TWENTY-SECOND REPORT

OF THE

GENERAL PRISONS BOARD, IRELAND,

TO HIS EXCELLENCY GEORGE HENRY, EARL CADOGAN, K.G.,

LORD LIEUTENANT-GENERAL AND GENERAL GOVERNOR OF IRELAND.

General Prisons Board. Dublin Castle. 12th July, 1900.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY.

We have the honour; pursuant to statute, to present this, our Twenty-second Annual Report on the condition of the prisons and prisoners within our jurisdiction, and with respect to the registration of criminals.

The number of prisons and bridewells remains the same as at Number of the date of our last Report.

A list of the several prisons, showing the number of prisoners which can be accommodated in each, is contained in Table XIX. of the Appendix, and a list of the several bridewells in Table XX,

The number of criminal prisoners committed to the local prisons during the year 1899 was 36,122, and the daily average number in custody was 2,614. The corresponding numbers for the previous year were 38,113 and 2,563. There has thus been a reduction of 1,991 in the number of committals, and an increase of 51 in the daily average in custody.

It is satisfactory to note that the number of prisoners com-Short sentence. mitted under sentences of one day's imprisonment has greatly diminished during the past year, only 146 such committals having taken place in 1899 as compared with 594 in 1898. The greatest decrease has taken place in Belfast, where the number of committals for one day has fallen from 529 in 1898 to 8 in 1899. Such sentences are not calculated to have either a deterrent or a reformatory effect.

In last year's Report we noticed that the increase in the com- Committals. mittals for 1898 was almost entirely confined to the prisons of

the three principal cities—Dublin, Belfast, and Cork. The decrease for 1899, now reported, is principally owing to a decrease in the committals to these prisons.

We subjoin a table of the number of committals to and the daily average number of prisoners in the local prisons during a series of years, exclusive of prisoners committed under civil process.

In addition to the committals shown above 76 prisoners were committed during 1899 under civil process.

Bridewells.

Committals to bridewells are not included in the table above. The numbers of such committals during 1899 were 847 males and 249 females.

The decrease in committals to bridewells is remarkable, as shown by subjoined table:—

This decrease is partly owing to the policy of closing bride-wells, which has been carried out during the past twenty-two years, during which the bridewells have been reduced from 95 in 1878 to 14 in 1899, but partly also to causes referred to in our last Annual Report, i.e., the increase in means of communication by rail and the fact that it is becoming better understood how unsuitable bridewells are for any but the shortest periods of detention. For example, while only two bridewells have been closed since 1895 the number of committals to bridewells has fallen from 1,651 in that year to 1,096 in 1899, even though the number of committals to prisons generally has risen during the same period.

The deterrent effect of the larger prisons as compared with bridewells is well exemplified in one locality where the magistrates have recently adopted the practice of committing prisoners to a larger prison instead of to the local bridewell. Many of the nersons committed from the locality referred to for drunkenness in default of paying fines, who have hitherto submitted cheerfully to imprisonment in the bridewell, now invariably pay the fine sooner than undergo the discipline and hard work of the larger prison.

The proportion of prisoners committed for drunkenness Committals for (including those committed for "drunkenness and disorderly drunkenness. conduct," &c.), though somewhat less than last year, amounted to about 50 per cent. of the total number of convicted prisoners committed during the year.

From Table IX. it will be seen that of 713 male and female Education. local prisoners who were classed on committal as "wholly ignorant," 189 learned to read, write, and calculate, 125 to read and write, and 192 to read.

Steps are being taken to supply a larger proportion of instructive and useful books to secular libraries in prisons.

The Fine or Imprisonment (Scotland and Ireland) Act, 1899, Fine or came into operation in this country on 24th March, 1900. Act. Within three months 260 prisoners had availed themselves of its provisions, and the money paid by these prisoners amounted to £124 5s. 11d.

This Act provides that :-

"Where a person is committed to prison for non-payment of a sum adjudged to be paid by the conviction of any court of summary jurisdiction, then, on payment to the governor of the prison, under conditions prescribed by prison rules, of any sum in part satisfaction of the sum so adjudged to be paid, and of any charges for which the prisoner is liable, the term of imprisonment shall be reduced by a number of days bearing as nearly as possible the same proportion to the total number of days for which the prisoner is sentenced as the sum so paid bears to the sum for which he is so liable."

The conduct of the officers has been good. In connection with Conduct of this subject it is satisfactory to note that the amount of the fines inflicted on prison officers has decreased 75 per cent. since 1881-82.

From this table it will be seen that the steady decrease that has been going on for many years in the number of convicts still continues. The decrease is especially noticeable in the case of female convicts, who, twenty years ago numbered over 200, while at present they number only 19.

The conduct of the prisoners has generally been good. Particulars of the punishments inflicted during the year will be found in Table XIV of the Appendix, where the total number of local prisoners punished is shown to be 2,758, and of convicts 107. The number of local prisoners punished represents a percentage of 6.8 and the number of convicts punished a percentage of 21.35 on the total number of local prisoners and convicts respectively in custody during the year. These percentages are substantially the same as last year.

Nineteen male and 4 female juveniles sentenced to 1 month or upwards, were removed to Mountjoy Prison. All these female juveniles were employed at gardening. The males received marked benefit in physique and appearance by physical drill, and all made satisfactory progress in education. It need hardly be stated that the juveniles are absolutely isolated from the adult prisoners, with whom they are in no way brought into contact.

Health and mortality of prisoners. The health of the prisoners was good. There was no case of either typhus or enteric fever. Influenza was more prevalent than usual, and in a few instances was severe.

In Kilkenny two prisoners had diphtheria; one of them had contracted the disease before his admission, the other developed

it in prison. In that town there has been an epidemic of diphtheria extending over the past eighteen months. There were a few cases of erysipelas, but all were of a sporadic character. There was no other zymotic disease of importance.

Among local prisoners there were, excluding executions, eight deaths. Of these two were the result of alcoholism; one arose from syncope following influenza; one from cardiac failure; one was caused by chronic bronchitis; one by prostatic disease; one by acute tuberculosis; and one by peritonitis. Only in the two last cases did the disease originate after reception. In the convict prisons there was one death, which was caused by ervsipelas.

From local prisons 39 were released on medical grounds before expiration of their sentence, and 5 from convict prisons. Of the total number 15 were women who were very near their confinement.

From local prisons 86 were transferred to Lunatic Asylums. Insanity. Out of this number 76 were insane on their committal, and 2 imbecile. Of the remainder 1 is returned as nervous from alcoholic mania, 2 as of doubtful sanity, and 5 as sane. Of these 5 one had been previously an inmate of an asylum, and another was not insane while in prison, but had been insane at the time of committing the crime.

Seven convict prisoners were removed to Dundrum Criminal Asylum. Of these 2 had always been weak-minded.

The Visiting Committees of local prisons have continued to discharge the important duties assigned to them under the Prison Rules.

Prison Industries. The details of the work carried on in the prisons are shown in Table No. XXIV. in the Appendix to this Report. Purely mechanical labour has been reduced to a minimum. Every effort is made to provide the prisoners with such employment as will require the exercise of thought and care on their part, and open air work is encouraged as tending to improve their physical condition. A field of over two acres has recently been brought into cultivation at Sligo Prison, and progress is being made with the tillage of a piece of ground round Castlebar Prison about one and a half acres in extent. Gardening is also largely carried on at Maryborough, Belfast, and Tralee, and in the remaining prisons all available land is cultivated for prison purposes.

