discharged (including 185 not in labour), and 39 died in the year ended 31st March, 1876.

Of the chronic class 13 remained at the beginning of the year;

246 were admitted, 230 discharged, and 7 died.

The average number of beds occupied daily by labour cases was 25.53, by chronic patients 13.70.

The labour cases averaged 6.71 days in hospital, the chronic 19.36 days.

The mortality of labour cases was 3:31 per cent., that of the

chronic 2.95 per cent.

We highly disapprove of slop-pails being allowed to remain in the labour wards, and consider that excreta should be directly carried away and discharged in appropriate places, and the vessels which contained the same immediately cleansed and disinfected.

COOMBE LYING-IN HOSPITAL.

This institution continues to be worked efficiently, and its

sanitary condition appears to be satisfactory.

We inspected the several departments, including the new front building in course of completion, the wards of which are lofty, well proportioned, and are furnished with ample provision for We are of opinion, however, that the W.-C.s are not ventilation. suitably placed; they should be constructed outside the immediate range of the hospital walls, and approached by corridors thoroughly ventilated.

This new building will afford increased accommodation to a needy and deserving class that are obliged to avail themselves of such an institution during the period of parturition. To carry out the benevolent object of those who have contributed to this admirable hospital, we trust that strict economy will guide any future expenditure of the managing committee.

We have ascertained that the dispensary, which forms such an important department in this institution, is solely for women and children of the poorest class. Surgical complaints peculiar to women are treated in the chronic wards under the obstetric

surgeon.

On the 1st April, 1875, 10 patients were in the labour wards; 351 were admitted during the year; 344 discharged (including 14 not in labour); 3 died, and 14 then remained. Six patients affected with chronic diseases were in the hospital; 45 were admitted; 42 discharged, and 3 died.

The mortality of the labour cases was 0.90; that of the chronic cases 6.67 per cent. The average time spent in hospital by labour

cases was 9.97 days, and by chronic cases was 42.23 days.

St. Mark's Ophthalmic Hospital.

This Institution continues to be satisfactorily conducted; 21 patients remained on the 1st April, 1875; 502 were admitted, 507 discharged during the year; no death occurred. On our visit we observed that the patients were well cared for, and the hospital statistics accurately kept. We have since learned that very extensive alterations and sanitary improvements have been made, which will add much to the health and comfort of the patients.

This hospital, from the period of its foundation to the present time, has conferred important advantages on the poor suffering from the various forms of ophthalmic disease, both at its Dis-

pensary and the intern patients admitted to the wards.

We regret to mention that since our last report, Sir W. Wilde, who founded and established this Institution, has died, and we wish here to pay a passing tribute to his great genius, consummate skill, and benevolent disposition.

HOSPITAL FOR INCURABLES.

On visiting the several departments of this Institution we were much gratified by the order, regularity, and cleanliness which prevailed. We were informed that four new commodious wards are to be built for the reception of cancer cases, an improvement much needed. Great credit is due to the Managing Committee for their unceasing energy in maintaining this admirable Institution, which affords a refuge to a large and suffering class, who are excluded, by the nature of their ailments, from admission to the other hospitals.

At the commencement of the year 160 patients remained in hospital; 62 were admitted; 17 discharged; 48 died; and 157

remained on the 31st March, 1876.

The average number of beds occupied daily was 152.62, and the time spent in hospital by each patient averaged 251.62 days.

APPENDIX No. 2.

Westmorland Lock Hospital, Dublin, 16th day of September, 1876.

Sir,—I received in due course and laid before the Board of Governors of this Hospital, your circular requesting to be supplied with information or suggestions respecting the state, &c., of this Institution, and in reply am directed to state that the Governors have now the satisfaction of reporting that they have been at last enabled by the exercise of the strictest economy in every department, to liquidate the debt which pressed so heavily on the Institution for several years past. The matters now urgently demanding attention are the construction of a new roof and the execution of various external repairs on those parts of the building which have suffered most from the effects of time, weather, and natural decay. The Governors have engaged the services of an eminent architect to examine and report thereon, and to prepare plans, &c. When these are completed, the Governors will advertise for estimates from builders, and as they anticipate that the necessary works will involve an expenditure of several hundred pounds, it is intended to apply to Government for a special grant for this purpose, as it is considered that Government should provide funds for preservation of a building which is absolutely its own property, more especially as the hospital grant is barely sufficient to meet the ordinary requirements of the Institution.

