IN obedience to the Order of the House of Commons, bearing date the 27th day of May 1834, whereby it was Ordered, That there be laid before The House a Return of all the Law Expenses hitherto attending the execution of the Commission under the Irish Church Temporalities Act, specifying the Solicitors and Counsel employed, the number of Counsel whose opinion was taken in each case, and the Fees thereon, and the amount of the several demands for Costs by their solicitors for all Law business done under said Act, specifying the amount and nature of the several demands;—I herewith transmit two Bills of Costs furnished by Messrs. September 25.—Having been appointed Solicitors to the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for Ireland, attending Mr. Quin, one of the Commissioners, when he stated that the Commissioners would hold a meeting at 12 o'clock on the following day, at his house in Stephen's Green, and that our attendance was required, and he handed us an original lease, dated 3d April 1813, from Joseph late Lord Bishop of Waterford and Lismore, as Trustee of Bishop Gore's charitable bequest to Richard Lord Baron Cahir, Edmond Walsh, Edmond Gauran, John Herrick, and Stephen Morrisy, of the impropriate tithes of the parish of Cahir, county Tipperary, for the term of 21 years from the 25th of March then last past, at the yearly rent of £.560, payable half yearly, and also a certificate under the archiepiscopal seal of the Archbishop of Cashel, dated 15th of November 1819, whereby it was certified, under the Act of 12 Geo. 1., that Richard Lord Bishop of Waterford and Lismore had expended £.1,959. 19. 7. in improvements on the See-house and Offices, and that £.1,006. 8. 2½, being three-fourths of £.1,341. 7. 7., together with £.425. charged by a former certificate, was a charge to be paid to the said Richard Lord Bishop of Waterford by his immediate successor, which it might be necessary for us to peruse before attending the Board, in order to report thereon	—	6	8
