THIRTY-FIRST REPORT

OF THE

BOARD OF SUPERINTENDENCE OF THE DUBLIN HOSPITALS.

TO HIS EXCELLENCY CHARLES STEWART, MARQUESS OF LONDONDERRY, &c., &c.,

Lord Lieutenant-General and General Governor of Ireland.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY,

We have the honour to submit to your Excellency our Thirty-first Annual Report on the condition of Hospitals in this city which receive aid from Parliament, and which were duly inspected by us during the year ending 31st March, 1889.

These are :-

1. Westmorland Lock Hospital.

- 2. The House of Industry Hospitals, viz :
 - a. Hardwicke Fever Hospital.
 - b. Whitworth Medical Hospital.
 - c. Richmond Surgical Hospital.
- 3. Steevens's Hospital.
- 4. Meath Hospital and County Dublin Infirmary.
- 5. Cork-street Fever Hospital.6. Rotunda Lying-in Hospital.
- 7. Coombe Lying-in Hospital.
- 8. St. Mark's Ophthalmic Hospital; and
- Royal Hospital for Incurables, which receives a portion of the Concordatum Fund.

On making these inspections we inquired into the state of each institution to ascertain if the buildings were in good order, the general management satisfactory, and if due provision were made for the comfort of the patients, and all necessary attention given to them.

We examined the dietaries in use, and the manner of serving the food to the patients, and inquired into the nursing arrange4

ments, and such other matters as might assist us to supervise these hospitals, and report thereon in accordance with the provisions of the 18th section of the Act 19 & 20 Vic., cap. 110.

On the 1st of April, 1888, there remained 747 patients in these Hospitals.

The number admitted during the year was 8,820, making the total under treatment 9,567, of whom 8,410 left either cured or relieved, or were discharged for other causes, and 400 died.

Seven hundred and fifty-seven patients remained in these Hospitals on 31st March, 1889.

The mortality was 479 per cent. on those treated to a termination.

The total average daily number of beds occupied in these Hospitals throughout the year was 682.87.

The time spent in Hospital of each patient under treatment (omitting the inmates of the Hospital for Incurables) averaged 21.15 days.

Appendix.—Table No. 1 shows a list of diseases of patients treated in the several Hospitals and the number that died of any particular disease during the year ended 31st March, 1889.

Table No. 2 shows the average cost per bed occupied throughout the year ending 31st March, 1889, for maintenance and for establishment, and for both, exclusive of buildings and furniture.

Table No. 3 shows the several sources of income of each Hospital.

Table No. 4 sets forth in detail the chief heads of expenditure of each Hospital.

Table No. 5 gives the number of patients treated in each Hospital, the mortality per cent., the average daily number of beds occupied during the year, and the present extent of accommodation for each class of patients.

Table No. 6 shows the prices of articles supplied to each Hospital per contract or otherwise.

Table No. 7 gives the various dietaries in use in each Hospital.

Table No. 8, gives the names of the Governors of each Hospital, and number of attendances during the year.

WESTMORLAND LOCK HOSPITAL.

We found the several departments of this Hospital in good order but the aspect of the wards was one of extreme gloom, which may be ascribed to the internal arrangements, and to the structural defects of the building.

We perceived no supply of books for the patients, no prints on the walls, or any object that could give a cheerful idea to the

mind of an invalid.

We feel, however, sure that the benevolent ladies who visit

the patients will be able to effect many improvements.

We consider that Lock Hospitals should be made attractive to patients, so that they might be induced to seek admission at the earliest stage of their disease, and that the authorities should have power to detain them in Hospital until complete recovery.

Although 700 to 800 patients are admitted annually to this. Institution, its usefulness as a means of curing and preventing

the spread of disease seems not as efficient as it should be.

Dr. FitzGibbon, one of the Visiting Surgeons, informed us "that patients do not avail themselves of this Hospital until their disease has become aggravated or confirmed by delay and neglect, and unfortunately they too frequently demand their discharge when only convalescent or partially cured."

As on former occasions, we endeavoured to ascertain if there existed any reasonable or well-founded objection to the Institution or if there was any want of kindness on the part of the nurses or attendants, or if the dietary was objected to. In reply to our

interrogations no complaints were made.

