### TO HIS EXCELLENCY GEORGE WILLIAM FREDERICK, EARL OF CLARENDON,

LORD LIEUTENANT-GENERAL AND GENERAL GOVERNOR OF IRELAND, &c. &c &c.

WE, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for Ireland, whose hands and corporate seal are hereunto annexed, beg to report to your Excellency the proceedings of the Commissioners for the year ending the 1st day of August instant, pursuant to the provisions of the 3 & 4 Will. 4, c. 37.

The Commissioners, since their last Report, have been enabled, with the assistance of private subscriptions, to undertake the rebuilding of the Churches of Kilsaran, in the Diocese of Armagh; Upper Moville, in the Diocese of Derry; Doon, in the Diocese of Emly; Skull, in the Diocese of Cork; Kilfinane, in the Diocese of Limerick; Knocknamuckley, in the Diocese of Dromore; Ballyovie, in the Diocese of Tuam; and Castletown Arra, in the Diocese of Killaloe; and to grant a sum of 200 l., in addition to the same amount heretofore provided, towards the completion of the Church of Achill, in the Diocese of Tuam, which has been commenced by the Incumbent and Parishioners.

The Commissioners have been again obliged, from the depressed state of their funds, to postpone altogether the enlargement of Churches as well as the building of additional Churches. We have however the satisfaction to state, that accommodation for increasing Congregations continues to be provided in many instances by means of private funds, not only by the enlargement of the present buildings, but also by the erection of additional Churches; the cases of enlargement referred to are those of Carrigrohane, in the Diocese of Cork; Headford, in the Diocese of Tuam; Coleraine, in the Diocese of Connor; Tamlaght-Finlagan, in the Diocese of Derry; Pallas Grean, in the Diocese of Emly; Shankill, in the Diocese of Dromore; and Rathcoony, in the Diocese of Cork. The additional Churches are Colaghty and Castle Archdall, in the Diocese of Clogher; St. Mathew (Lisburn), in the Diocese of Connor; Groomsport, in the Diocese of Down; Carrick, in the Diocese of Derry; Scarva, in the Diocese of Dromore; and Sandymount, in the Diocese of Dublin; which have been brought under the notice of the Commissioners this year, with the view of being placed under their charge. In addition to these are the Churches of Killanin (Spiddal) and Moyardbridge, in the Diocese of Tuam; Ballycroy, in the Diocese of Killalla; and Bective, in the Diocese of Meath, which are now being erected, also by means of private subscriptions, under the superintendence of the Commissioners.

The Church of Clonegam, in the Diocese of Lismore, is also being rebuilt from private funds, with the exception of 115 l. 7 s. 6 d. promised by the Commissioners on the completion of the Works, being the estimated cost of repairing the old Building, which, although worthy of repair, is inconveniently situated for the majority of the Protestant parishioners, and insufficient for the accommodation of the present Congregation. The Commissioners, as successors to the Board of First Fruits, have lately signified their assent, pursuant to the provisions of the Act of the 1st Geo. 2, c. 18, to the Endowment 23.

of a Chapel of Ease in the Parish of Dunlovey and Diocese of Raphoe, by Mrs. Jane Russell, of Dunlovey House, in the County of Donegal, who has likewise supplied or procured sufficient funds for the erection of the Church and Glebe House.

The contributions, payable under the terms of the certificates approved by the Lord Lieutenant and Council, for the repairs of the Cathedral Churches of Armagh, Waterford, Elphin, and Cashel, have been received from the respective Deans and Chapters, amounting to 105 l. 14 s. 6 d. The inadequacy of the funds of the Board to meet the several well-founded demands upon them, and the urgent necessity of providing, as far as practicable, within each year, for the rebuilding of such Churches as are unworthy of repair, and in a dilapidated condition, have obliged the Commissioners, for some years past, to reduce their grants for general repairs much below the sums required by their architect; the consequence has been, that notwithstanding the most careful application of the sums available for Works of this nature, the demands for repairs have been annually increasing; a circumstance much to be regretted, when it is considered, that by the last Report it appears that a sum of 260,000 l. was required for the rebuilding, enlargement, and internal painting of Churches, the enclosure of Churchyards and other necessary Church Works; whereas the only sum then available for those objects was 16,321 l. 5 s. 5 d.; of the sum appropriated to Church Works this year, amounting to 17,005 l. 18 s. 3 d., 11,582 l. 2 s. 8 d. only has been applied to repairs, which latter sum has been in course of expenditure on the most necessary Works of 917 Churches.

