SIR,

I have the honour to submit to you the Annual Report on the Reformatory and Industrial Schools in Ireland for the year ending 31st December, 1906.

The number of Schools under inspection at the beginning of last year was—5 Reformatories, and 68 Industrial Schools.

During the year every School was examined at least once by the Assistant Inspector or myself, and in addition we paid one or more surprise visits to most of the schools as well.

REFORMATORIES.

There were 5 Reformatory Schools in Ireland at the end of 1906.

It appears from this Table that the number of boys under order of detention at the end of 1906 was 10 less than that at the end of 1905, and that the number of girls was the same for both these dates.

ADMISSIONS.

The total number of juveniles admitted into Reformatory Schools last year was 138, which shows a decrease of 33 as compared with the admissions in 1905.

The number of boys admitted in 1906 was 127, being 37 less than the number admitted during the preceding year. The number of girls admitted was 11, or 4 over the number admitted in 1905.

STATE OF INSTRUCTION ON ADMISSION.

Of the 127 boys admitted last year, 41 could neither read nor write, 81 could read or read and write imperfectly, and 5 could read and write well.

Of the 11 girls admitted, 3 could neither read nor write, 7 could read or read and write imperfectly, and one could read and write well.

HEALTH OF INMATES.

It is satisfactory to find that the health of the inmates during the past year was good. Only one death was recorded, that of a boy, who suffered from pulmonary tuberculosis.

LITERARY TRAINING.

The literary training continues very satisfactory.

All the boys' schools have now got classes in Manual Instruction, in which about half the boys of each school are being trained in woodwork. This is an exercise in which they all seem to take a great interest.

INDUSTRIAL TRAINING.

The training in domestic subjects in the two Reformatory Schools for girls is carried on as heretofore in a very satisfactory manner.

It affords me pleasure to report that in the Limerick Reformatory a high state of efficiency in the training of the girls has been reached, with the result that the girls, when they are discharged from the school, can readily earn a respectable livelihood at domestic or other work.

In the three Reformatory Schools for boys the trades continue to be well taught, and it is gratifying to find that in each the subjects of manual instruction and agriculture are receiving special attention. This is satisfactory in as much as the courses of instruction in these subjects are useful, not only because they give the boys a sound practical training, but also because they tend to develop their faculties and generate an intelligent interest in their work.

INDUSTRIAL SCHOOLS.

There were 68 Industrial Schools in Ireland at the end of 1906.

The foregoing tabular statement shows that there were 49 more children under order of detention at the end of 1906 than at the end of 1905. The number of boys had increased by 72, and the number of girls had decreased by 23.

ADMISSIONS.

The total number of children admitted into Industrial Schools during the year 1906 was 1,310; this shows an increase of 16 in the number of committals as compared with the previous year.

The number of boys admitted was 659, or 7 more than in the year 1905.

The number of girls admitted was 651, or 9 over the number in 1905.

STATE OF EDUCATION ON ADMISSION.

Of the total number of boys admitted into Industrial Schools last year, 394 could neither read nor write, 243 could read or read or write imperfectly, and 22 could read and write well.

Of the total number of girls admitted, 368 could neither read nor write, 242 could read or read and write imperfectly, 40 could read and write well, and one was well instructed.

DISCHARGES.

The total number discharged from Industrial Schools (excluding transfers) during the year 1906 was 1,290. Of this number 597 were boys, and 693 girls.

The total amount collected in 1905 was £1,623 19s. 10d., of which sum £484 19s. 3d. was for Reformatory, and £1,139 0s. 7d. for Industrial School cases.

There is an increase of £84 17s. 4d. in the total amount collected in 1906 as compared with the preceding year. The Reformatory collection increased by £9 6s. 11d., and the Industrial School collection by £75 10s. 5d.

The amount realised last year from the Industrial School Collection is the largest that has yet been obtained.

HEALTH.

During the past year 70 of the children—35 boys, and 35 girls—under order of detention in Industrial Schools died. In the boys' schools there were 13 more deaths than in 1905, and in the girls' schools the number of deaths was six less.