The laundry department continues to be well worked, and the clothes are dried in an adjoining yard if the weather permits, so as to expose them to air and sunlight as much as possible.

The lavatories and bath-rooms are not what they should be, the supply of hot water is deficient, and there are no appliances

for carrying out hydropathic treatment.

The practical conclusions to which we are finally conducted are these:—that the Hospital ought to be re-built on modern principles, and on a more favourable site in a less densely populated neighbourhood, where available ground could be secured in which patients might have fresh air and exercise.

We are of opinion that a special Hospital in Dublin is necessary for the reception and treatment of female patients affected with venereal diseases; to admit indiscriminately such patients into the wards of a General Hospital, and to associate them with women and children otherwise affected, would be highly objectionable.

There were 51 patients in this institution on the 1st of April, 1888; 594 were admitted, and 15 infants were born in the house during the year; 576 patients were discharged; 14 died; and 70 remained on the 31st of March, 1889.

The mortality was 2.37 per cent. on the total number treated

to a termination.

The time spent in Hospital by each patient averaged 32.41 days, and the average daily number of beds occupied during the year was 58.62.

STEEVENS'S HOSPITAL.

We have much pleasure in reporting that since our last visit, most of the wards, with the exception of Nos. 1 and 2, have been painted and renovated, and appear neat and scrupulously clean.

Many minor improvements, at our suggestion, have been adopted, but there are others involving slight expenditure which might also be introduced, such as the insertion of open wirework panels in doors of clothes presses, to admit air freely and to permit uninterrupted inspection, &c.

We ascertained that the nurses perform their duty with intelligence and fidelity, and the patients receive every care and

attention.

The cooking appliances were sufficient, and the several articles

of food which we examined were of good quality.

The tea served at breakfast formed a subject for remark from some of the patients, and considering the manner in which it is prepared, we fear there may be some reason for complaint. The matron, however, signified that other arrangements are contemplated.

We observed that a separate ward on the second floor had been

converted into a maternity for the wives of soldiers.

This department is isolated as far as possible from the service of the Hospital. A qualified midwife has been engaged to devote her entire attention to the lying-in patients, and the strictest antiseptic precautions are adopted to maintain a perfect sanitary condition.

The beds and bedding are new, and a separate supply of linen

has been purchased.

All soiled articles are removed at once from this ward to the laundry, and washed apart from the general linen of the Hospital. No student who performs autopsies, attends dissecting rooms or wards which admit infectious cases, is permitted to

examine lying-in patients.

Although the resources of modern science have to a great extent proved safeguards against the peculiar dangers which beset lying-in wards, we cannot refrain from expressing an opinion on the inexpediency of having a maternity ward in a general Hospital, for wherever this plan is tried it is sure to be abandoned sooner or later after disastrous results.

We are of opinion that in the interests of the patients, a suitable and detached building should be used for the purpose. This subject demands the most serious attention of the Governors.

On the 1st April, 1888, 68 patients remained in Hospital; 1,101 were admitted during the year; 1,040 were discharged; 38 died; and 91 remained on the 31st of March, 1889.

The mortality was 3.52 on the total number treated to a

termination.

The time spent in Hospital by each patient averaged 24:38 days, and the average daily number of beds occupied during the year was 78:10.

THE MEATH HOSPITAL.

Every department of this hospital was in perfect order and supplied with the most modern improvements admirably carried out. We observed, however, on the day of inspection, that, owing to the number of applicants for admission, nearly all the beds in the Hospital were occupied, and in one of the surgical

wards they were in too close proximity.

On a former occasion we endeavoured to impress on Hospital authorities the necessity of allotting at least 100 feet of floor space for each bed, and, if possible, to reserve a few vacancies so as to permit the bedding to be exposed to air and sunlight previous to the admission of new cases. We have also urged that wards should be systematically emptied in rotation for thorough purification so as to prevent the danger of gradual contamination of the building.

The ward floors are stained and waxed, which obviates the necessity of frequent washing and the unwholesome dampness

arising from a wet surface.