Dilapidations incurred on the See House and Premises at Clogher, during the incumbency of the late Bishop, having been duly awarded by the Metropolitan, to the amount of 2,005 l. 16 s. 1 d., the Commissioners have paid to the Bishop's Executors the sum of 1,466 l. 13 s. 5 d., being the difference between the sum so awarded and the first moiety of the charge subsisting on the See for Buildings and Improvements. The See House and Demesne, containing 522 acres, have been extensively advertised for letting, but no adequate proposal has been as yet received, except for a distinct portion of the lands of an inferior quality, consisting of 75 A. 2 R. 38 P., plantation measure, which have been let, with the sanction of your Excellency, to Whitney Moutray, Esquire, on a lease for 999 years, reserving a reduced rent of 20 l. 16 s. in consideration of the payment of 416 l. 16 s. 6 d. in the way of fine, and of 15 l. for the growing timber. The latter sums have been invested in Government Securities for account of the Clogher See Estate.

The treaty referred to in the last Report for a sale to the Commissioners for administering the Laws for the Relief of the Poor in Ireland, of the See House at Killalla, with 12 A. 1 R. 16 P. of the Demesne Lands, for the purpose of a Poor House for the Killalla Union, has been completed, and the purchase-money, videlicet, 2,000 l., has been invested in Government Securities for account of the Killalla See Estate, less by a sum of 50 l., being the poundage paid to the Usher of the Court of Chancery; the remainder of these Lands, with portions of the Mensal Lands adjoining, which had been in the hands of tenants, containing in all 479 A. 1 R. 13 P., have been since let, with the sanction of your Excellency, to Mr. Edward Atkinson, on lease for three lives or 31 years, at a rent of 221 l. 18 s. 8 d., the punctual payment of which has been secured by the lessee and two solvent sureties.

A small portion of the lands belonging to the Deanery of Christ Church, now vested in the Board, has been conveyed to the Commissioners for the regulation of Asylums for the Lunatic Poor in Ireland, for the purpose of enlarging the Richmond Lunatic Asylum, same having been purchased under an inquisition, pursuant to the several Acts of Parliament on the subject.

Abatements of rents, in cases similar to those mentioned in the last Report, have been made to the amount of 647 l. 19 s. 5 l. d., and arrears of rent, ascertained to be wholly irrecoverable, have also been been cancelled to the amount of 155 l. 14 s. 3 d.

The Commissioners have received an application from the Mining Company



of Ireland, to whom are leased the Copper Mines at Knockmahon, in the County of Waterford (part of the See Estate of Waterford) now vested in the Board, for a temporary remission of the Royalty Rent, on the ground of the comparatively unproductive state of these mines for the last few years, and of the necessity of expensive operations being resorted to, with the view of restoring them to their former profitable condition. In considering this question, the Commissioners have availed themselves of the skill and experience of Richard Griffith, Esquire, the eminent Civil Engineer, and Chairman of the Board of Works, who has kindly taken much trouble to investigate this claim, and to suggest the conditions on which it should be acceded to; the result has been that, on his recommendation, the Commissioners have consented to a relinquishment of the Royalty Rent, for a limited period, subject to the conditions suggested.

The treaty referred to in a former Report, for a sale by the Ecclesiastical Commissioners, under the provisions of the Act 3 & 4 Vict., c. 108, sect. 149, of the advowson or right of presentation to the four Benefices into which the wardenship of Galway was divided, has been completed, and the purchasemoney, amounting to 2,000 l., has been paid to the Town Commissioners of Galway, after deducting therefrom, with their assent, the expenses incurred in bringing these advowsons to sale.