The introduction of the scheme of special allowances to officers for instructing and supervising prisoners in certain industries referred to in our last Report has been productive of good results.

Building work and repairs. Table XXII contains particulars of works of reconstruction, repair, &c., carried out in the various prisons during 1899.

All prisons have been kept in good repair and condition; also such portions of old county prisons as are still used as minor prisons.

Though the foundations of the new prison block at Maryborough proved more difficult than was anticipated the contractor has made such progress as to warrant the belief that the contract will be completed early next year

Amongst the many useful works recently carried out by prison labour the following may be specially mentioned, namely, the construction of baths, dressing-rooms, &c., at Mountjoy Prison, forming a valuable and much-needed improvement, and the removal of a number of useless division walls in Cork Female Prison, by which more air and light are admitted to the prison.

In Tables XXVII and XXVIII. will be found particulars of the Expenditure Expenditure on prisons during the past and several previous

Reports which the Board have obtained as to the operations of Prisoners' Aid the certified Prisoners' Aid Societies show that these societies have Societies. been performing much useful work.

Another addition has been made to the number of such Societies by the establishment of the Waterford Prisoners' Aid Society in 1899.

We still contrast unfavourably with England and Scotland in this respect. The majority of our prisons have, so far, no local Prisoners' Aid Society. Much work is thus thrown on the Board, which would be better decentralized and dealt with by local philanthropic effort.

The number of discharged convicts and habitual criminals Registration registered in the year 1899 was 140, as compared with 156 in criminals. the previous year.

In addition to the usual photographing of prisoners, anthro-Pometric measurements with finger prints and photographs were taken in the cases of male convicts and habitual criminals. ystem has already shown good results,

Departmental.

The office of Superintendent of Stores has been abolished and merged into that of Controller of Industries, to which Mr. Edward Metcalfe, the former Superintendent of Stores, was appointed by your Excellency from the 1st April, 1899.

Mr. Richard Lewis, Clerk in charge of Accounts, severed his long connection with this office from the 31st March, 1900, on being appointed to the important position of Clerk in charge of Accounts in the Department of Agriculture and Technical Instruction.

Though the Board are gratified at Mr. Lewis' well-merited advancement in the public service, they much regret the loss which this Office has sustained by the transfer of his valuable services.

The vacancy thus caused has been filled by the promotion of Mr. J. J. Rafter, Clerk of the Second Division, who has been for seventeen years in the Finance Branch of this Office.

Increments.

In pursuance of Order in Council of 29th November, 1898 (clause 20), a copy of which is forwarded herewith, the General Prisons Board have to request that the following instructions shall in future be observed in connection with Increments of Prison Officers' salaries.

Instead of submitting the cases one month beforehand as heretofore for approval, the usual notifications and Conduct Sheets will be forwarded to the Board two days (not counting Sundays) prior to the Increments falling due. If when the Conduct Sheets are returned, it is found that the Increments have been approved, the particulars as required on Form F. 37 (a supply of which is enclosed) will be entered thereon, and the Sub-Accounting Officer will, on the last day of the month, sign and date the Certificate at head of the form, and forward it attached to the Pay List with his monthly account at the usual time. The counter-signature will subsequently be appended in this office.

I am directed by the General Prisons Board to call your attention to Retirement. Clause 18 of the Order in Council of 29th November, 1898, relating to

the Civil Service, which directs that:-

"The provisions of Clause 10 of the Order in Council of the Fifteenth August, One Thousand Eight Hundred and Ninety, as to retirement on account of age shall in future apply to all persons in the established Civil Service of the State; but in the case of persons to whom those provisions have not heretofore been applicable, they shall take effect after the expiration of one year from the date of this Order."

The following is a copy of Clause 10 of the Order in Council of 15th August, 1890, referred to above:-

"It shall be competent for the Head of any Department to call upon any Officer of such Department to retire at the age of sixty on such pension as by the length of his service he is qualified to

receive.

"Retirement shall be compulsory for every Officer on attaining sixty-five years of age; but in special cases the Commissioners of the Treasury may, at the instance of a Department, extend an Officer's employment for a further period in no case exceeding five years, on being satisfied that such Officer's retirement at sixty-five would be detrimental to the interests of the Public Service."

You will please bring these clauses under the notice of the several established (pensionable) Officers on your staff or attached to any Minor Prison or Bridewell for which you account, with the exception of those Officers who were transferred from former local Prison Authority under the Prisons Act of 1877, to whom the clauses do not apply.

The clauses need not be communicated to Chaplains and Medical Officers appointed since 1st April, 1878, who are not required to give their whole time to the Public Service, as the clauses do not apply to

them.

You will please submit at once the name of any Officer to whom these clauses apply who is now sixty-five years of age, or will attain that age before the end of 1899, stating the date when that age will be attained.

You will also in future please forward on the 1st December in each year the name of any Officer to whom the clauses apply, who, during the ensuing year, commencing on 1st January, will attain the age of sixty-five years, stating the date when such age will be attained. (6270).

I am directed to state that the General Prisons Board are glad to Technical have to inform you that they have obtained the sanction of the Lords instruction. Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury for a certain number of allowances to warders who may be qualified for technical supervision in certain industries.

It is proposed to allot an allowance of \pounds per aunum to your Prison for the officer employed in supervising and instructing prisoners engaged in

You are requested to submit the names of any officers qualified for the work, together with a full report on their experience, fitness, &c.

It must be understood :-

- (1.) That these instructing allowances are granted to stimulate the zeal and energy of the officers employed in teaching trades, and may be at once withdrawn in any case where an officer fails to perform his duty efficiently. Governors must, therefore, report all such cases for the Board's decision.
- (2.) Allowances are personal to the officers to whom they are granted, and will not be forfeited by annual leave or illness, except where the latter is unduly prolonged. In the case of sick or ordinary leave, extended beyond one month, the allowance shall not be continued without special sanction of the Board.
- (3.) Should an industry lapse in a Prison the Instructing Officer shall cease to draw the allowance.
- (4.) An Instructing Officer must make himself generally useful—that is, he must supervise and instruct not only in the industry to which he is specially attached, but, if necessary, in any others in which prisoners may be employed.
- (5.) The total amount available for the payment of Instructing Officers being limited to a specific sum, which cannot under any circumstances be exceeded, it may happen that cases will arise in which it may be found impossible to place deserving officers on the list of those to whom allowances are apportioned. Such cases will be considered as vacancies arise.
- (6.) The allowances will be paid monthly, at the rate of one-twelfth of the amount approved for the year, and the annual amount of the allowance should be shown separately from ordinary salary on the pay list, and noted in "Remarks" column as "allowance for acting as Trade Instructor."
- (7.) To prevent a breach in the continuity of work, Governors should always have a second officer instructed in each trade.
- (8.) Where there is no paid instructor, instruction shall be given by competent members of the staff selected by the Governor, and these shall be eligible for appointment as Instructors elsewhere, if qualified.