The nursing arrangements are well carried out under the Lady Superintendent, and several of the patients testified to us as to the care and attention they experienced from the attendants. We found the food for the patients of good quality, and the kitchen and store-room well lighted. The cooking appliances are of the best description. The kitchen has been entirely refitted and much improved.

The hydraulic lift, worked by Vartry water pressure, is found

to be of great service and to economise labour.

We observed with satisfaction that, since our last inspection, the new addition, known as the "Barber wing and Bury wards," has been completed. The axis of this building is north and south, with windows on either side which admit the morning and evening sunlight and facilitate thorough ventilation.

Each of the two upper stories contains a most commodious, well-aired, and comfortable ward. On the two lower landings

there are apartments for resident officials, board rooms, &c.

In addition to access obtained through the main building a separate staircase and entrance have been provided, and the connecting corridor is so arranged that, if necessary, the entire wing can be isolated from the main building. Each landing is provided with excellent closets, and lavatories supplied with hot water, and water taps, and enamelled basins. There are also capital porcelain baths.

The new mortuary is also well lighted and drained, and affords

ample space for *post-mortem* examinations.

Through the munificence of the Earl and Countess of Meath the Governors of this Hospital have a convalescent home, containing fourteen beds, at Bray, placed at their disposal, where patients recovering from disease or injury, or those requiring change of air previous to operation are transferred. We should have thought that this arrangement would lessen the strain on the ward accommodation by setting free a number of beds, but

this does not appear to be the case.

There were \$\frac{3}{2}\$ patients in this Hospital at the commencement of the year; 1,186 were admitted; 1,103 discharged; 64 died; and 102 remained on the 31st March, 1889.

The mortality was 5.48 per cent, on the total number treated

to a termination.

The time spent in Hospital by each patient averaged 24:17 days, and the average daily number of beds occupied during the year was 84:04.

CORK-STREET FEVER HOSPITAL.

This Institution continues to be worked efficiently, and its sanitary condition is satisfactory. The wards are all well, but not excessively, ventilated. They are scrupulously clean, and the beds are far enough apart.

Small-pox, typhus, measles, and scarlatina cases are segregated in wards or houses, each of which may be said to have its own establishment of nurses and ward-maids, who all wear uniforms

that can be, and are frequently, washed.

The patients are clothed at the expense of the Institution

during their stay in Hospital.

We found the rations of good quality, and the kitchen accommodation and cooking utensils sufficient and in good order.

The sewerage is said to be efficient, with facilities for flushing

and inspection.

We were informed that the means of heating having been found defective in the wooden house during the prevalence of cold weather, when occupied by small-pox patients, the stoves have been altered to remedy this condition.

In the Epidemic House improved closets and sanitary arrange-

ments have been substituted for those hitherto in use.

New windows have been put into the lower wards of the Fever House which admit of overhead ventilation; a porch has been built on the east side of the building; and the central hall stove improved. The result of these alterations has been found most beneficial.

The block of buildings standing near the east boundary wall, known as "The Old Laundry," being in need of renovation, the Managing Committee decided to convert one end into a nurses' residence, provided with a hot-water bath and proper sanitary arrangements, and to set apart the other end as a store for the clothing belonging to patients.

The laundry has been entirely remodelled, and new appliances brought into use, so that the clothes are now steam boiled, and

well ironed and aired without extra labour.

These improvements will it is hoped, when in full working order, effect a saving of expense and an improvement in the means of disinfecting.

All the interior of the House of Recovery, together with the outside woodwork of this building, were painted during the

The expenditure on establishment charges, as published in our last Report, being in excess of preceding year, suggested an inquiry on our part. In reply we have been informed that the outbreak of small-pox necessitated the employment of extra nurses and the opening of additional wards for isolation purposes.

The death of the Lady Superintendent imposed additional duties on Dr. Chandlee, the late Resident Medical Officer, for which he received a gratuity, but having subsequently lost his health in the services of the Institution, the Governors agreed to give him £50 to defray expenses for a voyage to the Mediterranean, which he undertook, but unhappily died on the passage home. This explains to a great extent the increased expenditure for the period referred to.