An application has been received from the Council of the borough of Waterford, pursuant to the provisions of the statute 3 & 4 Vict., c. 108, requesting the consent of the Commissioners to the Sale of the Advowson of Rosbercon, in the Diocese of Ossory, belonging to this Corporation, for a sum of 920 l., pursuant to a proposal received from Mr. Henry D'Olier, and it appearing that every effort had been theretofore made by the Corporation to procure the best price, the Commissioners have signified their assent to this sale, but they have not yet been called on to execute the deed of conveyance.

The Commissioners have also received an application from the Town Commissioners of Clonmel, to give their sanction to the sale of the advowson of St. Mary's parish, in that town, and Diocese of Lismore, for a sum of 800 l., the Town Council representing to the Commissioners that it had been advertised for sale at various times since the year 1843, and that they had not received any eligible offer. The Commissioners have, however, declined to consent to this sale for the sum proposed, considering it inadequate, with reference to the annual value of the Benefice, and they have suggested to the Town Council that the sale of this advowson should be again advertised, after a limited period, if a better offer should not in the meantime be received.

By the half-yearly returns of promotions-received from the Archbishops and Bishops, it appears that 87 benefices have become vacant within the year, consisting of 19 Dignities and Prebends, and 68 Parochial Benefices; of these 25 only appear to be taxable. In respect to the Dignities and Prebends, the Commissioners caused the respective vacancies to be duly notified to your Excellency and the Privy Council; in the cases of the Prebends of Fenore, in the Diocese of Clonfert, Kinvarra, in the Diocese of Kilmacduagh, Kilmoylan, in the Diocese of Tuam, and Seskenan, in the Diocese of Lismore, and in the case of the treasurship of the Cathedral Church of Waterford, the appointments thereto have, on the recommendation of the Commissioners, been suspended by your Excellency and the Council, under the provisions of the Acts 4 & 5 Will. 4, c. 90, and 6 & 7 Will. 4, c. 99. But in the case of the Prebend of Donoughmore, in the Diocese of Ross, the suspension of the appointment to which had also been recommended by the Commissioners, your Excellency and the Privy Council have not made any order, a statement having been submitted by the Diocesan, and forwarded by the Commissioners, for the consideration of your Excellency and the Council, containing reasons why such appointment should not be suspended. In regard to the Parochial Benefices, the appointment of a clerk to the Vicarage of Innismott, in the Diocese of Meath, has been suspended by the authority of the Commissioners, being a benefice within which Divine Service had not been celebrated within the three years ending the 1st of February 1833; and provision has been made for the occasional duties of the parish, which have been committed, on the nomination of the Diocesan, to the Curate of the adjoining Benefice.

Under the powers vested in your Excellency and the Privy Council, the suspensions of the appointments to the Precentorship of Christ Church, Dublin, and to the Prebend of Donoughmore, in the Diocese of Limerick, have been removed, as also to the Prebend of Fenore, in the Diocese of Clonfert, and of Kinvarra, in the Diocese of Kilmacduagh, subject, however, to the severance of all emoluments, which have been in the two former cases transferred to the Commissioners; but in the two latter the revenues, consisting of portions of Tithe rent-charge, have, by Order of your Excellency and the Council, been annexed to the Rectories and Vicarages of the several parishes from which they arise. The Commissioners have received the Order of your Excellency and the Privy Council, disappropriating from the Prebend of Rasharkin, in the Diocese of Connor, the parish of Finvoy, and annexing it to the perpetual Curacy of that name; also disappropriating therefrom the Parish of Kildallock-Grange, and constituting same into a separate Benefice, leaving the Vicarage of Rasharkin and the Rectory of Kilraghts to form the future corps of this dignity. They have also received the Order of your Excellency and the Privy Council, disappropriating from the Archdeaconry of Dublin the parishes of Taney and Rathfarnham, which have been formed into distinct Benefices; and directing that the residue of the corps, as heretofore constituted, shall thenceforward form the new corps of this dignity.

