MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY,

We have the honour to submit to your Excellency this our Thirtieth Annual Report on the several Hospitals in this city which receive aid from Parliament, and which were duly inspected by us during the year ending 31st March, 1888.

These are :—

1. Westmoreland Lock Hospital.
2. The House of Industry Hospitals, viz. :—
 - a. Hardwicke Fever Hospital.
 - b. Whitworth Medical Hospital.
 - c. Richmond Surgical Hospital.
3. Steevens's Hospital.
4. Meath Hospital and County Dublin Infirmary.
5. Cork-street Fever Hospital.
6. Rotunda Lying-in Hospital.
7. Coombe Lying-in Hospital.
8. St. Mark's Ophthalmic Hospital; and
9. Hospital for Incurables, which receives a portion of the Concordatum Fund.

On making these inspections we inquired into the state of each institution to ascertain if the buildings were in good order, the general management satisfactory, and if due provision were made for the comfort of the patients, and all necessary attention given to them.

We examined the dietaries in use, and the manner of serving the food to the patients, and inquired into the nursing arrangements, and such other matters as might assist us to supervise these hospitals, and report thereon in accordance with the provisions of the 18th section of the Act 19 & 20 Vic., cap. 110.

On the 1st of April, 1887, there remained 760 patients in these Hospitals.

The number admitted during the year was 9,875, making the total under treatment 10,635, of whom 9,376 left either cured or relieved, or were discharged for other causes, and 512 died.

Seven hundred and forty-seven patients remained in these Hospitals on 31st March, 1888.

The mortality was 5·39 per cent. on those treated to a termination.

The total average daily number of beds occupied in these Hospitals throughout the year was 744·57.

The time spent in Hospital of each patient under treatment (omitting the inmates of the Hospital for Incurables) averaged 21·38 days.

Appendix.—Table No. 1 shows a list of diseases of patients treated in the several Hospitals and the number that died of any particular disease during the year ended 31st March, 1888.

Table No. 2 shows the average cost per bed occupied throughout the year ending 31st March, 1888, for maintenance and for establishment, and for both, exclusive of buildings and furniture.

Table No. 3 shows the several sources of income of each Hospital.

Table No. 4 sets forth in detail the chief heads of expenditure of each Hospital.

Table No. 5 gives the number of patients treated in each Hospital, the mortality per cent., the average daily number of beds occupied during the year, and the present extent of accommodation for each class of patients.

Table No. 6 shows the prices of articles supplied to each Hospital per contract or otherwise.

Table No. 7 gives the various dietaries in use in each Hospital.

Table No. 8, gives the names of the Governors of each Hospital, and number of attendances during the year.

LOCK HOSPITAL.

On our inspection of this institution the wards were well ventilated and in proper order, but several of them, owing to their inherent defects, can never look light or cheerful.

We examined the provisions, and the means for cooking and serving the food, and think, on the whole, there can be no cause for complaint; indeed the requirements of the patients appear to be adequately attended to, except that there is room for improvement in providing for them suitable employment during their stay in hospital.

No inmate was discharged during the year on account of misconduct or for insubordination.

With the view of affording clinical instruction it was suggested to admit medical students to the practice of this hospital under certain restrictions; but this arrangement has not been carried out, as the Governors of the hospital are of opinion that, to admit students to the wards would have the effect of deterring women from entering the hospital.

The returns received from the Hospital afford evidence that it fulfils in a fair degree the purpose for which it was established, and we believe that it merits the support and sympathy of the general public.

There were 61 patients in this institution on the 1st of April, 1887; 624 were admitted, and 17 infants were born in the house during the year; 638 patients were discharged, 13 died, and 51 remained on the 31st March, 1888.

The mortality was 2.00 per cent. on the total number treated to a termination.

The time spent in Hospital by each patient averaged 32.46 days, and the average daily number of beds occupied during the year was 62.26.

HOUSE OF INDUSTRY HOSPITALS.

We inspected the several parts of this institution, and found the wards and corridors were in good order, with the exception of some parts of the flooring which appeared to require renewal.

The bedding was properly attended to, and the personal cleanliness of the patients was satisfactory. We ascertained that each ward had a proper supply of towels for the use of patients, and that those who are unable to perform ablution in the lavatories are attended each morning by the nurse, who is responsible for their personal tidiness.

The samples of food which we examined were of good quality, and the distribution of diets and extras were conducted according to regulation. On the day of our visit we observed, however, that the mutton chops served to the patients were hard and insipid, and on investigating this, we found that the culinary appliances were inadequate for so large a number of inmates. There is but one common kitchen in the Whitworth, serving both for it and for

the Richmond and Hardwicke Hospitals, which are situated some little distance apart. We are of opinion that the cooking is not sufficiently varied, and consider this subject is worthy of more attention than it has hitherto received in most of the Dublin Hospitals.