The various registries and financial accounts are well and carefully kept, and the Managing Committee testify to the zeal and assiduity with which the officers of the Institution have dis-

charged their arduous duties during the past year.

At the commencement of the year 71 patients remained in the Hospital; 571 were admitted; 489 discharged; 76 died; and 77 remained on the 31st March, 1889.

The mortality was 13.45 per cent. on those treated to a

termination.

The average daily number of beds occupied was 43:11, and the time spent in Hospital by each patient averaged 24:50 days.

HOUSE OF INDUSTRY HOSPITALS.

The patients in these hospitals are carefully attended to, and the beds and bedding are in proper order. We ascertained that there was an ample supply of linen, and that the several articles were properly washed and aired. Towels and other appliances for washing the sick are well arranged and well supplied. We suggest, as an improvement, that every ward be provided with some small dinner cloths for use when patients are confined to bed. These little cloths being spread, save the bed from grease and give an air of comfort to dinner arrangements.

The various samples of food we examined were of good quality

and the cooking satisfactory.

We observed that the floors are stained and waxed, which renders them to a great extent non-absorbent, and obviates the

necessity of frequent scouring.

In July last the Board of Governors resolved to give practical effect to the recommendations submitted to them in a report prepared by a joint-committee, consisting of members of the Board and members of the Medical Staff, who had been deputed to enquire and report on the nursing and other matters of detail—with a view to improvement thereof. The Board of Governors have accordingly appointed two trained medical and surgical superintendents of nurses—one to act in the Whitworth, the other in the Richmond Hospital—at salaries (including sum allowed for Board) of £86 per annum each. It also became necessary to fit up and furnish rooms in the Whitworth and Richmond Hospitals for the use of the superintendents of nurses.

The Matron having been wholly relieved of the charge and responsibility of the nursing and housekeeping arrangements of the Whitworth and Richmond Hospitals, is thereby enabled to devote her undivided attention to the supervision of the Hardwicke Hospital, the general kitchen, and the laundry.

Amongst other recent improvements, the following may be

noted :-

Richmond Hospital.—Interior painted throughout in superior style; pillows supplied for use of patients; mattresses and palliasses renewed; bedside lockers provided; ward screens provided; furniture and bedding generally repaired, renovated, or replaced with new; ward tables covered with suitable material; uniform of nurses improved; two additional day nurses and one additional night nurse appointed.

Whitworth Hospital.—Same remarks as to improvements are applicable to Whitworth as well as Richmond—except as to increase of nurses; poison presses under lock and key, also poison

antidote cases have been provided.

Estimates are under consideration for fitting up suitable bath-

rooms for use of patients.

Hardwicke Hospital.—Interior whitewashed and cleaned down; poison presses erected in wards; antidote case available; nurses supplied with clinical thermometers and required to take

temperatures.

Laundry Department.—New set of washing troughs provided; renewal of clothes boiler, and setting up of same in disused engine room; abandonment of old washing room, which was found defective from low ceiling, condensation of vapour, and want of light and ventilation; setting up new troughs in adjoining large room, where the defects complained of in old room do not exist; laundry drying closet, furnace, water pipes, &c., repaired and left

The order and neatness of the wards reflects credit on all those concerned in maintaining this condition. We were not, however, satisfied with the arrangements in the Hardwicke Hospital, for on the day of inspection we found three patients under treatment for scarlatina, contracted in the wards while recovering from measles. We suggested that arrangements should be made for isolating cases of typhus, typhoid, scarlatina, &c., and that "Observation Wards" should be constructed where all doubtful cases can be placed until the true nature of the disease becomes evident. We are pleased to learn that the Governors have had these suggestions carried out although at very considerably increased expense. This, with the other most valuable improvements lately made in the management of the Institution, have caused a reduction in the number of beds now available.

As the circumstances connected with a distressing case of poisoning, which occurred in this Institution in October last, had been fully investigated at the time, we did not deem it expedient to institute a special inquiry, but addressed a communication to each hospital to ascertain if due precautions were adopted for the custody and administration of poisonous drugs, and if the ordinary antidotes and the requisite surgical appliances to treat such

cases, were at all times available. To these queries satisfactory

answers or explanations have been afforded.

