Amend the Law relating to Jurors in Ireland.

A.D. 1890.

BE it enacted by the Queen's most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and Commons, in this present Parliament assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows :

- 5 **1.** From and after the *passing of this Act* the following provisions shall take effect with regard to the empanelling of juries upon the trial of any indictment in Ireland, including all cases in which the prosecution of indictments is conducted by or under the directions of a law officer of the Crown, or of counsel or solicitor acting on
10 behalf of such law officer :—
- (1.) No prosecutor, upon the trial of any indictment, shall have the right of requiring the court to order any juror to stand by or to stand aside, and the power to order jurors to stand by or to stand aside is hereby abolished.
- 15 (2.) Every prosecutor shall be entitled to challenge, without cause assigned, the same number of jurors in cases of felony and misdemeanor as a person on trial in such cases respectively may now do by law, and as many more as cause can be shown against.
- 20 (3.) Section twenty-four of the Act thirty-four and thirty-five Victoria, chapter sixty-five, is hereby repealed.