The construction of the laundry is in some respects imperfect, the cubic space in the wash-house is deficient, and there is no proper means for the escape of vapour. The steam boiler is not large enough for the linen to be washed. We understand, however, that the Governors have under consideration the desirability of having the laundry work done outside.

The *post-mortem* room is fairly lighted and ventilated, but is not, in our opinion, sufficiently spacious, considering the large number of pupils who attend these hospitals.

The condition of the baths and some of the lavatories is capable of improvement.

Defective provision exists in some parts of the Richmond Hospital for emptying and rinsing ward utensils, closets being used instead of sinks.

We recommend that all old surgical dressings—poultices and plasters—be removed from the wards in a suitable refuse can, and burned immediately in a furnace constructed for that purpose: The present arrangement of throwing the ward refuse into the ash-pit is objectionable.

The construction of a disinfecting hot-air chamber merits the consideration of the Governors.

All infected articles of woollen clothing, blankets, or bedding if not burned at once should be submitted to this heat process, so as to destroy vermin or the germs of disease.

We entertain some doubt whether the supervision of the nurses and ward maids, especially in the several detached buildings, can be adequately performed by the present efficient matron, who has also to discharge the duty of house-keeper.

There are no departmental changes to record as having occurred during the past year, except the retirement and superannuation of Mr. Benjamin Mullen after a long and efficient service of over forty years.

HARDWICKE.

Twenty-four patients remained in this Hospital on the 1st of April, 1887; 967 were admitted during the year including one infant born in the House; 843 were discharged; 110 died, giving a mortality of 11·54 per cent. on the total number of cases treated to a termination. The average daily number of beds occupied throughout the year was 46·37, and the time spent in Hospital by each patient averaged 17·12 days.

WHITWORTH.

On the 1st of April, 1887, 71 patients remained in Hospital; 732 were admitted; 685 were discharged; 52 died, giving a mortality of 7·05 per cent. on the total number of cases treated to a termination.

The average daily number of beds occupied throughout the year was 58·89, and the time spent in Hospital by each patient under treatment averaged 26·84 days.

RICHMOND.

There were ninety-two patients in this Hospital when the year commenced, 825 were admitted; 797 were discharged; 35 died, giving a mortality of 3·28 per cent. on 832 cases treated to a termination.

The average daily number of beds occupied in the year was 73·85; and the time spent in Hospital by each patient averaged 29·47.

STEEVENS'S HOSPITAL

This institution was in a satisfactory state on inspection, and the Hospital buildings were reported as being in good order, but several of the lavatories and closets require to be reconstructed, and additional bath-rooms are much needed. The patients' comforts appeared carefully attended to, and the nursing details were well carried out.

The cooking arrangements are of an excellent description.

We regret to report that, owing to want of funds, several of the wards were closed, those we visited were generally cheerful and their cleanliness and order deserve a favourable comment from us, but in No. 5 Male Ward there is room for improvement, that being somewhat bare and cheerless.

Inquiring into the means of extinguishing an outbreak of fire we found hand pumps and water buckets provided on each landing, and were informed that the question of fixing internal hydrants is under consideration. We suggest that instructions be prepared in writing, and hung up in some conspicuous places for the guidance of attendants and nurses in the event of a fire breaking out; also that an entry be made in a book, to be kept by a responsible officer, of the time each chimney in the Hospital is cleaned.

On the 1st of April, 1887, 68 patients remained in Hospital; 1,045 were admitted during the year; 1,004 were discharged; 41 died, and 68 remained at the end of the year.

The mortality was 3·92 on the total number treated to a termination.

The time spent in Hospital by each patient averaged 22·31 days, and the average daily number of beds occupied during the year was 67·85.

THE MEATH HOSPITAL.

The management of this Institution reflects great credit on the Committee, who evidently have given careful and intelligent consideration to Hospital arrangements.

Although there was much that was gratifying in the general condition of the wards, on inspection we observed that some were

overcrowded. This unsanitary condition will be obviated by the increased accommodation which the new building in course of construction will afford. The arrangements of the wards admit of a plentiful supply of fresh air. Great care has been bestowed on the plans of this new building, and it may fairly be expected that the most advanced views as to what is desirable will be adopted.

We hope that provision will be made for isolating noisy delirious patients, and those affected with offensive medical and surgical conditions, a matter of great importance to other patients.

If wards are sufficiently numerous they should be occupied in rotation, and one should always be kept vacant for not less than one month in each year, and longer if possible, during which time thorough cleansing should be carried out, and exposure to air and sunlight, so as to prevent gradual contamination of the apartment.

With regard to ventilation and lighting we suggest as an improvement that all gas jets should have funnels fitted over them, communicating with a shaft or flue by which the heated and vitiated air from the ward would be carried off.