Referring to the Order of the Lord Lieutenant and Privy Council, which vested in the Commissioners in the year 1841 the property belonging to the Vicar Choral of Tuam, we have to report to your Excellency that an opportunity has been lately afforded to the Commissioners, by the death of the Rev. John Galbraith, who received the entire income of this property, to consider in what manner the proceeds thereof should be for the future applied, under the provisions of the Act 6 & 7 Will. 4, c. 99; and it appearing desirable that same should be wholly appropriated to the maintenance of an efficient Choir within the Cathedral of Tuam, the Commissioners have, in conference with the Dean and Chapter, distributed the Income accordingly amongst the several persons nominated by the Dean and Chapter.

Since the passing of the Act of the 11th & 12th of Her present Majesty, c. 80, which empowers the Commissioners, before assessing the tax on Ecclesiastical Benefices, to allow all sums with which the Clergy are properly chargeable on account of poor's rate and county cess, several cases have been brought under their notice, in which the half-yearly valuations enjoined by said Act have operated unjustly towards the Incumbents of small Benefices, by depriving them of the benefit of the full amount of the rates deducted from their incomes, where such rates were more than sufficient to exempt the benefice from tax for any one half year, the Commissioners not being empowered, under the provisions of the Act, to make allowance for such surplus rates in respect of the valuation of the succeeding half-year; the result has been, that in several cases the Clergy of small Benefices have been subjected to the payment of tax, contrary to the spirit and intention of the Church Temporalities Acts, where their net annual incomes, after deducting the rates chargeable to them within the whole year, did not amount to 300 l; under these circumstances the Commissioners felt it to be their duty to submit a Bill for the consideration and approval of the Legislature for the amen dment of the law in this respect, which has been since enacted.

The sales of perpetuities within the year have amounted to 337 l. 2 s. 7 d. only, which sum has been lodged in the Bank of Ireland to the credit of the Perpetuity Purchase Fund; as also a sum of 2,947 l. 15 s. 5 d. received in discharge of mortgages heretofore granted to secure the purchase-money of former sales. These moneys have been invested in Government Securities, as directed by the 6 & 7 Will. 4, c. 99, and there has also been invested in Government Securities, for account of the General Fund, a sum of 15,000 l. to remain at interest until such time as it may be required for the several purposes to which it has been already appropriated.

Under the provisions of the Church Temporalities Acts the sum of 32,929 l. 3 s. 7 d. has been paid for the Salaries of Parish Clerks and Sextons, and the supply of requisites for the celebration of Divine Service in the several Churches

Churches and Chapels; 3,899 l. 15 s. 7 d. to Vicars-choral and Curates of suspended Benefices; 1,960 l. 12 s. 8 d. to the Curates of the city of Dublin, in lieu of the maintenance heretofore provided for them by vestry or other assessments; 186 l. 15 s. 2 d. to Diocesan Schoolmasters; and 979 l. 7s. 9 d. in augmentation of small Benefices, under the Act 3 & 4 of Her present Majesty, exclusive of the sum of 4,222 l. 3 s. 7 d. paid for like purposes out of the bequest of Primate Boulter.

An Account to the 1st of January last, of the Trust Fund arising under Bishop Gore's will, from the Impropriate Tithes of Cahir parish, in the Diocese of Lismore, has been furnished by the Commissioners, as Trustees appointed under an Order of the Court of Chancery, to the Bishop of Cashel and Waterford, pursuant to the directions given to them by said Order.

An Account of the Receipts and Disbursements of the Commissioners, to the 1st instant, is annexed to this Report, showing the sources from whence the Receipts have arisen, and the specific purposes to which they have been applied; also, an Account of the Receipts and Disbursements from Primate Boulter's and Primate Robinson's Funds to the 1st instant.

All which is submitted to your Excellency's consideration.

ECCLESIASTICAL COMMISSION (IRELAND).

REPORT of the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for *Ireland* to the Lord Lieutenant, for the Year ending 1st day of August 1851.