PAYMENT OF PORTION OF FINES.

No payment made by a prisoner in part satisfaction of the sum adjudged to be paid by him in order to obtain the remission of a part of his imprisonment, as provided by Section 1 of the Fine or Imprisonment (Scotland and Ireland) Act, 1899, shall be made on Sunday or on a week day before 9 a.m. or after 4 p.m.

To the Governors (or other officers in charge) of H.M. Prisons.

With reference to the Fine or Imprisonment (Scotland and Ireland) Act, 1899, 62 and 63 Vic., c. 11, and to rule made on the 25th July, 1899, in reference thereto, I am directed to inform you that the sum for which a prisoner is liable includes the fine and costs, i.e., the full amount

specified in the warrant.

In order to ascertain the amount payable on any day of a prisoner's sentence to entitle him to his release on that day, the total sum for which he is liable must be divided by the number of days to which he is sentenced the result being the equivalent of one day's reduction of sentence, and this amount multiplied by any given number will show the amount required for the reduction of an equal number of days of the sentence, giving the prisoner the benefit of any fraction of a penny. No fraction of the sum entitling a prisoner to a day's reduction of sentence will be received. For example, where the sentence is, "Fine and costs, 8s., or five days' imprisonment in default," in order to obtain—

Where the term of imprisonment is one or more calendar months, the number of aays in the period must be ascertained, in order to calculate the amount payable to obtain reduction of part of the imprisonment.

It must be clearly understood that—(a) this provision applies only to convicted prisoners, and not to those committed after an order for maintenance, &c., or for a civil debt under a warrant of a County Court Judge or a Court of Summary Jurisdiction; (b) where a prisoner pays in full the amount for which he is liable he must be discharged at any

hour of the day, as heretofore.

As a prisoner is not legally entitled to his release till midnight of the day on which his sentence expires, so a prisoner sentenced to, say, seven days in default of fine, &c., who pays the proportion representing the of the amount is not entitled to discharge till midnight of the first day of his sentence, and it is a question of convenience at what time prior to midnight he should be released. Whenever, therefore, there is reason to believe that a prisoner, who could pay the full amount at the Court, elects to go to prison with the object of obtaining remission of a portion of it, and at once tenders part payment, the Governor is authorised to detain him in custody till 6 p.m., having regard to the arrangements of the prison and to the distance the prisoner may have to travel to his home. EXTRACTS FROM REPORTS BY SUPERIOR OFFICERS OF CONVICT PRISONS.

MOUNTJOY CONVICT PRISON.

I.-MALE PRISON.

FROM GOVERNOR'S REPORT.

The conduct of the great majority of the subordinate officers on the Convict Staff has been good, and they have been attentive and painstaking generally in the discharge of their duties. Three warders were dealt with by the Board for serious disciplinary offences. The chief and principal warders performed their duties in a satisfactory manner.

With some few exceptions the convicts have been generally well-conducted, and have performed the work allotted to them with diligence and in a satisfactory manner. They have been chiefly employed at indoor trades as reported in previous years, which they have been taught in the prison, mostly while undergoing their probationary period, during the first nine months of their sentences. It is very rarely that a capable tradesman is sentenced to penal servitude.

The prison buildings and sixty houses outside the prison walls, which are occupied by married officers, have been kept in good repair by prison labour.

None have escaped or attempted to escape during the year.

The chaplains, or their approved substitutes, have been regular and frequent in their attendances, and all have shown a strong interest in the temporal as well as the spiritual concerns of their respective congregations. The Very Rev Canon Walsh who was Roman Catholic Chaplain to the Mountjoy Prisons for many years was obliged to retire owing to ill health in October last, which I exceedingly regret. He was the friend of the prisoner, an active member of the Prisoners' Aid Society, ever ready to assist the well-disposed, and always fearless and firm in discountenancing and censuring misconduct and crime.

The schooling of the convicts continues to be conducted on the same lines as reported in previous years, and with good results. The teachers have been attentive and diligent.

The library continues to be much appreciated, and is extensively

availed of by the convicts.

I am much indebted to the Hon. Secretaries of the Prisoners' Aid Societies for their ever ready willingness to assist prisoners after discharge whom I can recommend. I believe and know that these gentlemen have done much good in looking after and helping discharged prisoners to earn an honest livelihood, and have rendered valuable service to society and to the State by preventing many from relapsing into criminal courses.

I certify that the rules laid down for the government of the prison have been adhered to, except in such cases as have been brought to the notice of the General Prisons Board.

FROM PROTESTANT EPISCOPALIAN CHAPLAIN'S REPORT.

The services in the church have been all regularly held, while the conduct of the convicts during Divine Worship, and their taking the share assigned to them in the responses, psalms, and prayers, I cannot speak too highly of.

I desire to thank the Governor and staff of the gaol for their

help and co-operation in the discharge of my responsible duties.

FROM ROMAN CATHOLIC CHAPLAIN'S REPORT.

In presenting this report it affords me very sincere pleasure to bear testimony to the satisfactory condition of the Roman Catholic prisoners, in Mountjoy Male Prison, during the year ended March, 1900.

Their demeanour at all times in the church, and their attention at the various religious functions at which they assisted, were all that could reasonably be expected. Their general conduct too, was, on

the whole, very satisfactory.

Before concluding these remarks I beg, hereby, to place on record my feelings of deep regret at the retirement, during the past year, because of enfeebled health, of the Very Rev. Canon Walsh, from the position of Chaplain to Mountjoy Prison. By his retirement the prison has sustained a very serious loss. His many years of devoted service to the prisoners committed to his care, his untiring whole-hearted zeal for their welfare—spiritual and temporal—his kindness and gentleness of manner in dealing with them, had all endeared him to them, and given him an influence with them, the beneficial effects of which it would be difficult to over-estimate.

FROM PRESBYTERIAN CHAPLAIN'S REPORT.

The prisoners under my care have been most attentive to the instruction it has been my duty to impart. Their general conduct has been remarkably good, as their prison record shows. I have found them always ready to listen to my counsel and advice in cases of difficulty. It may interest the Board to know that I have had several communications from former prisoners telling me how they were recovering themselves, and were in the way to become useful citizens.

FROM MEDICAL OFFICER'S REPORT.

During the year ended 31st December last there were twenty-seven warders admitted into the prison hospital, and there were thirty-nine treated in their quarters. The chief ailments were—catarrh, influenza, brouchitis and diarrhea. There was one death, and one warder was discharged the service on medical grounds.

There were 105 convicts admitted into hospital, and 2,837 prescribed for as externs during the year. The principal diseases were—bronchitis, constipation, catarrh, diarrhea, rheumatism, dyspepsia, debility, in-

fluenza, scrofula and wounds.

There was one death, and five convicts were transferred to Dundrum

Lunatic Asylum.

The health of the officers and prisoners was generally good, and nothing occurred during the year demanding any special remarks.

II .- FEMALE PRISON.

FROM SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT.

The conduct of the subordinate officers has been satisfactory. Needlework and gardening are now the principal occupations of the convicts, whose numbers have been yearly decreasing, until seventeen represents the total in custody. Their conduct has been exceptionally good.