During the last year the Governors have procured new supplies of bedding, comprising blankets, sheets, and counterpanes, which were much needed. They have also renewed the stock of wrappers, and of body linen, &c., for the patients.

In reply to your inquiry, I am to state that each division is supplied

with bidets and douches for the use of the patients.

I append the usual return of patients who have been persuaded to reform, viz:—thirty-nine have been sent to penitentiaries; fifteen have been reconciled and restored to their parents or other relations; twenty-one have been provided with situations as laundry servants, ward servants, &c., in the hospital; three have been placed in situations as domestic servants out of the house; sixteen have entered the Dublin

union poorhouses, four have been sent to fever and other hospitals; one was attacked with puerperal mania and had to be transferred to a lunatic asylum; seven were discharged for misconduct and insubordination.

> Coombe Lying-in Hospital, Dublin 23rd October, 1876.

Sir,—In the pressure of business your letter of the 26th of June was

accidentally overlooked, for which I hereby apologize.

The "Guardians and Directors" have much pleasure in stating that the New Main Building—after considerable delays arising from circumstances which they could not control—is now nearly completed, and that it will be opened in all probability in a few weeks.

This result has been attained through the munificence of Sir A. E. Guinness, bart., M.P., who, while the "Guardians and Directors" were debating on how they should proceed after the death of Mr. Quin, and

the arbitration which ensued thereon had concluded, generously offered to continue the rebuilding to a certain point, on conditions which he then set out.

The "Guardians and Directors" as conservators of the charity could not of course refuse this splendid offer, and therefore most gratefully accepted it. Sir Arthur, however, did not stop at the point then named, but has completed the building in a style which has met with general approval.

This new building will give increased accommodation by about thirtyeight beds—being an increase of twenty beds on the whole institution

over the original hospital.

The "Guardians and Directors" have been consulting on the re-opening of the hospital and the furnishing thereof, and have decided on the use of wire-wove mattresses, &c. Various other matters connected with the well-being of the institution will come under notice, and every means will be taken to carry on the work of the institution with the greatest

economy consistent with efficiency.

The "Guardians and Directors" regret having to report the death of the late Master, Dr. Ringland, after a Mastership of thirty-five years, during which time he devoted a great amount of time and energy to the interests of the hospital, and to whose charitable feelings and knowledge of the wants of the poor the enlarging of the hospital originated. His death created a vacancy in the Mastership, which has been filled up by the appointment of Dr. G. H. Kidd thereto, for the ensuing seven years, according to the terms of the Royal Charter. This appointment the "Guardians and Directors" consider to be for the best interests of the charity, and one which Dr. Kidd's long and zealous services in connexion with the institution eminently entitled him to.

The Registrar of St. Mark's Ophthalmic Hospital and Dispensary is directed by the Board of Governors to acknowledge the receipt of Dr. Martin's circular, and to state in reply, for the information of the Board of Superintendence of the Dublin Hospitals, that during the past year very important and extensive sanitary improvements have been effected in this Institution, all tending to promote the health and comfort of the patients. The subject of improved ventilation, upon which the Board of Superintendence remarked at their last visit of inspection, has engaged the attention of the Governors, and they believe that their efforts in this direction will be regarded as completely successful. The hospital has been put into thorough repair both internally and externally, including roofs, sewers, &c. It has also been cleansed, whitewashed, papered, and painted throughout. Some new furniture has been purchased, and wirewoven mattresses introduced, as also supplies of new bedding, &c. the wards lavatories have been fitted up with enamelled metal basins, having an unlimited supply of both hot and cold water laid on. bath-room has been constructed and furnished with a cast-iron enamelled reclining bath. A new kitchen-range has been purchased, having boiler and cisterns attached capable of affording supply of hot water to the bath-room and other parts of the hospital.

The improvements referred to above having been attended with an extraordinarily large expenditure of money, as noticed on page 6 of the accompanying Annual Report of the hospital for the year 1875-6, the Governors trust that the members of the Board of Superintendence, as well as the public generally, will appreciate their exertions in the cause of the sick poor, and assist with their donations and subscriptions to extend the usefulness of the Institution, by enabling the Governors to defray the current liabilities, and to undertake the erection of additional wards necessary to meet the increased demand for accommodation of

intern patients suffering from ophthalmic and aural affections.