Forty of the deaths that took place in 1906 were due to diseases of the lungs.

In viewing this high death-rate, it must not be forgotten that a large number of children admitted into the schools are, owing to neglect and starvation, in a very depraved state of health, and develop after a time the seeds of diseases that were only lying dormant before their admission.

I consider that the treatment the children receive is, on the whole, satisfactory.

The method of recording cases, as laid down in the following circular, which I have sent to Managers of schools, will be the means of bringing directly under my notice cases of disease

and injury, and enable me to get a clearer insight into the state of health of the children.

CIRCULAR TO MANAGERS OF INDUSTRIAL SCHOOLS.

Office of Inspector of Reformatory
and Industrial Schools,
Dublin Castle, December, 1906.

Each succeeding year public opinion is becoming more concerned as to the necessity for greater attention being given to the health of school children.

In most other countries for some years past a system of organized medical inspection of schools has been in operation. The need for such will be apparent when we consider the strain on the child that the school work of the present day entails. This consideration makes it the more incumbent on Managers, who are responsible for the well-being of the children committed to their care, to satisfy themselves as to their mental and physical condition, so that in their education and training suitable methods may be adopted, and due allowance made for any constitutional deficiencies.

I will ask you then to have a careful medical examination made of all the boys under detention in your School, and to have a record taken, in the form appended hereto, of those who deviate from the normal standard.

Acute cases, temporary indispositions, and accidents, need not be noted unless the disease or injury should become chronic.

Cases of a tubercular nature should be indicated by a *red star*.

When all the children deviating from the healthy standard—a healthy mind in a healthy body—are classified under their respective headings; the remainder are supposed to be average healthy children.

After the classification is completed for those already in the school, the Medical Officer, when examining a child on admission, will place him in the class to which, in his opinion, he belongs.

When the Medical Officer considers a child in any of the abnormal classes sufficiently recovered to qualify for the normal class, he will draw a line through his name and enter the date of his transfer where his name is struck off the list of abnormal cases.

Any child removed from the healthy class to one of the abnormal ones will have his name written in *red ink*, with the date of his transfer.

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LITERARY TRAINING.

During the year under review the progress made by the children in their literary training may be considered as on the whole very satisfactory.

Reading is generally good, but still varies greatly at different schools. More care should be taken to teach the children to read in their natural voice. They often pitch the voice very high at the beginning of each sentence, and allow it to fall away until it is scarcely audible at the end. In nearly all the girls' schools an alternative reader in domestic science is used in each standard. This is a great improvement, as it helps to connect the work done in the school with the industrial training. The subject matter of the reading lessons is still often very poorly understood by the junior standards, and I would again draw attention to a custom practised at some schools, viz., to make one child ask another a few simple questions on the subject matter of the paragraph just read. This secures that the children are attending to the lesson. Attention should be given to *oral composition* when the children are answering questions put by the teacher.

Oral spelling is generally good in the junior standards, but mistakes in spelling are very frequent in dictation and composition.

Writing continues to be well taught, and the use of slates is growing much less frequent. In some schools they have entirely disappeared, and are looked upon only as a survival from the stone age.

Arithmetic is on the whole well taught, except mental arithmetic, which does not get by any means the amount of attention it deserves. When paying surprise visits to the schools I much too frequently find classes engaged in answering test cards. They were evidently not being used as a test of the children's proficiency, but for teaching purposes. This is not the legitimate use of such cards, and is a lazy and bad way of teaching arithmetic.

Geography and grammar are both fairly well taught; the latter is in some schools principally taught during the correction of mistakes in composition.

Drawing is well taught in most schools, and all the boys' schools have lessons in manual instruction. The boys seem to take a keen interest in the latter. Kindergarten lessons are given to all the junior standards, and object lessons are given—those to the girls being generally on subjects connected with domestic economy, and those to the boys frequently taking the form of lessons in elementary sciences.

INDUSTRIAL TRAINING.

The same careful attention is still bestowed on the industrial training of the boys, and the same satisfactory results are apparent as heretofore.