Assistance in the religious training of the convicts continues to be given by the Sisters of Charity, and the Protestant Lady Visitor to the

chaplains of their respective denominations.

The secular instruction is conducted by the school-mistress with

satisfactory results.

I certify that the rules laid down for the government of the prison have been complied with, except in such cases as have been reported to the Board.

FROM PROTESTANT EPISCOPALIAN CHAPLAIN'S REPORT.

In laying before you my report for the past year on the Female Department of Mountjoy Convict Prison, I am happy to be able to state that, so far as my particular charge is concerned, nothing requiring special notice has taken place. The matrons discharge their duties with conscientious assiduity, and the infirmary is well managed.

I have to thank the Lady Superintendent, the principal Matron, and

the staff of the gaol for their kind assistance on all occasions.

FROM ROMAN CATHOLIC CHAPLAIN'S REPORT.

It affords me very sincere pleasure, in submitting this annual report, to be in a position to speak most favourably of the Roman Catholic prisoners in Mountjoy Female Prison. It would, indeed, be difficult to speak too highly of their pious demeanour, and of their attention and edifying devotion at the various religious exercises in the church.

I cannot allow this opportunity to pass without bearing testimony to the invaluable services rendered to the prisoners by the good Sisters of Charity who so kindly visit them. For these services I feel most grateful. Their words of encouragement and sympathy make a deed

and lasting impression on the minds of very many.

To the Lady Superintendent and the other officers of the prison I beg to tender my most sincere thanks for the kindness received at their hands, and the valuable assistance rendered by them to me in the discharge of my duties as chaplain.

FROM MEDICAL OFFICER'S REPORT.

I have pleasure in stating that the general health of the staff, for the

year ending the 31st March last, has been good.

One of the convicts succumbed to an attack of cerebral hemorrhage, but with this exception, the cases of illness arising amongst the prisoners were not of a nature requiring special mention.

MARYBOROUGH CONVICT PRISON.

FROM GOVERNOR'S REPORT.

The conduct of the subordinate officers has been very satisfactory, with three exceptions.

There were in custody on 1st January, 1899:—Invalids, 8; Intermediate Class, 10; Labour Class, 86. Total—104. Received during the year—To Invalid Class, 1; Intermediate Class, 21; and to Labour Class, 49.

Removed during the year—From Invalid Class, 6; from Intermediate Class, 20; and from Labour Class, 45. Remaining in custody on 31st December, 1899—Invalids, 3; Intermediate Class, 11; Labour Class, 90. Total—104. During the year two prisoners were received from Dundrum Central Asylum, and three were removed to the Asylum. Forty-eight convicts were discharged on licence and 3 on commutation of sentence.

The conduct and industry of the convicts employed on the farm and buildings continue to be most satisfactory. The work done by them is the subject of astonishment to persons well qualified to form a correct judgment of what work should be. This not only applies to the work done on the farm, but also to the more skilled work done on building operations. The cases of misconduct are very few in number, and none of a serious nature; indeed, I have not found it necessary to invoke the powers of the Board in dealing with any case of misconduct during the year. This satisfactory result is not attributable to any laxity of attention to either work or discipline, but is the salutary effect produced by observance of both. The advantages derivable from occupation on land become more manifest as time permits extended development, as educating men to appreciate the various forms in which land can be made remunerative, as distinguished from the mere production of the ordinary crops of potatoes, corn, and grass.

The growth and cultivation of fruit have also been ordered as a further exemplification of the uses to which land may profitably be applied, so that at least the rural convicts may be educated therein.

Our principal crops this year were potatoes and the various kinds of table vegetables. All the latter were most productive, but the potato crop in this district was very disappointing in consequence of late frost and heavy rains late in June, the production being one-third less than last year.

The conduct of the prisoners in the Intermediate Class has been very satisfactory. I continue to communicate with the clergymen of the parish in which they are about to reside after discharge, requesting their good offices on their behalf. From some I have received satisfactory assurances of the good behaviour of those discharged prisoners; but there

is a manifest disinclination on the part of clergymen to communicate on the subject of their parishioners even on temporal matters, yet the replies which I have received prove the efficacy of the intervention, to which may reasonably be attributed the withdrawal of some from

criminal pursuits.

The prison buildings have been kept in good state of repair, all necessary work being done by convicts, under the instruction of trade warders. The contractor to whom the building of the new prison has been intrusted has displayed praiseworthy energy in his conduct of those important works, which, so far as they have advanced, appear to be of a very enduring and satisfactory nature.

The chaplains have been zealous and attentive, co-operating in every effort for the reformation of the prisoners whilst in prison, and for their welfare after discharge. They manifest a desire that prisoners should, so far as possible, be employed in such occupations as may be considered probably most advantageous to them in enabling them to obtain a living

by honest industry after their discharge.

In my last report I had to record the withdrawal of Dr. Jacob from the office of Visiting Physician to this prison. The entire medical duties have since been discharged by the Resident Medical Officer in a most satisfactory manner, his attention to the health of the prisoners having

been unremitting.

The schools, both morning and evening, have been conducted as in former years, with satisfactory results. The progress made by prisoners whilst attending school and during their detention in their cells in the intervals of labour, is much greater than might reasonably have been expected in the limited space of time, and the unpromising conditions of age and opportunities.

The library is highly appreciated, the books being exchanged when required. The new books annually provided are anxiously awaited, frequently inquired for, and are considered an intellectual treat.

There were no escapes nor attempts to escape during the year.

I certify that the rules laid down for the government of the prison have been observed to the best of my knowledge and belief, except in such cases as have been brought to the notice of the General Prisons Board.

The Visitors appointed by his Excellency the Lord Lieutenant visited the Prison on 12th April, 3rd May, 10th May, 14th June, 13th September, 11th October, 13th December, 1899, and on 1st February, 14th February, and 14th March, 1900.

I have gratefully to acknowledge the advice and assistance ever

willingly afforded by them in the interests of the prison.

FROM PROTESTANT EPISCOPALIAN CHAPLAIN'S REPORT

For some time the room used for the services in connection with the Church of Ireland has been full. The prisoners still continue to take great interest in the singing, those who are able to take a prominent part meeting every Saturday afternoon in the chapel to prepare for the service of the next day. A considerable number of the prisoners has attended the school which is doing as much as can reasonably be expected under present circumstances. It will be a great improvement when a room is provided in which all the men under instruction can assemble. The conduct of the prisoners has, on the whole, been satisfactory.

FROM ROMAN CATHOLIC CHAPLAIN'S REPORT.

There is nothing very special to note about our prison here during the past year; everything seems to go on satisfactorily. The conduct of the prisoners in the chapel is very edifying. They take a great interest in the school work. They are, I think, much improved in body and mind by their work on the farm. I consider this department a decided success in connection with the prison life of the convicts. The chaplains have not received any complaints from the prisoners against any of the officers of the Prison, and they have been always civil and courteous to the chaplains.

FROM MEDICAL OFFICER'S REPORT.