The valuable collection of pathological specimens belonging to the surgeons of the Richmond Hospital, has during the year been disposed of to the Royal University, and the medical staff signify that its removal in no way interferes with the efficacy of the teaching at these hospitals, inasmuch as students are still taught the recent *post-mortem* appearances of diseases as cases arise. Considering the present developed condition of pathological science, no attempt can be made to treat systematic pathology in hospitals. As a matter of fact, hospitals do not maintain pathological museums for teaching purposes, distinct courses being formed in medical schools for that study.

The out-patient department of these Hospitals is very extensive. During the past year 9,479 patients were treated in the Medical Dispensary—while in the Surgical Hospital 17,025 cases (ophthalmic and aural included) were treated, and 321 trusses supplied

to the ruptured poor.

HARDWICKE HOSPITAL.

Thirty-eight patients remained in this Hospital on the 1st of April, 1888; 484 were admitted, and one infant was born in the house, during the year; 441 were discharged; 60 died, giving a mortality of 11.98 per cent. on the total number of cases treated to a termination.

The average daily number of beds occupied throughout the year was 30.66, and the time spent in Hospital by each patient averaged

21.39 days.

WHITWORTH HOSPITAL.

On the 1st of April, 1888, 66 patients remained in Hospital; 584 were admitted; 558 were discharged; 53 died, giving a mortality of 8.67 per cent. on the total number of cases treated to a termination.

The average daily number of beds occupied throughout the year was 41.80, and the time spent in Hospital by each patient under treatment averaged 23.47 days.

RICHMOND HOSPITAL.

There were 85 patients in this Hospital when the year commenced; 695 were admitted; 701 were discharged; 24 died; giving a mortality of 3.31 per cent. on 725 cases treated to a termination.

The average daily number of beds occupied in the year was 55.76, and the time spent in Hospital by each patient averaged

26.09 days.

ROTUNDA LYING-IN HOSPITAL.

This Hospital is conducted with efficiency and the most rigid attention is given to details in regard to cleanliness and order.

Wire-woven mattresses are in use throughout the wards, and the bedding appeared neat and tidy.

The linen supply is ample and the laundry arrangements are satisfactory.

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As it is of the utmost importance that lying-in wards should be ventilated as perfectly as possible, we suggested in a former Report that funnels communicating with the outer air by a shaft or flue, should be fitted over each gas jet, by which means the heated and vitiated air could be carried off from the ward.

On the day of inspection the labour wards did not appear overcrowded, but in calculating the available air space, the num-

ber of pupils in attendance must be considered.

Pupils are required to perform ablutions and to use disinfectants previous to examining patients, but considering that these disinfecting solutions contain active poisons and might be mistaken for pure water, we suggested, with the view of guarding against such an accident, that all antiseptic solutions should be invariably coloured, and, if possible, less accessible to patients.

Independently of the great value of this Institution as a lyingin hospital, the list of diseases treated in the auxiliary department, shows how considerably it contributes to the relief of women affected with very serious acute or chronic diseases, and how much it must be a means of imparting practical information to

those who attend the clinical teaching.

We ascertained that every precaution is taken to prevent the influx of sewer gas, the soil pipes being properly ventilated, and the waste pipes of sinks, lavatories, and baths being severed from direct connection with the drains, and made to discharge over properly trapped gullies.

We visited the kitchen, tasted some of the articles of diet, and saw the dinners about to be sent up to the wards, which were of

good quality.

On the 1st of April, 1888, there were 24 patients in the labour wards; 1,538 were admitted during the year; 1,254 were discharged after delivery; 274 were discharged, not having been delivered; 4 died; and 30 remained in the Hospital at the end of the year.

Twenty-seven patients remained in the auxiliary or chronic

department on the 1st of April, 1888.

Four hundred and seventeen were admitted; 405 discharged; 17 died in the year ended 31st March, 1889, and 22 then remained.

The average daily number of beds occupied throughout the year by labour cases was 31·11, and that of the chronic class 23·15. The time spent in Hospital by labour cases averaged 7·26 days, and that by the chronic class 20·02 days.