Each succeeding year affords the strongest proof of the great advantage gained by careful attention to the important subjects of manual instruction and elementary agriculture.

In the girls' schools the advance made by the children in recent years in acquiring an intelligent and practical knowledge of all matters relating to Domestic Science, is satisfactory and encouraging to the highest degree. This important subject is at present the principal feature in the training of girls in Industrial Schools. So far from interfering with the ordinary school work it has been found a potent factor in developing the intelligence and faculties of the girls, and enables them to have a clear understanding of the subjects they are taught. Under the Domestic Science course not alone is instruction given in practical housework, but also the principles of hygiene, bearing on the ordinary conditions of life, are taught and carried out in practice.

The following extract from the introduction to my syllabus of Domestic Science will show the scope and purpose of the work done at present by the girls in Industrial Schools:—

"The main object in the education of the children should be to give them as far as possible a sound industrial training; one that will fit them to earn a respectable livelihood, make them intelligent as well as capable workers, and enable them to contribute to the health and happiness of others as well as themselves. While the labour of the children is utilised for the working of the Institution, its utilitarian purpose should only be of secondary consideration to its educative effect on their training.

"There are four essential kinds of industry, in which every child should get a good practical training. These are:—

*The Home and House Work.
Food, Kitchen Work, and Housekeeping.
Needlework and Dressmaking.
Laundry Work.*

"For teaching these and some other kindred subjects I have suggested that there should be established in every school a course of Domestic Science with an uniform and systematic method of giving instruction in the various subjects that come under this head. I have divided the course into three standards, and have made age the qualification for entering each.

"Every child in the school when she reaches 13 years of age enters the 1st Standard. She remains in this till she reaches 14, when she enters the 2nd Standard. At 15 she enters the 3rd Standard, where she remains till she leaves the school at 16 years of age, when she is supposed to have received a sound practical education in the subjects that will enable her to earn a respectable livelihood.

"For each standard I have drawn up a syllabus of work which I believe is within the power of children of the ages mentioned to do intelligently and efficiently. In doing this I have had the assistance of Managers of wide experience and good records in the training of children."

"THE HOME AND HOUSE WORK—

"The points to be taken into consideration under this heading are:—

In selecting a house: Rent, situation, soil, state of repair, accommodation, dryness, position as to sunlight, and facilities for ventilating purposes.

Having selected the house: How to keep it clean and well ventilated, to know the dangers arising from dirt and bad ventilation, the principles of ventilation, and how to ventilate rooms, to be able to compare pure and impure air and to know the sources of both, to know the principal causes that give rise to consumption, bad health and fevers, to know how to dispose of refuse, and to understand the structure and the care of drains, the sources of the water supply and the possible dangers from them.

The furnishing of a house: How to keep all articles in it in a clean, orderly, and efficient state.

"In teaching the child house work, every step should be taken under trained supervision, and done with the care and accuracy of a kindergarten lesson.

"FOOD, KITCHEN-WORK, AND HOUSEKEEPING—

"The kitchen and cooking class-rooms should be models of completeness and efficiency, and be the show rooms of the school. They should be busy hives of industry with a hum of work about them from morning till night.

"Proficiency in this department will be the chief determining factor in forming my estimate of the excellence of a school.

"The most competent teacher, not the most competent cook, should have charge of this department. The time-honoured cook and kitchen help should be deposed, and the reign of the children begin in the kitchen.

"All the cooking for the school should be done by the children under the supervision of the teacher. This is already being done in several of the good schools.

"A kitchen diary should be kept in which everything that is brought into the kitchen stores should be entered.

"In this department everything bearing on the vital question of food should be taught:—

The economical purchase of the best and cheapest articles of food.
The classification of foods.

The use each kind serves in the body.

The kinds necessary to keep the body in a healthy state.

The kinds of dietary suited to infants, young people, and adults, respectively.

Why a mixed diet is necessary.

The selection, weighing, and measuring of articles of food.

The preparation for cooking.

The various methods of cooking.

The most economical way of cooking.

The process of mastication.

The use of the teeth and the saliva.