I have the honour to report on the health of the officers and convicts of this prison for the year ending 31st March, 1900. No death or serious casualty occurred amongst the staff. One warder was retired on account of failing health. Two convicts were found to be insane, and transferred to Dundrum Criminal Lunatic Asylum, and three were released on "medical grounds." No prisoner died during the year. The sanitary condition of the prison was well maintained. The healthy outdoor work here provided for prisoners appreciably diminishes disease of mind and body. I have pleasure in acknowledging the facilities and support afforded me, at all times, in the discharge of my duties by the Governor and the staff under his care.

OF THE

GENERAL PRISONS BOARD, IRELAND.

TO HIS EXCELLENCY GEORGE HENRY, EARL CADOGAN, K.G.,

LORD LIEUTENANT-GENERAL AND GENERAL GOVERNOR OF IRELAND.

General Prisons Board. Dublin Castle, 12th July, 1900.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY,

We have the honour, pursuant to statute, to present this, our Twenty-second Annual Report on the condition of the prisons and prisoners within our jurisdiction, and with respect to the registration of criminals.

The number of prisons and bridewells remains the same as at Number of prisons. the date of our last Report.

A list of the several prisons, showing the number of prisoners which can be accommodated in each, is contained in Table XIX. of the Appendix, and a list of the several bridewells in Table XX.

The number of criminal prisoners committed to the local prisons during the year 1899 was 36,122, and the daily average number in custody was 2,614. The corresponding numbers for the previous Jear were 38,113 and 2,563. There has thus been a reduction of 1,991 in the number of committals, and an increase of 51 in the daily average in custody.

It is satisfactory to note that the number of prisoners com-Short sentence mitted under sentences of one day's imprisonment has greatly diminished during the past year, only 146 such committals having taken place in 1899 as compared with 594 in 1898. greatest decrease has taken place in Belfast, where the number of committals for one day has fallen from 529 in 1898 to 8 in 1899. Such sentences are not calculated to have either a deterrent or a reformatory effect.

In last year's Report we noticed that the increase in the com- Committals. mittals for 1898 was almost entirely confined to the prisons of



the three principal cities—Dublin, Belfast, and Cork. The decrease for 1899, now reported, is principally owing to a decrease in the committals to these prisons.

We subjoin a table of the number of committals to and the daily average number of prisoners in the local prisons during a series of years, exclusive of prisoners committed under civil process.

In addition to the committals shown above 76 prisoners were committed during 1899 under civil process.

Bridewells.

Committals to bridewells are not included in the table above. The numbers of such committals during 1899 were 847 males and 249 females.

The decrease in committals to bridewells is remarkable, as shown by subjoined table:—

This decrease is partly owing to the policy of closing bride-wells, which has been carried out during the past twenty-two years, during which the bridewells have been reduced from 95 in 1878 to 14 in 1899, but partly also to causes referred to in our last Annual Report, i.e., the increase in means of communication by rail and the fact that it is becoming better understood how unsuitable bridewells are for any but the shortest periods of detention. For example, while only two bridewells have been closed since 1895 the number of committals to bridewells has fallen from 1,651 in that year to 1,096 in 1899, even though the number of committals to prisons generally has risen during the

The deterrent effect of the larger prisons as compared with bridewells is well exemplified in one locality where the magistrates have recently adopted the practice of committing prisoners to a larger prison instead of to the local bridewell. Many of the persons committed from the locality referred to for drunkenness in default of paying fines, who have hitherto submitted cheerfully to imprisonment in the bridewell, now invariably pay the fine somer than undergo the discipline and hard work of the larger prison.

The proportion of prisoners committed for drunkenness Committals for (including those committed for "drunkenness and disorderly drunkenness. conduct," &c.), though somewhat less than last year, amounted to about 50 per cent. of the total number of convicted prisoners committed during the year.

From Table IX. it will be seen that of 713 male and female Education. local prisoners who were classed on committal as "wholly ignorant," 189 learned to read, write, and calculate, 125 to read and write, and 192 to read.

Steps are being taken to supply a larger proportion of instructive and useful books to secular libraries in prisons.

The Fine or Imprisonment (Scotland and Ireland) Act, 1899, Fine or Imprisonment came into operation in this country on 24th March, 1900. Act. Within three months 260 prisoners had availed themselves of its provisions, and the money paid by these prisoners amounted to £124 5s. 11d.

This Act provides that:—

"Where a person is committed to prison for non-payment of a sum adjudged to be paid by the conviction of any court of summary jurisdiction, then, on payment to the governor of the prison, under conditions prescribed by prison rules, of any sum in part satisfaction of the sum so adjudged to be paid, and of any charges for which the prisoner is liable, the term of imprisonment shall be reduced by a number of days bearing as nearly as possible the same proportion to the total number of days for which the prisoner is sentenced as the sum so paid bears to the sum for which he is so liable."

The conduct of the officers has been good. In connection with Conduct of this subject it is satisfactory to note that the amount of the fines inflicted on prison officers has decreased 75 per cent. since 1881-82.

From this table it will be seen that the steady decrease that has been going on for many years in the number of convicts still continues. The decrease is especially noticeable in the case of female convicts, who, twenty years ago numbered over 200, while at present they number only 19.

The conduct of the prisoners has generally been good. Par-Conduct of ficulars of the punishments inflicted during the year will be found in Table XIV. of the Appendix, where the total number of local prisoners punished is shown to be 2,758, and of convicts 107. The number of local prisoners punished represents a percentage of 6.8 and the number of convicts punished a per-centage of 21.35 on the total number of local prisoners and convicts respectively in custody during the year. These per-centages are substantially the same as last year.

Nineteen male and 4 female juveniles sentenced to I month or upwards, were removed to Mountjoy Prison. All these female juveniles were employed at gardening. The males received marked benefit in physique and appearance by physical dril, and all made satisfactory progress in education. It need hardly be stated that the juveniles are absolutely isolated from the adult prisoners, with whom they are in no way brought into contact.

Health and mortality of prisoners.

given s

The health of the prisoners was good. There was no case of either typhus or enteric fever. Influenza was more prevalent than usual, and in a few instances was severe.

In Kilkenny two prisoners had diphtheria one of them had contracted the disease before his admission, the other developed

it in prison. In that town there has been an epidemic of diphtheria extending over the past eighteen months. There were a few cases of erysipelas, but all were of a sporadic character. There was no other zymotic disease of importance.

Among local prisoners there were, excluding executions, eight Of these two were the result of alcoholism; one arose from syncope following influenza; one from cardiac failure; one was caused by chronic bronchitis; one by prostatic disease; one by acute tuberculosis; and one by peritonitis. Only in the two last cases did the disease originate after reception. In the convict prisons there was one death, which was caused by ervsipelas.

From local prisons 39 were released on medical grounds before expiration of their sentence, and 5 from convict prisons. Of the total number 15 were women who were very near their confinement.

From local prisons 86 were transferred to Lunatic Asylums. Insanity. Out of this number 76 were insane on their committal, and 2 imbecile. Of the remainder 1 is returned as nervous from alcoholic mania, 2 as of doubtful sanity, and 5 as sane. Of these 5 one had been previously an inmate of an asylum, and another was not insane while in prison, but had been insane at the time of committing the crime.

Seven convict prisoners were removed to Dundrum Criminal Asylum. Of these 2 had always been weak-minded.

The Visiting Committees of local prisons have continued to discharge the important duties assigned to them under the Prison Rules.

