BE it enacted by the Queen's most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and Commons, in this present Parliament assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1. From and after the passing of this Act persons seeking to be Law students admitted to practise as barristers at the Irish bar shall not be not required to keep terms required to keep any terms commons, or enter their names in any in London. of the inns of court in London.