The sewers and soil pipes are in good order, being external to the hospital walls, having ample means for being flushed and inspected.

The dietary is considered ample and nutritious, and the various articles of food, including bread, meat, milk, beef-tea, &c., which we examined were found, without exception, of good quality; and the cooking satisfactory.

There were 92 patients in this Hospital at the commencement of the year; 1,148 were admitted; 1,079 discharged; 78 died, and 83 remained on the 31st March, 1888.

The mortality was 6.74 per cent. on the total number treated to a termination.

The time spent in Hospital by each patient averaged 24.62 days, and the average daily number of beds occupied during the year was 83.41.

CORK-STREET FEVER HOSPITAL.

On the day of inspection we were much gratified by the order and cleanliness which prevailed in the wards and other departments of this institution; everything that was seen gave evidence that the wants of the patients are carefully attended to, and that they are kindly and skilfully treated.

We found the rations of good quality, and the kitchen accommodation and cooking arrangements efficient.

Great attention has been paid to the ventilation of drains, and no offensive smell was evident in any part of the Hospital.

We are of opinion that the precautions against fire are not sufficient, and we recommend a careful examination of this subject.

The establishment charges of this Hospital appear rather high, but this is to be accounted for by the necessity of maintaining at all times a staff trained for attendance on fever cases, a temporary reduction of which would entail serious consequences should any sudden emergency arise.

For the last few years the pressure on the accommodation of the Hospital, though somewhat increased, has not been excessive, and there has been at all times ample available space. We are of opinion that it would be unsafe to the community of this city not to have a considerable number of spare beds always available to meet the fluctuations of epidemics, as cases of contagious disease, such as fever or small-pox, refused admission for want of accommodation would spread rapidly among the ill-ventilated and over-crowded houses of the poor.

On the occasion of our visit we observed that the laundry department, which was in process of reconstruction, was sufficiently removed from that part of the Hospital occupied by the sick, as to obviate the ill effects of the foul fumes generated there.

Improved means for the ventilation of the wash-room and the carrying off of the vapour are to be provided.

At the commencement of the year 57 patients remained in the Hospital: 951 were admitted; 863 discharged; 74 died, and 71 remained on the 31st March, 1888. The mortality was 7·89 per cent. on those treated to a termination.

The average daily number of beds occupied was 65·14, and the time spent in Hospital by each patient averaged 23·65 days.

ROTUNDA LYING-IN HOSPITAL.

On the occasion of our visit to this very important and useful institution its general aspect was satisfactory. The same care which we observed before with regard to the condition of the wards and the treatment of the patients was apparent.

The sanitary condition of the Hospital is said to be satisfactory, and we have ascertained that in the event of puerperal fever manifesting itself the most prompt means are adopted to prevent its spread. We consider that the *post-mortem* room is too small, and are of opinion that this important department of an hospital should be large and well ventilated, and have ample means of renewing the atmosphere, otherwise attendants on autopsies are likely from emanations to convey infection, which is undoubtedly a frequent and unsuspected cause of the propagation of disease.

As a school for giving instruction in midwifery and diseases peculiar to women it continues to hold a high reputation, and accordingly attracts a large number of students.

The admirable way in which the dispensary department is conducted is of great value to the patients for whom it is intended, and also affords advantages for medical education.

The books and registers were examined and found properly kept.

The provisions were of good quality and the cooking was all that could be desired.

The supply of linen is ample, and the washing is satisfactory, but the propriety of airing the sheets in the wards is questionable.

We regret to report a distressing accident which occurred to a labour patient, who was admitted to the Hospital on the 2nd of January, and gave birth to a female infant on the same day. On the 5th of January she became seriously ill and delirious, and escaping from her attendants, threw herself from a window. We hope that means will be taken to prevent the recurrence of such an accident.

On the 1st of April, 1887, there were 29 patients in the labour wards; 1,536 were admitted during the year; 1,309 were discharged after delivery; 227 were discharged not having been delivered; 5 died, and 24 remained in the Hospital at the end of the year.

Twenty-one patients remained in the auxiliary or chronic department on the 1st of April, 1887; 432 were admitted; 412 were discharged; 14 died in the year ended 31st March, 1888, and 27 then remained.

The mortality of the labour patients, deducting the non-parturient cases, was 38 per cent., and that of the chronic class 3.28 per cent.

COOMBE LYING-IN HOSPITAL.

We are happy to reiterate the statements made in our last Report respecting the working of this institution, and consider that it merits a liberal support on account of the benefit it is to the poor, and also for the advantages it affords in forwarding medical education. It is to be regretted that the want of available means limits the sphere of its usefulness. On the occasion of our inspection the wards were clean and orderly, and the patients well attended to. The various samples of food which we examined were good, but the kitchen was defective in height and ventilation.