Prison Industries.

The details of the work carried on in the prisons are shown in Table No. XXIV. in the Appendix to this Report. Purely mechanical labour has been reduced to a minimum. Every effort is made to provide the prisoners with such employment as will require the exercise of thought and care on their part, and open air work is encouraged as tending to improve their physical condition. A field of over two acres has recently been brought into cultivation at Sligo Prison, and progress is being made with the tillage of a piece of ground round Castlebar Prison about one and a half acres in extent. Gardening is also largely carried on at Maryborough, Belfast, and Tralee, and in the remaining prisons all available land is cultivated for prison purposes.

The introduction of the scheme of special allowances to officers for instructing and supervising prisoners in certain industries referred to in our last Report has been productive of good results.

Building work and repairs.

Table XXII contains particulars of works of reconstruction, repair, &c., carried out in the various prisons during 1899.

All prisons have been kept in good repair and condition; also such portions of old county prisons as are still used as minor prisons.

Though the foundations of the new prison block at Maryborough proved more difficult than was anticipated the contractor has made such progress as to warrant the belief that the contract will **be completed early next year.**Printed image digitised by the University of Southampton Library Digitisation Unit

Amongst the many useful works recently carried out by prison abour the following may be specially mentioned, namely, the construction of baths, dressing-rooms, &c., at Mountjoy Prison, forming a valuable and much-needed improvement, and the removal of a number of useless division walls in Cork Female Prison, by which more air and light are admitted to the prison.

In Tables XXVII and XXVIII. will be found particulars of the Expenditure Expenditure on prisons during the past and several previous

Reports which the Board have obtained as to the operations of Prisoners' Aid the certified Prisoners' Aid Societies show that these societies have Societies. been performing much useful work.

Another addition has been made to the number of such Societies by the establishment of the Waterford Prisoners' Aid Society in 1899.

The following are the existing certified Prisoners' Aid Societies :-

Discharged Prisoners' Aid Society (undenominational).

We still contrast unfavourably with England and Scotland in this respect. The majority of our prisons have, so far, no local Prisoners' Aid Society. Much work is thus thrown on the Board, which would be better decentralized and dealt with by local philanthropic effort.

The number of discharged convicts and habitual criminals Registration registered in the year 1899 was 140, as compared with 156 in criminals. the previous year.

In addition to the usual photographing of prisoners, anthropometric measurements with finger prints and photographs were taken in the cases of male convicts and habitual criminals. ystem has already shown good results.

Departmental.

The office of Superintendent of Stores has been abolished and merged into that of Controller of Industries, to which Mr. Edward Metcalfe, the former Superintendent of Stores, was appointed by your Excellency from the 1st April, 1899.

Mr. Richard Lewis, Clerk in charge of Accounts, severed his long connection with this office from the 31st March, 1900, on being appointed to the important position of Clerk in charge of Accounts in the Department of Agriculture and Technical Instruction.

Though the Board are gratified at Mr. Lewis' well-merited advancement in the public service, they much regret the loss which this Office has sustained by the transfer of his valuable services.

The vacancy thus caused has been filled by the promotion of Mr. J. J. Rafter, Clerk of the Second Division, who has been for seventeen years in the Finance Branch of this Office.

I am directed by the General Prisons Board to call your attention to Retirement. Clause 18 of the Order in Council of 29th November, 1898, relating to the Civil Service, which directs that:—

"The provisions of Clause 10 of the Order in Council of the Fifteenth August, One Thousand Eight Hundred and Ninety, as to retirement on account of age shall in future apply to all persons in the established Civil Service of the State; but in the case of persons to whom those provisions have not heretofore been applicable, they shall take effect after the expiration of one year from the date of this Order."

The following is a copy of Clause 10 of the Order in Council of 15th August, 1890, referred to above:—

"It shall be competent for the Head of any Department to call upon any Officer of such Department to retire at the age of sixty on such pension as by the length of his service he is qualified to receive

"Retirement shall be compulsory for every Officer on attaining sixty-five years of age; but in special cases the Commissioners of the Treasury may, at the instance of a Department, extend an Officer's employment for a further period in no case exceeding five years, on being satisfied that such Officer's retirement at sixty-five would be detrimental to the interests of the Public Service."

You will please bring these clauses under the notice of the several established (pensionable) Officers on your staff or attached to any Minor Prison or Bridewell for which you account, with the exception of those Officers who were transferred from former local Prison Authority under the Prisons Act of 1877, to whom the clauses do not apply.

The clauses need not be communicated to Chaplains and Medical Officers appointed since 1st April, 1878, who are not required to give their whole time to the Public Service, as the clauses do not apply to

them.

You will please submit at once the name of any Officer to whom these clauses apply who is now sixty-five years of age, or will attain that age before the end of 1899, stating the date when that age will be attained.

You will also in future please forward on the 1st December in each year the name of any Officer to whom the clauses apply, who, during the ensuing year, commencing on 1st January, will attain the age of sixty-five years, stating the date when such age will be attained, (6270).

I am directed to state that the General Prisons Board are glad to Technical have to inform you that they have obtained the sanction of the Lords instruction. Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury for a certain number of allowances to warders who may be qualified for technical supervision in certain industries.

It is proposed to allot an allowance of \pounds per annum to your Prison for the officer employed in supervising and instructing prisoners engaged in

You are requested to submit the names of any officers qualified for the work, together with a full report on their experience, fitness, &c.

It must be understood :-

- (1.) That these instructing allowances are granted to stimulate the zeal and energy of the officers employed in teaching trades, and may be at once withdrawn in any case where an officer fails to perform his duty efficiently. Governors must, therefore, report all such cases for the Board's decision.
- (2.) Allowances are personal to the officers to whom they are granted, and will not be forfeited by annual leave or illness, except where the latter is unduly prolonged. In the case of sick or ordinary leave, extended beyond one month, the allowance shall not be continued without special sanction of the Board.
- (3.) Should an industry lapse in a Prison the Instructing Officer shall cease to draw the allowance.
- (4.) An Instructing Officer must make himself generally useful—that is, he must supervise and instruct not only in the industry to which he is specially attached, but, if necessary, in any others in which prisoners may be employed.
- (5.) The total amount available for the payment of Instructing Officers being limited to a specific sum, which cannot under any circumstances be exceeded, it may happen that cases will arise in which it may be found impossible to place deserving officers on the list of those to whom allowances are apportioned. Such cases will be considered as vacancies arise.
- (6.) The allowances will be paid monthly, at the rate of one-twelfth of the amount approved for the year, and the annual amount of the allowance should be shown separately from ordinary salary on the pay list, and noted in "Remarks" column as "allowance for acting as Trade Instructor"
- (7.) To prevent a breach in the continuity of work, Governors should always have a second officer instructed in each trade.
- (8.) Where there is no paid instructor, instruction shall be given by competent members of the staff selected by the Governor, and these shall be eligible for appointment as Instructors elsewhere, if qualified.

PAYMENT OF PORTION OF FINES.

No payment made by a prisoner in part satisfaction of the sum adjudged to be paid by him in order to obtain the remission of a part of his imprisonment, as provided by Section 1 of the Fine or Imprisonment (Scotland and Ireland) Act, 1899, shall be made on Sunday or on a week day before 9 a.m. or after 4 p.m.