The number of teeth, how to preserve them, and the causes of decay.
Common causes of indigestion.

The causes of the high death-rate among children, and the fact that it is largely due to ignorance on the part of mothers in the matters of food and feeding.

The use and care of babies' bottles.

How to care infants and children as regards food, clothing, air, and exercise,

The value of milk as a food for children, and how it may be contaminated and adulterated, and how to detect such evils.

The common causes that produce ill-health in babies, and how to provide against them.

The virtue of thrift, and necessity for practising it.

The use of scraps and crumbs remaining after meals.

To make nutritious soups at small cost.

To make cakes, pastry, puddings, and jam.

How to procure the weekly requirements of a labourer's family of five, on wages varying from 10s. to £1 a week.

To keep a housekeeper's account.

The nature of ordinary beverages, and how to distinguish between the useful, harmless, and injurious ones.

The use of the stock-pot, and to be able to contrast it with the teapot from a money and health point of view.

"There should be a large black-board in the kitchen, on which the cook for the day should write down the articles constituting each meal for the entire school, the quantity and price of each article, the cost of the entire meal, and the cost per head.

"The teacher of Domestic Science should, at least three times a week, examine her classes on the day's rations, as to price, preparation, cooking, suitability, and food value.

"The composition of dietaries suited to the various states and conditions of life cannot be practised to too great an extent.

"The family class of the six senior girls which has given such good results should be still continued.

"The food for invalids, and the general care of the sick, should get attention.

"The kitchen class should be furnished with every requisite to facilitate the training, and everything used should be in an efficient condition. The open fire-place, the ordinary range, an American cooking-range, and, where gas is available, a gas cooking stove should be provided in all the schools.

"Except in the good schools I found that scales, weights, and measures, when present, were very indifferent. Scales were untrue, and the sets of weights and measures incomplete. Some of the weights were doing duty as hammers, others in keeping doors open. Measuring was, in many cases, a matter of guess-work. These careless habits should not be tolerated. Accuracy in all details should be insisted on if the children are to be properly trained.

"NEEDLEWORK—DRESSMAKING.

"Under this heading comes the question of clothes:—

The necessity for clothing the body.

The sources from which we get clothes.

The character of the materials as good and bad conductors of heat.

The kinds suited for different climates and temperatures.

How to select proper materials.

The economic purchase of materials.

How to cut out and make.

The necessity for preserving the surface of the body from cold.

Cleanliness of skin, baths, care of hair.

Selection of boots, danger and discomfort of tight and light boots, care of the feet.

How to preserve clothes.

The cost per year for clothing.

"I find, as a rule, that too much time is given to needlework that could, with more advantage to the children, be devoted to other branches of their training. This should be remedied."

"LAUNDRY WORK—

"It is undesirable that the children should be trained in this branch of Domestic Science in a public laundry where much machinery is used. The means used for training them should be of the character to be found in an ordinary well managed household, and the methods adopted similar to those they will have to follow when they go into service or work in their own homes.

"As is the case in the needlework department, the children in some schools spend too much time in the laundry. It must be remembered that the training is for educational purposes, and the utilitarian feature about it is only of a secondary consideration.

"The points to attend to are:—

The preparation for the work.

Clothes lists.

The care of laundry and various utensils in it.

A knowledge of the various materials used in washing.

The character of the water used.

The duties of laundry maid.

The order in which the week's work is gone through.

"I am prepared to hear some Managers say that the programme of work laid down is too much to expect from children of the ages mentioned, that the standards are too high, and the subjects too numerous to teach within the allotted time. Admitting this contention to be right, they must, nevertheless, see that it is a desirable thing to attempt it. If they cannot succeed in getting through the whole course, they may go as far as they can, and, in proportion to the advance made, so will the children be benefited. I don't expect that every child in each standard will be able to do all the work in the syllabus. Allowance will have to be made for stupid and backward children. It is amazing the amount of work I have seen done in some of the schools in this direction; and what can be done in one school can surely be done in another. Each year I notice the children improving in intelligence and practical knowledge, owing to the new methods of teaching. This, no doubt, is due to the development of their thinking powers, and powers of observation, and getting them to take an intelligent interest and some share of responsibility in the work they do. As the younger and better trained children come forward, they do without much effort the work that was till recently looked on by some Managers as impracticable.