The sewerage works which were carried out last year have been further perfected, by removing the open sink stones in the area at the rear of the Hospital and fixing instead patent double gully traps, as well as continuing the metal downpipes carrying the water drainage, &c., directly into these traps. A Buchan's Patent Trap has also been fixed near the gate entrance, disconnecting the sewers of the Hospital from the main sewer in the street; ample provision was also made for the perfect ventilation of these sewers under the direction of Mr. Fuller, the architect.

The registers and account books were examined, and found to be carefully kept.

In our two last Reports we suggested as a precaution against fire, that the straw used for the patients' bedding should be stored outside the Hospital building in one of the outhouses of the adjoining yard. On the day of inspection, we found this straw had been removed from the place we objected to before,

to an apartment in the basement. The danger of this arrangement is so obvious that we should scarcely consider it necessary to do more than once to advert to it to insure its immediate removal.

With this exception the general impression produced by our visit was favourable.

Twenty-two labour cases remained in Hospital on the 1st of April, 1887; 606 were admitted during the year; 604 were discharged; 9 died; and 15 remained at the end of the year.

Eighteen patients remained in the chronic wards on the 1st of April, 1887; 251 were admitted; 246 discharged; 8 died; and 15 remained at the close of the year.

The mortality of patients admitted to the labour wards deducting 174 that were discharged not having been delivered, was 9 deaths in 439 cases, or 2.05 per cent.; and that of the chronic class was 3.15 per cent.

ST. MARK'S OPHTHALMIC HOSPITAL.

When we inspected this Hospital the wards were clean and in good order, although other portions of the premises were not so satisfactory. The waiting and dispensary apartments appear not sufficiently spacious or well ventilated for the large number of patients who attend.

The basement story is dark and low, and the accommodation for servants is inadequate. The work done here, however, reflects great credit on the authorities, considering the confined space in which its beneficial objects are carried on.

We were sorry to observe the unsanitary state of the laneway in the rear and at the side of the Hospital, which we commented on in our Twenty-seventh Report. This remains in the same unsatisfactory condition. It is, however, not under the control of the Hospital authorities.

The institution is available for persons who, though not poor are yet unable to support themselves in lodgings, on payment of small sums varying according to their circumstances.

Poor persons in country districts can obtain admission by applying to their respective Boards of Guardians, who are empowered to send them to the Hospital and pay all their expenses.

By arrangement with the authorities the Royal Irish Constabulary are also admitted as pay patients.

The tabular statement of the diseases for which these patients were admitted and the operations performed, will be found in Appendix, and exemplify the confidence placed in the resources of the Hospital, and show the large amount of work performed by the surgical staff.

On the 1st of April, 1887, 40 patients were in Hospital; 651 were admitted during the year; 654 were discharged, 37 then remained. No deaths occurred during the year.

The average daily number of beds occupied was 39.76, and the time spent in Hospital by each patient averaged 22.50 days.

THE ROYAL HOSPITAL FOR INCURABLES.

We found this Hospital in a satisfactory condition as regards the comforts of the patients; and as the amount of attention bestowed on cleanliness is the crucial test of all good ward management, it was pleasing to witness how well this was carried out. The kitchen is well lighted and ventilated and the cooking appliances are of the best description, the diets are good and sufficient, the food is comfortably served.

Improved accommodation having been found imperatively necessary for cancer and consumptive patients, plans were sought and obtained for a new building which is also to include day rooms, additional bath rooms, and a laundry. The new structure is named The Victoria Jubilee Wing, the foundation stone of which was laid on the 29th of June last, by H.R.H. Prince Albert Victor of Wales; His Excellency the Marquis of Londonderry, and Prince George of Wales, being present, and on this occasion the title of Royal was granted to the institution.

The late matron (Mrs. Savory) having retired, a lady superintendent (Miss Stewart) has been elected. This lady is a certificated nurse, and had for eight years previously been in charge of medical and surgical wards in St. Thomas's Hospital, London.

Inquiring into the means of extinguishing a fire, we observed that there are external and internal hydrants, with a supply of Vartry water laid on at high pressure, having sufficient force to play upon fire in any part of the buildings.

Medical and surgical cases of considerable interest are admitted to this Hospital, but in the event of a death occurring, autopsies are not permitted, and in consequence much professional information and means for medical education are lost.

One hundred and sixty-five patients remained in Hospital on 1st of April, 1887, 90 were admitted; 15 discharged; 73 died during the year, and 167 remained on the 31st March, 1888.

The mortality was 29 per cent. on the total number in the House.

The timespent in Hospital by each patient averaged 230.25 days.

The average daily number of beds occupied throughout the year was 160.42.