To the Governors (or other officers in charge) of H.M. Prisons.

With reference to the Fine or Imprisonment (Scotland and Ireland) Act, 1899, 62 and 63 Vic., c. 11, and to rule made on the 25th July, 1899, in reference thereto, I am directed to inform you that the sum for which a prisoner is liable includes the fine and costs, i.e., the full amount

specified in the warrant.

In order to ascertain the amount payable on any day of a prisoner's sentence to entitle him to his release on that day, the total sum for which he is liable must be divided by the number of days to which he is sentenced the result being the equivalent of one day's reduction of sentence, and this amount multiplied by any given number will show the amount required for the reduction of an equal number of days of the sentence, giving the prisoner the benefit of any fraction of a penny. No fraction of the sum entitling a prisoner to a day's reduction of sentence will be received. For example, where the sentence is, "Fine and costs, 8s., or five days' imprisonment in default," in order to obtain—

Where the term of imprisonment is one or more calendar months, the number of *aays* in the period must be ascertained, in order to calculate the amount payable to obtain reduction of part of the imprisonment.

It must be clearly understood that—(a) this provision applies only to convicted prisoners, and not to those committed after an order for maintenance, &c., or for a civil debt under a warrant of a County Court Judge or a Court of Summary Jurisdiction; (b) where a prisoner pays in full the amount for which he is liable he must be discharged at any hour of the day, as heretofore.

As a prisoner is not legally entitled to his release till midnight of the day on which his sentence expires, so a prisoner sentenced to, say, seven days in default of fine, &c., who pays the proportion representing this of the amount is not entitled to discharge till midnight of the first day of his sentence, and it is a question of convenience at what time prior to midnight he should be released. Whenever, therefore, there is reason to believe that a prisoner, who could pay the full amount at the Court, elects to go to prison with the object of obtaining remission of a portion of it, and at once tenders part payment, the Governor is authorised to detain him in custody till 6 p.m., having regard to the arrangements of the prison and to the distance the prisoner may have to travel to his home. EXTRACTS FROM REPORTS BY SUPERIOR OFFICERS OF CONVICT PRISONS.

MOUNTJOY CONVICT PRISON.

I.—MALE PRISON.

FROM GOVERNOR'S REPORT.

The conduct of the great majority of the subordinate officers on the Convict Staff has been good, and they have been attentive and painstaking generally in the discharge of their duties. Three warders were dealt with by the Board for serious disciplinary offences. The chief and principal warders performed their duties in a satisfactory manner.

With some few exceptions the convicts have been generally well-conducted, and have performed the work allotted to them with diligence and in a satisfactory manner. They have been chiefly employed at indoor trades as reported in previous years, which they have been taught in the prison, mostly while undergoing their probationary period, during the first nine months of their sentences. It is very rarely that a capable tradesman is sentenced to penal servitude.

The prison buildings and sixty houses outside the prison walls, which are occupied by married officers, have been kept in good repair by prison

labour.

None have escaped or attempted to escape during the year.

The chaplains, or their approved substitutes, have been regular and frequent in their attendances, and all have shown a strong interest in the temporal as well as the spiritual concerns of their respective congregations. The Very Rev Canon Walsh who was Roman Catholic Chaplain to the Mountjoy Prisons for many years was obliged to retire owing to ill health in October last, which I exceedingly regret. He was the friend of the prisoner, an active member of the Prisoners' Aid Society, ever ready to assist the well-disposed, and always fearless and firm in discountenancing and censuring misconduct and crime.

The schooling of the convicts continues to be conducted on the same lines as reported in previous years, and with good results. The teachers

have been attentive and diligent.

The library continues to be much appreciated, and is extensively

availed of by the convicts.

I am much indebted to the Hon. Secretaries of the Prisoners' Aid Societies for their ever ready willingness to assist prisoners after discharge whom I can recommend. I believe and know that these gentlemen have done much good in looking after and helping discharged prisoners to earn an honest livelihood, and have rendered valuable service to society and to the State by preventing many from relapsing into criminal courses.

I certify that the rules laid down for the government of the prison have been adhered to, except in such cases as have been brought to the notice of the General Prisons Board.

FROM PROTESTANT EPISCOPALIAN CHAPLAIN'S REPORT.

The services in the church have been all regularly held, while the conduct of the convicts during Divine Worship, and their taking the share assigned to them in the responses, psalms, and prayers, I cannot speak too highly of.

I desire to thank the Governor and staff of the gaol for their

help and co-operation in the discharge of my responsible duties.

FROM ROMAN CATHOLIC CHAPLAIN'S REPORT.

In presenting this report it affords me very sincere pleasure to bear testimony to the satisfactory condition of the Roman Catholic prisoners, in Mountjoy Male Prison, during the year ended March, 1900.

Their demeanour at all times in the church, and their attention at the various religious functions at which they assisted, were all that could reasonably be expected. Their general conduct too, was, on

the whole, very satisfactory.

Before concluding these remarks I beg, hereby, to place on record my feelings of deep regret at the retirement, during the past year, because of enfeebled health, of the Very Rev. Canon Walsh, from the position of Chaplain to Mountjoy Prison. By his retirement the prison has sustained a very serious loss. His many years of devoted service to the prisoners committed to his care, his untiring whole-hearted zeal for their welfare—spiritual and temporal—his kindness and gentleness of manner in dealing with them, had all endeared him to them, and given him an influence with them, the beneficial effects of which it would be difficult to over-estimate.

FROM PRESBYTERIAN CHAPLAIN'S REPORT.

The prisoners under my care have been most attentive to the instruction it has been my duty to impart. Their general conduct has been remarkably good, as their prison record shows. I have found them always ready to listen to my counsel and advice in cases of difficulty. It may interest the Board to know that I have had several communications from former prisoners telling me how they were recovering themselves, and were in the way to become useful citizens.

FROM MEDICAL OFFICER'S REPORT.

During the year ended 31st December last there were twenty-seven warders admitted into the prison hospital, and there were thirty-nine treated in their quarters. The chief ailments were—catarrh, influenza, bronchitis and diarrhea. There was one death, and one warder was discharged the service on medical grounds.

There were 105 convicts admitted into hospital, and 2,837 prescribed for as externs during the year. The principal diseases were—bronchitis, constipation, catarrh, diarrhea, rheumatism, dyspepsia, debility, in-

fluenza, scrofula and wounds.

There was one death, and five convicts were transferred to Dundrum

Lunatic Asylum.

The health of the officers and prisoners was generally good, and nothing occurred during the year demanding any special remarks.

II.—FEMALE PRISON.

FROM SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT.

The conduct of the subordinate officers has been satisfactory. Needlework and gardening are now the principal occupations of the convicts, whose numbers have been yearly decreasing, until seventeen represents the total in custody. Their conduct has been exceptionally good.

Assistance in the religious training of the convicts continues to be given by the Sisters of Charity, and the Protestant Lady Visitor to the

chaplains of their respective denominations.

The secular instruction is conducted by the school-mistress with

satisfactory results.

I certify that the rules laid down for the government of the prison have been complied with, except in such cases as have been reported to the Board.