The mortality of the labour patients, deducting the 274 non-parturient cases, was 32 per cent., and that of the chronic class

4.03 per cent.

COOMBE LYING-IN HOSPITAL.

This Hospital continues to maintain a high reputation for affording a practical knowledge in midwifery, and in diseases peculiar to women.

We found the wards clean, and well ventilated, and the patients properly attended—the stock of linen, and bedding in store, and in use, were said to be adequate for the requirements of the Hospital.

The result of our examination of the different articles of food was satisfactory, and the kitchen utensils were sufficient, and in order.

The buildings were in good repair, and the sewerage efficient. We observed that all pipes leading from lavatories and sinks are not in direct communication with the sewers, but are disconnected, and discharge over trapped gratings.

The dead house is sufficiently distant from the Hospital, and is well ventilated, but on the day of inspection it was unclean,

for which no valid excuse was given,

The inadequate provision to meet an outbreak of fire merits the attention of the Guardians and Directors, and we must again draw attention to the danger of storing in the basement the straw for the patients' bedding. We have frequently before adverted to this matter, which requires immediate and special attention.

The registers and books of finance are generally speaking carefully kept, but on the day of inspection we were unable to examine them, owing to the absence of the Master and the Registrar.

Fifteen labour cases remained in Hospital on the 1st of April, 1888; 642 were admitted during the year; 441 were discharged;

9 died; and 15 remained at the close of the year.

Fifteen patients remained in the chronic wards on the 1st of April, 1888; 215 were admitted; 206 discharged; 5 died, and 19

remained at the end of the year.

The average daily number of beds occupied during the year by labour cases was 12.03, and by chronic cases 14.55. The time spent in Hospital by labour patients averaged 6.68 days, and that by the chronic class 23.13 days.

The mortality of patients admitted to the labour wards, deducting 192 that were discharged, not having been delivered, was 9 deaths, in 450 cases, or 200 per cent., and that of the chronic

class was 2.37 per cent.

ST. MARK'S OPHTHALMIC.

This Hospital continues to afford considerable relief to extern as well as to intern patients, and whatever active supervision can do to maintain cleanliness and order is carried out by the present Lady Superintendent.

We fear that the structural defects of the basement, and the overcrowding of some of the wards mar to a great extent the working of the Hospital. The fact is that the work performed in the Hospital has increased so much that, although it was re-

cently enlarged, it requires further additions.

If funds were available we would suggest for the consideration of the Governors the expediency of building a new wing, which would afford additional ward accommodation, and provide for the complete re-arrangement of the administrative department, including the erection of a kitchen, offices, and store-rooms. These additions and alterations would add to the comfort and well-being of the patients.

On the 1st of April, 1888, 37 patients were in Hospital; 725 were admitted during the year; 719 were discharged; 43 then remained.

No death occurred during the year.

The average daily number of beds occupied was 42.44, and the time spent in Hospital by each patient averaged 20.32 days.

THE ROYAL HOSPITAL FOR INCURABLES.

On the day of inspection order, regularity, and cleanliness, prevailed throughout the several departments of this Institution.

The domestic arrangements for promoting the comfort of the patients continue to receive the anxious attention of the

Governors.

We observed that "The Victoria Jubilee Wing," which has been in process of erection since our last inspection is now approaching completion. The additional space afforded is urgently required to segregate cancer and consumption patients, also for day rooms, bath rooms, and lavatories as well as suitable accommodation for the staff. It is intended to adopt the most recent appliances for heating, sanitation, and ventilation.

The grave character of the cases admitted is indicated by the

high rate of mortality.

The provision for extinguishing an outbreak of fire is well considered, hydrants being fixed internally with proper lengths of hose in connection.

Of the quality of food supplied, and the cooking, we are able

to speak with satisfaction.

One hundred and sixty-seven patients remained in Hospital on the 1st of April, 1888; 52 cases were admitted; 11 were discharged or resigned; 36 died during the year; and 172 remained on the 30th March, 1889.

The mortality was 76.59 per cent. on the total number of cases

treated to a termination.

The time spent in Hospital by each patient averaged 279 12 lavs.

The average daily number of beds occupied during the year was

167.50.