"The important feature in the training is to get the children to do, and do repeatedly, the work on hand, till they get facility in doing it. 'Practice makes perfect.' This precept applies with equal force to the cooking of a dinner as to the playing of a difficult piece of music. A lecture on the theory of music, with the pupil taking notes, and the teacher illustrating it on the piano, will not develop much practical dexterity on the part of the pupil. I am afraid the same holds good with regard to the present mode of lecturing on cookery.

"The zealous, capable Manager will provide against all weak points in the system of training. She will be a local Inspector, examining daily into the work of each department. While seeing that the practical training of the children is well looked after, she will not be forgetful of their health and happiness. She will provide amusement of a healthful and congenial character for both body and mind, and will not forget to allow some play to the imagination by providing story-books suitable to children.

"By this harmonious development of mind and body a useful type of girl will be evolved, who will be able to play successfully her part in life, will reflect credit on the school in which she was trained, and contribute in some degree to the prosperity and reputation of her country."

The following extract, taken from the Report of the Committee of the Hampton House Industrial School, is useful as showing the practical training the girls receive in the school:—

"The Domestic Science Classes continue to occupy a large part in the training of the elder girls. In accordance with the instructions of the Government Inspector every child over thirteen years of age attends these classes. The instruction is graduated, and the girls are divided into three standards—those from thirteen to fourteen years of age form Standard I.; those from fourteen to fifteen, Standard II.; and those from fifteen to sixteen, Standard III. This system ensures that each girl shall have her full three years' training in all the subjects which come under this head, viz., cooking, laundrywork, dressmaking, housewifery, and hygiene. In addition to the practical work the girls are made to understand the theory of all that they do, thus making their position doubly strong; for, although practical work is in itself an excellent thing, when backed up by a sound theoretical knowledge of cause and effect the work is at once raised to a higher intellectual sphere, and becomes correspondingly more interesting to the worker. At any time of the year, when friends of the Institution are kind enough to pay Hampton House a visit they can see for themselves and, in many cases, taste for themselves the result of the work that is done by the girls at these classes.

"The food question looms large in the domestic horizon in these days. So, in addition to being taught how to cook the food, the girls are required to know the food value, the market prices, etc., of all materials which they use. Each day the girl who has charge of the preparation of the school meals writes up on a large blackboard in the kitchen a complete list of the materials to be used throughout the day, giving the quantity, price, and food value of each. She also calculates the total cost for the day, and the cost per head for each child. This forms a most valuable exercise, and one which to the uninitiated would present considerable difficulty, but which is done by the elder girls with expedition and accuracy.

"At the needlework and dressmaking classes the girls are taught to draft and cut out and make up underclothing and dresses, which, when finished, are put away to form part of their outfit when they leave the Home, each girl drafting, cutting, and finishing her own garments without any assistance beyond the instruction and supervision of the teacher.

"The Family System is still in force. The six most advanced girls have a distinct table from the rest of the school. Each girl becomes mother in turn. She goes to the market for provisions which she afterwards cooks and provides for her family. Every week she makes up her accounts, seeing that she keeps well within the limits of her income,

which is about that earned by an ordinary working man, for every effort is made to lead her to take it as one of the articles of her domestic creed, that it is most desirable to have a trifle laid past against a rainy day. To give form to this idea, each of the six elder girls has been started with a savings' bank book, and a small amount has been entered to her credit in the local Post Office. It is hoped that when they leave the school this may help to induce the girls to add small sums from time to time to their little store."

While I quote this extract from the Report of the Committee of the Hampton House Industrial School, I have no hesitation in saying that in the case of a large number of the other Industrial Schools for girls, if reports were published, they would contain equally satisfactory statements of the excellent work done by the children in the Domestic Science classes.

It is with pleasure I have again to acknowledge the assistance I received from the Assistant Inspector and my staff in carrying out the work of my Department during the past year.