FROM PROTESTANT EPISCOPALIAN CHAPLAIN'S REPORT.

In laying before you my report for the past year on the Female Department of Mountjoy Convict Prison, I am happy to be able to state that, so far as my particular charge is concerned, nothing requiring special notice has taken place. The matrons discharge their duties with conscientious assiduity, and the infirmary is well managed.

I have to thank the Lady Superintendent, the principal Matron, and

the staff of the gaol for their kind assistance on all occasions.

FROM ROMAN CATHOLIC CHAPLAIN'S REPORT.

It affords me very sincere pleasure, in submitting this annual report, to be in a position to speak most favourably of the Roman Catholic prisoners in Mountjoy Female Prison. It would, indeed, be difficult to speak too highly of their pious demeanour, and of their attention and edifying devotion at the various religious exercises in the church.

I cannot allow this opportunity to pass without bearing testimony to the invaluable services rendered to the prisoners by the good Sisters of Charity who so kindly visit them. For these services I feel most grateful. Their words of encouragement and sympathy make a deed

and lasting impression on the minds of very many.

To the Lady Superintendent and the other officers of the prison I beg to tender my most sincere thanks for the kindness received at their hands, and the valuable assistance rendered by them to me in the discharge of my duties as chaplain.

FROM MEDICAL OFFICER'S REPORT.

I have pleasure in stating that the general health of the staff, for the

year ending the 31st March last, has been good.

One of the convicts succumbed to an attack of cerebral hemorrhage, but with this exception, the cases of illness arising amongst the prisoners were not of a nature requiring special mention.

MARYBOROUGH CONVICT PRISON.

FROM GOVERNOR'S REPORT.

The conduct of the subordinate officers has been very satisfactory, with three exceptions.

There were in custody on 1st January, 1899:—Invalids, 8; Intermediate Class, 10; Labour Class, 86. Total—104. Received during the year—To Invalid Class, 1; Intermediate Class, 21; and to Labour Class, 49.

Removed during the year—From Invalid Class, 6; from Intermediate Class, 20; and from Labour Class, 45. Remaining in custody on 31st December, 1899—Invalids, 3; Intermediate Class, 11; Labour Class, 90. Total—104. During the year two prisoners were received from Dundrum Central Asylum, and three were removed to the Asylum. Forty-eight convicts were discharged on licence and 3 on commutation of sentence.

The conduct and industry of the convicts employed on the farm and buildings continue to be most satisfactory. The work done by them is the subject of astonishment to persons well qualified to form a correct judgment of what work should be. This not only applies to the work done on the farm, but also to the more skilled work done on building operations. The cases of misconduct are very few in number, and none of a serious nature; indeed, I have not found it necessary to invoke the powers of the Board in dealing with any case of misconduct during the year. This satisfactory result is not attributable to any laxity of attention to either work or discipline, but is the salutary effect produced by observance of both. The advantages derivable from occupation on land become more manifest as time permits extended development, as educating men to appreciate the various forms in which land can be made remunerative, as distinguished from the mere production of the ordinary crops of potatoes, corn, and grass.

The growth and cultivation of fruit have also been ordered as a further exemplification of the uses to which land may profitably be applied, so that at least the rural convicts may be educated therein.

Our principal crops this year were potatoes and the various kinds of table vegetables. All the latter were most productive, but the potato crop in this district was very disappointing in consequence of late frost and heavy rains late in June, the production being one-third less than last year.

The conduct of the prisoners in the Intermediate Class has been very satisfactory. I continue to communicate with the clergymen of the parish in which they are about to reside after discharge, requesting their good offices on their behalf. From some I have received satisfactory assurances of the good behaviour of those discharged prisoners; but there

is a manifest disinclination on the part of clergymen to communicate on the subject of their parishioners even on temporal matters, yet the replies which I have received prove the efficacy of the intervention, to which may reasonably be attributed the withdrawal of some from

criminal pursuits.

The prison buildings have been kept in good state of repair, all necessary work being done by convicts, under the instruction of trade warders. The contractor to whom the building of the new prison has been intrusted has displayed praiseworthy energy in his conduct of those important works, which, so far as they have advanced, appear to be of a very enduring and satisfactory nature.

The chaplains have been zealous and attentive, co-operating in every effort for the reformation of the prisoners whilst in prison, and for their welfare after discharge. They manifest a desire that prisoners should, so far as possible, be employed in such occupations as may be considered probably most advantageous to them in enabling them to obtain a living

by honest industry after their discharge.

In my last report I had to record the withdrawal of Dr. Jacob from the office of Visiting Physician to this prison. The entire medical duties have since been discharged by the Resident Medical Officer in a most satisfactory manner, his attention to the health of the prisoners having

been unremitting.

The schools, both morning and evening, have been conducted as in former years, with satisfactory results. The progress made by prisoners whilst attending school and during their detention in their cells in the intervals of labour, is much greater than might reasonably have been expected in the limited space of time, and the unpromising conditions of age and opportunities.

The library is highly appreciated, the books being exchanged when required. The new books annually provided are anxiously awaited, frequently inquired for, and are considered an intellectual treat.

There were no escapes nor attempts to escape during the year.

I certify that the rules laid down for the government of the prison have been observed to the best of my knowledge and belief, except in such cases as have been brought to the notice of the General Prisons Board.

The Visitors appointed by his Excellency the Lord Lieutenant visited the Prison on 12th April, 3rd May, 10th May, 14th June, 13th September, 11th October, 13th December, 1899, and on 1st February, 14th February, and 14th March, 1900.

I have gratefully to acknowledge the advice and assistance ever

willingly afforded by them in the interests of the prison.

FROM PROTESTANT EPISCOPALIAN CHAPLAIN'S REPORT.

For some time the room used for the services in connection with the Church of Ireland has been full. The prisoners still continue to take great interest in the singing, those who are able to take a prominent part meeting every Saturday afternoon in the chapel to prepare for the service of the next day. A considerable number of the prisoners has attended the school which is doing as much as can reasonably be expected under present circumstances. It will be a great improvement when a room is provided in which all the men under instruction can assemble. The conduct of the prisoners has, on the whole, been satisfactory.

FROM ROMAN CATHOLIC CHAPLAIN'S REPORT.

There is nothing very special to note about our prison here during the past year; everything seems to go on satisfactorily. The conduct of the prisoners in the chapel is very edifying. They take a great interest in the school work. They are, I think, much improved in body and mind by their work on the farm. I consider this department a decided success in connection with the prison life of the convicts. The chaplains have not received any complaints from the prisoners against any of the officers of the Prison, and they have been always civil and courteous to the chaplains.

FROM MEDICAL OFFICER'S REPORT.

I have the honour to report on the health of the officers and convicts of this prison for the year ending 31st March, 1900. No death or serious casualty occurred amongst the staff. One warder was retired on account of failing health. Two convicts were found to be insane, and transferred to Dundrum Criminal Lunatic Asylum, and three were released on "medical grounds." No prisoner died during the year. The sanitary condition of the prison was well maintained. The healthy outdoor work here provided for prisoners appreciably diminishes disease of mind and body. I have pleasure in acknowledging the facilities and support afforded me, at all times, in the discharge of my duties by the Governor and the staff under his care.
